

Phair Plays Inflationary Effect Of Federal Spending

MERRILL—A Democratic vic-slash nearly in half the buying power of retirement checks of mil-lions of our older citizens, Ron Phair, Republican candidate for Congress from the Second District, said today during a campaign swing into rural Klamath County.

"If the big spending programs proposed by the Democrats were ever put into effect," Phair declared, "the resulting inflation would hit hardest retired persons on pensions and fixed incomes who could well find themselves unable to meet everyday living expenses."

"Food costs alone," Phair said, "would increase a minimum of 25 per cent under terms of the agricultural program young Jack Kennedy has promised and Democrats in Congress have sworn to enact."

"Even Henry Wallace, who was Secretary of Agriculture during Franklin D. Roosevelt's administration and perhaps was the most radical man to hold that post since the founding of the Republic, has scored the Kennedy proposal as one which was too far left for him. Wallace estimated it would increase food prices not just 25 per cent, but 50 per cent. This is the estimate, remember, of the Secretary of Agriculture in the administration Senator Kennedy idolized most—that of Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Phair emphasized that food prices, although one of the two major items in the average low-income budget, were not the only

increases to be expected if Kennedy's ill-considered proposals are brought to fruition.

He said Kennedy repeatedly has asserted his intention of continuing New and Fair Deal policies which slashed the value of the dollar in half during the Roosevelt and Truman administrations, and added:

"During the eight years of the Eisenhower Administration, when Vice President Richard M. Nixon played a major role in shaping the nation's economic policies, the dollar lost only five cents in value."

"The wanton spending which is built into the Kennedy program would make both Franklin Roosevelt and Harry Truman look like skinflints by comparison. Those who live in low fixed incomes well could slash their retirement checks nearly in half and vote themselves onto relief roles by electing a Democrat to the presidency and continuing the Democratic grip on the House of Representatives."

Eastern Oregon College and Pacific University have announced the results of campus political polls.

Republican Richard M. Nixon was favored for the presidency at both schools. At Eastern Oregon, it was 180 for Nixon and 171 for Democrat John F. Kennedy. At Pacific it was 171 to 120.

Democrat Maurine Neuberger was favored over Republican Elmo Smith for the U. S. Senate at both schools. The vote was 190 to 164 at Eastern Oregon and 149 to 127 at Pacific.

Attorney general, Democrat Robert Y. Thornton led Republican Carl Francis by a majority of 219.

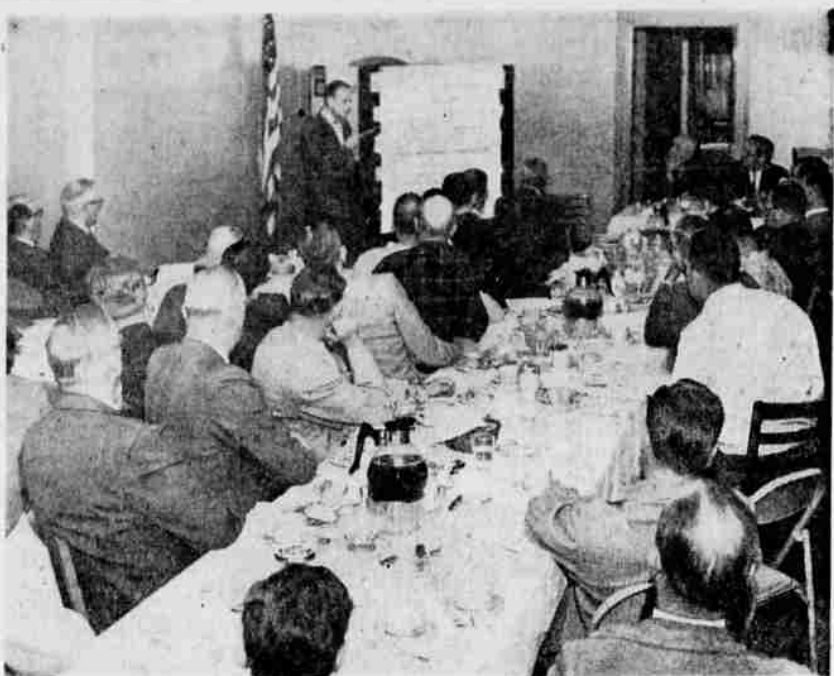
Congressman, Democrat Al Ullman 222; Republican Ron Phair 121.

