Democrats, Republicans Both Find Comfort In Varying National Polls

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans with a presidential preference could find a poll to suit their tastes today, whether their choice was Richard M. Nixon or John F. Kennedy.

Professional polls, newspaper polls, college campus polls and miscellaneous other straw vote polls showed various results even though the election itself is only a day away.

Pollster Elmo Roper headed into the final pre-election weekend with a conclusion, "There's not a clear lead by either candidate."

Roper's latest figures, from an Oct. 24 nationwide pulsetaking, showed 46 per cent for Republican Nixon, 44.5 per cent for Democrat Kennedy and 9.4 per cent undecided. But a closer analysis of the undecided vote gave this revised picture: Kennedy 48.5 per cent, Nixon 47.5 per cent, undecided 4 per cent.

"The 4 per cent undecided could make an electoral college landslide either way," Roper added.

Kennedy boosters could take cheer from George Gallup's report last week of "a dramatic shift" toward the Democratic slate in the campaign home-stretch. Gallup said his latest nationwide poll, tabulated from Oct. 20-25 interviews, indicated that of those likely to vote and showing a preference, 53 per cent picked Kennedy and 47 per cent Nixon compared with a 50-50 split found

in an early October sampling. Surveys published by three national magazines last week found Kennedy ahead. Time magazine's correspondents figured Kennedy was leading in states with 306 electoral votes, Nixon in states with 149. Needed to win: 269.

Newsweek said 50 top Washington correspondents predicted Kennedy would win compared with 10 forecasting a Nixon victory. It said political experts in 50 states estimated Kennedy would get 278 electoral votes, Nixon 159, and 100 votes could go either way.

U.S. News and World Report rated Kennedy ahead in states with 282 votes, Nixon ahead in states with 205 votes and 50 votes doubtful.

Nixon backers could take heart from a poll of the nation's newspaper editors and publishers conducted by Publishers' Auxiliary, a weekly trade newspaper which announced results Nov. 3 from nearly 4,000 of the 10,703 ballots sent to newspaper executives.

Lawmaker Cites Water Surplus

SACRAMENTO (UPI)—A Northern California legislator says he has personal experience to prove there is surplus water in the state.

"In 1950 I had water four feet deep in my living room in Sacramento County," said Assemblyman Thomas MacBride. "It was all surplus and Southern California is welcome to every drop of it."

MacBride, a Sacramento Democrat, said opponents of the California water plan and the \$1.75 billion water bond issue on Tuesday's ballot are "ignoring facts and history" in claiming Northern California does not have surplus.

He said it would take 10 years to work up another water plan if the bond issue fails and added that a new plan "would have just as many opponents as this one."

Oregon Is Not Interested In Nez Perce, Says Hurd

PORTLAND (AP) — Owen W. Hurd, managing director of the Washington Public Power Supply System, said Saturday private electric utilities in Oregon had shown no interest in buying power from a proposed Nez Perce project.

The Washington Public Power Supply System has asked the federal Power Commission for authority to build Nez Perce Dam on the middle Snake River at the Oregon-Idaho border.

"Thus far they (the Oregon utilities) have expressed disinterest in any such purchase," Hurd said. But, he added, Nez Perce power would cost less than that from any non-federal project—a real incentive for Oregon consumers and utilities."

Hurd's statement was in answer to Gov. Mark Hatfield's testimony, presented in Washington by Jone C. Hill, Oregon public utilities commissioner, favoring the proposed High Mountain Sheep project. High Mountain Sheep would be built by Pacific Northwest Power Co., a combine of four Northwest private utilities, just above the confluence of the Sal-

Water Storage Reported Less

PORTLAND (AP) — A spotty water runoff on the Columbia River system was reported today for October.

The U.S. Geological Survey said this was the third straight month of varying reports.

The survey said the adjusted mean flow at the mouth of the Columbia was 83 per cent of the October average in the 15-year period from 1943 to 1957.

At The Dalles it was 83 per cent. High runoff was reported in the northern region above Revelstoke and Hope in Canada.

Low runoff areas were scattered over the central and southern parts of the Pacific Northwest. They were in the middle fork of the Flathead River in Montana, the Similkameen and Wenatchee rivers in Washington, the Weiser and Salmon rivers of Idaho, and the Umatilla, Deschutes and Umpqua rivers of Oregon.

Total storage at the end of October was reported in eight major reservoirs at some 606,000 acre-feet less than at this time last year.

Phair For Congress, 2nd District

Ron Phair of Klamath Falls, Republican candidate for the U.S. House of Representatives, may not be as well known in the huge 2nd district as he needs to be to unseat incumbent Al Ullman.

But he is highly respected in the Klamath Falls area, by both Republicans and Democrats, and he has made a strenuous effort to carry his campaign to other parts of the district.

Phair was persuaded to enter the race through concern over Rep. Ullman's adherence to the idea that the federal government must continue to expand its role, at the expense of state and local control.

The Klamath Falls businessman and farmer has a balanced view of the right relationship between federal, state and local governments. He believes there are areas in which only the federal government can function, but he is opposed to the abdication of

state and local responsibility and the erosion of state and local control.

He appreciates the problems of the farmer and would work for a better understanding of them by non-farming people and Congress, including emphasis on the fact that less than 25 per cent of farmers are under government programs.

Phair is a Mormon, devoted to his church, but liked and respected by people of all faiths. He has been a leader in numerous civic activities.

The Baker Democrat-Herald points out that "this is no 'blue-stocking' district. It is a district populated by farmers, ranchers, artisans, small businessmen, and those who have retired without lavish incomes..." It says that "in every way, Phair is representative of the people of this area."

The Journal too believes that Phair would better represent this great district than incumbent Ullman.
