Godfrey Faces An Operation

NEW YORK (UPI) — Arthur Godfrey, who survived a serious cancer operation last year, will return to the Columbia Presbyterian Medical Center next Wednesday for removal of what doctors described as fatty tumor on his back.

A spokesman for the 56-year-old radio and TV star said the tumor operation bears no relation to the cancer removed from Godfrey's left lung 18 months ago. Surgeons have told Godfrey the operation is "optional" and minor, they said.

Godfrey expects to leave the medical center's Harkness Pavilion, where he spent nearly three weeks last year, two or three days after the operation. Network sources said Godfrey will be heard on radio and seen on TV without interruption by means of pre-recording.

Don Miller, Larry French, Del Folk, and Bud Phillips gave the writer the rundown on the sleek new "Trennjager" metal cutting cutoff saw (made in West Germany) which was installed in the machine shop on Wednesday. The unit, which cost \$2,050, will cut a piece of iron for 1 cent worth of electricity that would cost 15 cents using gas and it will do it about 50 times faster when one considers the time it takes to get a torch ready and lighted.

Also in the metals lab there is a new plastics metallurgical sample mounting press. It is used for mounting small sample specimens of metals made in the lab from different alloys or by different treatments. The machine embeds the metal in plastic except for an exposed end which can be ground, polished, and examined under a microscope or in the metaloscope. The plastic comes in granular form, is heated to 350 degrees and put under several thousand pounds of pressure per square inch in the mounting press. The plastic covered metal samples are preserved with records of the treatment for future study of grain, structure, and other physical features.

Shoplifter Loss Rising

NEW YORK—The annual theft loss in supermarkets and variety stores has reached three million dollars and is rising. The Insider's Newsletter reported Friday.

The result of the widespread shoplifting has been a rise in the price of merchandise coupled with the elimination of vulnerable items from the shelves. The added costs to the consumer stem from the need to use pilfer-proof packages to narrow the opportunities for the light-fingered shopper. These packages often take the form of special blister packages for brushes and cardboard cards for household utensils, the higher costs of which are passed along to the buyer. Supermarkets have also had to cut down on the variety of items offered. They have found that the loss of one or two small packaged luxury items can hurt badly enough to warrant their discontinuance. Therefore, when several jars of caviar are stolen, the item is removed from the shelf entirely until the costly protective packaging is supplied.

The special packaging, however, has made the merchandise cumbersome to carry and is often difficult to open.

A survey conducted by Nesbitt Associates, packaging and industrial designers, has uncovered three relatively new techniques employed by lady shoplifters:

The cap changer—She switches the cap on the 39-cent bottle of salad dressing to the 79-cent and hopes to get by the check counter. The caps of many brands are frequently identical.

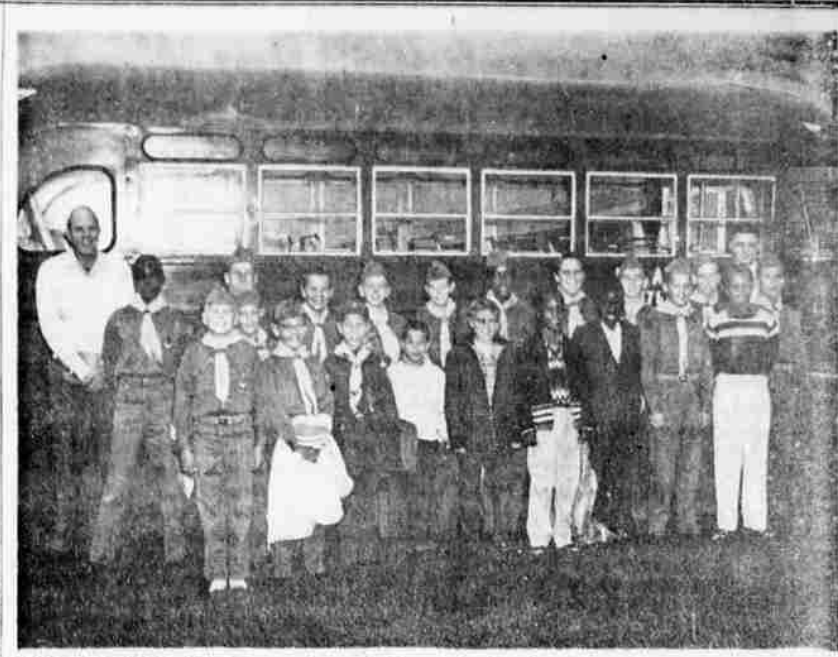
The coupon clipper—Premium-happy shoppers who tear off box tops and coupons, then push the mutilated packages to the rear of shelves.

The box burglar—She filches contents only and leaves empty boxes behind. Common technique is to slip item in already-pierced brown bag from meat or fresh vegetable department.
