### Both Sides Claim California Gains

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — Both sides claim they will gain strength in the lower house of the legislature after the election next Tuesday.

Assemblyman Joseph C. Shell, Republican floor leader, said he believed the GOP would gain 5 to 11 seats in the Assembly.

Assemblyman William A. Munnell, Democratic floor leader, said:

"Ridiculous. The Democratic majority after the election will be substantially higher than it is now."

The current party split in the Assembly is 45-32 Democratic with three vacancies. After the 1958 election, Democrats dominated the lower house 47-33.

All 80 seats are up for grabs with incumbents running for reelection in all except nine districts.

**Terms May Change**

Assemblymen serve two-year terms and are paid \$500 a month — but that would change if voters adopt Propositions 2 and 3 on the ballot. Proposition 2 would increase assemblymen's terms to four years while No. 3 would boost the salaries of both the Senate and Assembly up to \$750 a month.

All of the major leaders of the two parties in the assembly are

running again—Shell, Minnell, Speaker Ralph M. Brown of Modesto, Majority Whip Gordon H. Winston Jr. of Merced, Speaker Pro Tem Carlos Bee of Hayward.

Minority Whip Bruce Sumner of Newport Beach, and Jesse M. Unruh, one of Sen. John F. Kennedy's top California advisers and Gov. Edmund G. Brown's No. 1 man in the Assembly.

Also running for reelection is California's only woman legislator—Assemblywoman Pauline Davis of Portola.

The glamor (or publicity) of politics even has attracted light heavyweight champion Archie Moore of San Diego.

Moore is running in the 79th district as a Democrat for the unexpired term of Assemblyman George Crawford. Moore is not a candidate for a full two-year term but if he beats another Democrat, George J. Laphorne, San Diego real estate broker, he will claim the title of assemblyman until Jan. 2, 1961.

**Familiar Faces Missing**

Some familiar faces will be missing from the Assembly even if all the incumbents are successful next Tuesday.

Assemblywoman Dorothy M. Donahoe of Bakersfield, chairman of the Education Committee in

the last session, died last February. Veteran legislators Richard J. McCollister of Marin County and Ernest R. Geddes of Claremont retired as did one of Brown's political allies, Thomas J. MacBride of Sacramento.

Two assemblymen, Sam R. Geddes of Napa and Lee M. Backstrand of Riverside, elected to try for the state Senate while three assemblymen, S.C. Masterson of Richmond, William Biddick of Stockton and Crawford became judges.

Assemblymen the party pros predict may have a tough time winning another term include Harold Sedgwick, R, 4th district; Don Mulford, R, 18th; John A. Buserud, R, 22nd; Louis Francis, R, 25th; Bruce F. Allen, R, 29th; Charles B. Garrigus, D, 33rd; Myron H. Frew, D, 35th; Joseph M. Kennick, D, 44th; Ronald B. Cameron, D, 50th; Thomas M. Rees, D, 59th; Jack A. Beaver, R, 73rd; Richard T. Hanna, D, 75th and Jack Schrade, R, 80th.

The girls drove to Portland and Madras, then headed south to Klamath Falls Thursday. Their car motor froze north of Chiloquin and they hitchhiked to Klamath Falls. Officers said they discovered Hicks' car parked behind the Elks Club with the keys in it. They drove back north and were captured near Chemult.

Officers said the car was loaded with paraphernalia, including a small dog.

Misses Johnson, Fellner and Rhodes are scheduled to appear Wednesday in district court to answer a charge of car stealing. The 17-year-old is being held for hospital authorities.

Hal F. Coe, Krohn's attorney, twice moved for mistrials Friday afternoon on the basis that Young's clothing, offered for identification by Deputy District Attorney Robert M. Redding, was "highly prejudicial." Both motions were denied by Judge David R. Vandenberg.

### Bloody Clothing Brings Krohn Mistrial Motions

heard testimony from six witnesses during the afternoon, including Young himself. Other witnesses were Mrs. Anne Young, former Moty, George Flitcraft, Marie DeLap and Victor Hartell.

Young and Krohn never looked at each other while the bartender was in his wheelchair in front of the witness stand. Young testified about the shooting. He said Krohn fired once and he (Young) fell to the floor. Then, Young said, Krohn fired four more shots into him from a distance of three or four feet. Coe's cross examination was short; he asked why Young could remember times and conversations so well but didn't know the layout of the bar.

Young's wife, a tall-red-headed woman, took the stand and told about receiving a package of clothing on Oct. 13.

"I opened the package and saw blood..." she said. Coe immediately moved for a mistrial. The judge dismissed the jury, denied the motion and Mrs. Young identified her husband's apron. Mrs. Young began to cry when she saw the apron.

Moty, Flitcraft and DeLap all told of seeing Krohn late on Oct. 12 in the Elks Club bar. They recalled brief conversations with Krohn to the effect that he was a visitor from Iowa. Both Flitcraft and DeLap noted slight irregularities in Krohn's speech.

The Elks' janitor, Victor Hartell, said he was cleaning in the billiard room of the club shortly after midnight when he heard shots — "two shots followed by three more." He turned off the lights in the billiard room, waited

a few minutes and then slipped into the card room, from where he could look into the bar.

"I heard Carl holler and I went and called police," Hartell said. "This is a gruesome, bloody exhibit and the district attorney is purposely doing it." Coe said, Vandenberg denied the motion and ordered the clothing removed from view.
