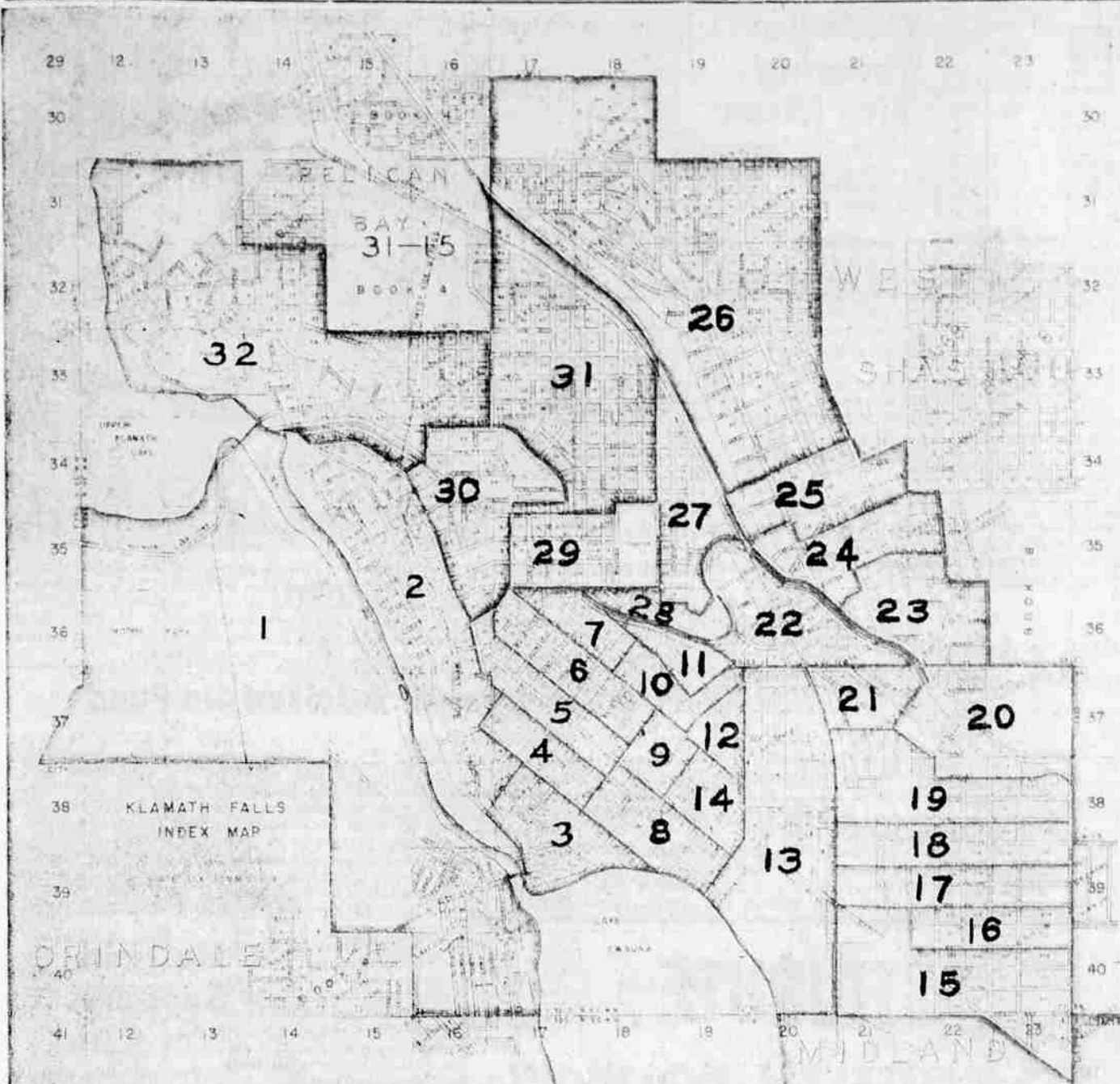




Kiwanis 'CQ' Plan Is Challenging

A challenging new citizenship program is being conducted in this community by the Kiwanis Club.

Known as the "CQ" program, the aim of the drive is to challenge individual citizens to assess their personal citizenship quotient, and to determine if their acceptance of citizenship responsibility is in keeping with the problems and the needs of both the individual and the community.

The CQ program was developed originally by Kiwanis International, and is currently being undertaken throughout the United States and Canada under the auspices of Kiwanis Clubs working singly or in concert with other groups and citizens' committees.

Mayor Lawrence Slater has taken special note of the campaign by issuing a special proclamation on "CQ" program.

In his proclamation, the mayor said, "If a man is to achieve effective responsibility as a citizen he must have an inspirational set of standards by which to measure himself as a citizen."

He also pointed out, "The privilege of democracy, the free man's manner of self-government, calls for the best from everyone, every day, in every situation, the Citizenship Quotient program provides an opportunity for the citizen to assess his citizenship effectiveness and his individual ability to contribute to the American way of life."

Small booklets entitled "How Do You Rate Yourself?" are now being distributed by Kiwanians and citizens are asked to read and carefully check their own efforts to determine their "CQ" rating.

School Officials Urge More Support

EUGENE (AP) — The Oregon School Boards Association urged Oregonians to support the state's new Memorial Coliseum.
