Mystery Financier Sentenced, Fined

WASHINGTON (AP) — Alexander L. Guterman, mystery man of international finance, Friday was sentenced to 8 to 24 months in prison for acting illegally as an agent for dictator Rafael Trujillo and the Dominican Republic. He also was fined \$10,000.

The sentence was imposed by Judge Joseph R. Jackson in U.S. District Court. Jackson denied Guterman's motion to withdraw a plea of no contest he entered last May.

Guterman already is serving a sentence of 4 years and 11 months in the Atlanta Penitentiary on a conviction in New York of conspiring to withhold financial records from the government.

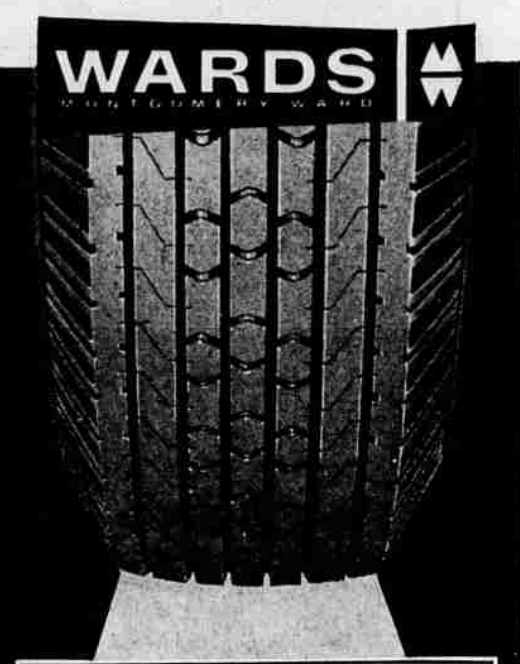
The sentence imposed by Judge Jackson is in addition to the New York sentence.

The no-contest plea, while not admitting guilt, means the defendant chooses not to stand trial and that the judge may dispose of the case.

Guterman and others were accused of accepting \$750,000 from Trujillo and the Dominican Republic to broadcast political propaganda in the guise of news. At the time, early in 1959, Guterman was president of the Mutual Broadcasting System, which since has undergone a complete change in ownership and management.

Hal Roach Jr., who was formerly chairman of the board of Mutual, last May entered a plea of no contest to a charge that he failed to cause Mutual to register as a foreign agent. He was fined \$500 by Judge Jackson, who told

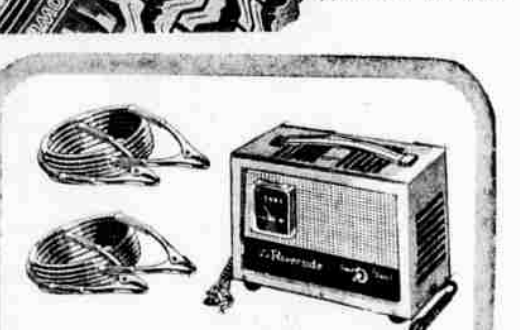

Polls Don't Blunt Nixon Optimism

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon confronted with polls indicating victory for Sen. John F. Kennedy—says he is still optimistic. But from the start he has been handicapped.

1. He has been handcuffed by the conflicts within his own party.
2. His very position put him on the defensive.
3. There are more Democrats than Republicans.
4. The recent tide has been Democratic.

Nixon commented earlier this year on a newspaper editor's appraisal of his dilemma with his own Republicans.

"You put your finger on a real problem when you indicated I must be liberal enough to rid myself of the undesired charge that I represent the Old Guard, yet conservative enough to present a contrast to the Democratic nominee," Nixon said.

He can't sound too conservative without chancing the loss of the liberal Republicans who could swing to Kennedy.

He can't be too liberal without perhaps losing the ultra-conservative Republican right wing.

Nixon can't afford to lose either wing. He needs all the Republicans he can get even though, while he can't win without them, alone, he can't win without them.

The reason is there are more registered Democrats than Republicans. To win he'll need almost all of his own party, plus some Democrats and independents.

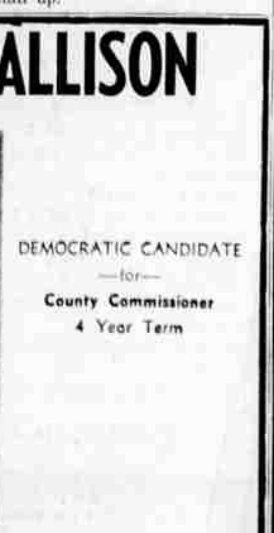
