California Eleven Snaps Husky Skein

TULELAKE (Special) — The Tulelake Honkers broke an eight-year drought on Friday night when they handed the Husky gridders a 47-13 trouncing on the Tulelake field.

The last Tulelake triumph over the visitors came in 1953. Another bright spot in the Honker season was an earlier win over Merrill, the first in seven years. This is coach Hank Smith's first season at Tulelake.

Led by halfback Bill Oehlerich who packed the ball 15 times for a total of 168 yards and scored three touchdowns, the Honkers scored in every period. They had their big "innings" in the second and final frames as they wore down the Merrill squad.

The contest was not as one-sided as the score indicated. The Huskies, minus the services of injured Denny Salvadori, kept the heat on Tulelake continually, necessitating three stands within the Honker 20-yard marker.

Halfback Bucky Wilson was responsible for one Husky TD and one point after, both on runs. Dick Carleton supplied the other on a 42 pass play that originated with Wilson.

Quarterback Mike Todd connected on four of nine Honker aerials, which included a 32-yarder to Ron Long good for a TD and an eight-yarder to Oehlerich, also good for six. Todd also burst out with a 60-yard TD dash from scrimmage.

Roy Kriegenbeck and Bill Alcorn each intercepted Wilson passes, the former setting up a TD with a 60-yard run, and the latter scoring on a 45-yard romp.

Fullback Mike Pierce came up with the other Tulelake TD when he counted on a 16-yard off-tackle slant. Oehlerich and Pierce combined to provide the PATs.

The Honkers ended their season with a 4-3-1 record.

Powerful Idaho '11 Halts Pel Air Arm

BOISE (Special) — The Klamath Falls Pelicans went airborne Friday night but still were no match for the Borah Lions as the Southern Idaho Conference leaders lashed out with a vicious ground attack to turn aside the stubborn Oregon contingent 26-13 at Bronco Stadium.

The non-league game, played in nippy below-freezing weather and before a sparse crowd, was sweet revenge for the Lions who fell to this same club last year 7-0 at Klamath Falls.

While Pelican quarterback Sherman Allen was a continual thorn in the Lions' side with his aerial wizardry, principally to end Wayne Dennis, a quartet of Lion backs — Duane Stands, Hayden Livingston, Ray Littlefield and Don Nielsen — made up the difference by galloping for big gains throughout the conflict. The victory was Borah's seventh against a single loss and one tie. Klamath Falls is now 3-5-1.

Allen opened up the Pelican attack in the second period in a 75-yard pass play good for the score. Then in the fourth quarter with 14 seconds remaining in the game Allen hit Dennis again, this time for 17 yards.

After the last TD, fullback Larry McClure plunged over for the extra point.

While the forward pass kept Klamath Falls hopes alive most of the game, it cost the Pelicans a TD late in the first period as Borah halfback Duane Stands nabbed an Allen pass and raced 40 yards to paydirt. Bob Barlow booted the point.
