Bulletin Analyzes Farm Crop In Oregon

Results of a 10-year study on the cost of producing apples and pears in Oregon's Hood River Valley are reported in a new bulletin published by the Oregon State College agricultural experiment station.

The new bulletin is based on a study of records kept by about 20 Hood River orchardists each year over a 10-year period. From this information, OSC agricultural economists analyzed the costs involved in apple, winter pear, and Bartlett pear production to the point of delivery to the packing house door.

Titled, "Cost of Producing Apples and Pears in the Hood River Valley," the new bulletin uses tables, graphs, and charts to analyze the factors affecting costs

of production. Sections in the bulletin also examine the more important factors responsible for economical production of apples and pears in the area, and determine the relative profitability of apples, winter pears, and Bartletts produced by the growers in the study.

Another section of the bulletin helps readers estimate yearly cost of producing apples, winter pears, or Bartletts under present production conditions and practices.

The bulletin was written by OSC agricultural economists D. Curtis Mumford, Arthur E. Irish, and Warren J. Green. Oregon residents can obtain a free copy at their county extension office, or from the OSC bulletin clerk,

Corvallis. Cost of the publication will be 20 cents per copy to out-of-state requests.

Stamps In The News

Just about this time of year Australia perennially issues a postage stamp emphasizing the spiritual significance of Christmas. The 1960 adhesive honoring the occasion depicts an open Bible with the Christmas message: "Behold I bring you good tidings of great joy (Luke 2:10)," illuminated by a candle.

The new stamp, five pence crimson, will be made available at post offices, in Australia for approximately nine weeks starting November 9. Thus it will be on sale at the beginning of the 350th anniversary year of the first publication of the English translation of the Bible authorized by King James I, which first appeared in 1611.

Sweden celebrates the centenary of the birth of Hjalmar Branting by issuing two new postage stamps. The 15 ore red and one krona 70 ore blue grey bear a portrait of Branting who was leader of the Swedish Labor Party from its inception in 1889 until his death in 1925. He was prime minister three times. He was noted outside of Sweden for his work on behalf of the League of Nations. Branting supported the independence of this organization from coalitions of the great powers and was a leader in the field of international disarmament.

Pakistan commemorates the golden jubilee of the Punjab Agricultural College at Lyallpur by issuing a set of two new stamps. The two anna slate grey with a scarlet border shows the main college building. The eight anna emerald green with a mauve border illustrates the official shield of the college.

Belgium has paid tribute to its stamp collectors by issuing a new 40 centimes stamp commemorating "Philately for Youth." The design features a young girl and boy looking at a stamp and a world globe. Also seen on the stamp are a posthorn and a slogan honoring philately.

Also issued by Belgium was a

six value set of semi-postals with the additional values going to the Belgium Committee of UNICEF.



Nationalist China has issued a six value set of sports stamps. The stamps were released to coincide with the 15th Athletic Meeting of the Taiwan Province held in Taichung. The sports depicted on the stamps were: swimming, discus throwing, basketball, soccer, hurdling, and running.

Part I of the Stanley Gibbons' stamp catalog (produced in Great Britain) covering Great Britain and the British Commonwealth of Nations, 1961 edition, shows an extremely thorough revision in prices throughout its 782 pages.