Bids Are Asked For Dam Jobs

PORTLAND (AP)—Bids for two projects at Detroit Dam on the North Santiam River, 45 miles southeast of Salem, were asked Saturday by the Army Engineers.

Bid opening was scheduled Nov. 22 for furnishing and installing structural steel and other metalwork for a stoplog guide extension. On Dec. 6 bids will be opened for slope stabilization next to the Detroit Dam powerhouse.

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Fire Department Advised On Funds

ROCKY POINT—Organizers of Rocky Point Community Fire Department received advice from four authorities during a meeting last Monday at Pioneer Lodge.

They were Darroll Frewing, Rogue River National Forest Klamath District ranger; Joe Seares, county civil defense director; Forrest Kelly, insurance

representative, and Don Piper, an attorney.

Frewing said the forest service will be able to endow the organization with a land-use permit that will enable the department to build a fire hall in the resort and summer home area 25 miles northwest of Klamath Falls near the Lake of the Woods area.

He said the department has authority to choose the most logical site and submit the request to the forest service for approval.

Seares said the department may be able to qualify for government surplus materials after an emergency evacuation route is established from Klamath Falls to Jackson County via the road to Lake of the Woods.

The road must first be completed and maintained throughout the year. Then, he said, a welfare center and emergency aid station probably will be located in the vicinity of Rocky Point, qualifying the area for surplus equipment. The department may also receive matching government funds for fire department operation, he said.

Kelly explained that the department should obtain insurance to cover firemen while they are on the job, collision, comprehensive and fire and theft insurance to cover the fire truck; public liability and property damage, and miscellaneous liability and fire insurance to cover the fire hall building.

Piper explained procedure for forming a non-profit corporation, enabling donors to the fire department to deduct contributions from personal income tax.

Clarence Balfour was elected president. Bud Miller, Fritz Junge, Wayne Keeler, Bob Sloan, Piper, Pete O'Neil and Doug Tennant were elected to the board of directors. They also signed an incorporation application.

Directors will meet monthly and will call quarterly meetings for all members. Members also may request a meeting at any time by presenting directors with a petition containing at least 10 members' signatures. Anyone who owns property in the Rocky Point community or who lives there is eligible to join.

Balfour, whose address is Rocky Point Route, Klamath Falls, will furnish more information on request. His phone is on the Rocky Point exchange.

He is available, too, for advice concerning donations to the fire department. The budding department recently sent letters to 300 property owners in the area asking for donations toward purchase of a fire truck, construction of a fire hall and to meet other expenses connected with the department.

Those attending learned that donations began arriving promptly.

More are welcome. The department needs about \$1,500 to buy a used fire truck offered for sale by a former fire chief who lives in the area, and from \$1,000 to \$2,000 to build a hall.

Donations may be made payable to Rocky Point Community Fire Department and mailed to U.S. National Bank, Eighth and Main streets, Klamath Falls.

Hatfield Supports More Aid

SALEM (AP)—Gov. Mark Hatfield announced Friday he would ask the Legislature to increase the state's share of the cost of public school education.

The governor said his proposed budget would ask for \$124 million in basic school aid to local districts, compared with \$107 million being spent in the current two-year budget period.

About \$6 million more would be required to take care of increased enrollment, and the other 11 million of the increase would be in increased aid.

The current level of state aid is \$105 per pupil per year. The increase would bring this level to \$115.

Increased school aid, in effect, reduces local property taxes.

He said the increase could be accomplished without increasing state taxes.

The state now pays 36 per cent of the cost of elementary and high school education. Department of Education statisticians said they don't know what this percentage would be with the proposed increase.

The Legislative Interim Committee on Education has proposed that this level be increased to 50 per cent over the next six years.
