Oregon Political Leaders Fearing Voters Will Stay Home

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS Republican and Democratic leaders in Oregon today said they feared voters will stay home election day because television networks will carry predictions by electronic brains of the winner of the presidential race long before polls close in the West.

That development came as campaigns began drawing to a close throughout Oregon. All that remained were last-minute speeches and appeals for voters tonight. The voters take over Tuesday.

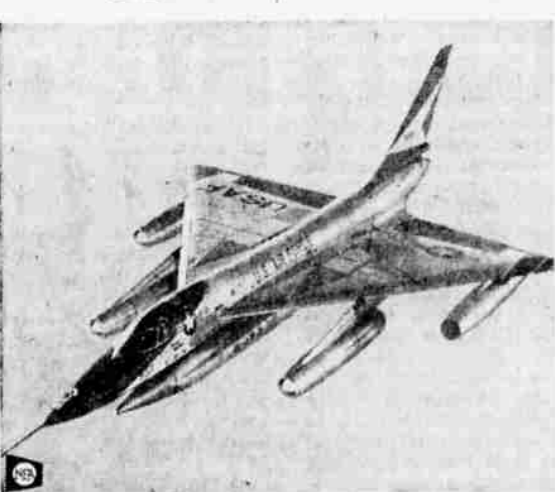

B-58 Hustler May Be Forerunner Of Civilian Supersonic Travel

FORT WORTH, Tex. (NEA)—out that the 160,000 pound nose B-58 is the first plane larger than a fighter to travel at twice the speed of sound and withstand intense heat-producing wind friction.

A new heat resistant aluminum skin covers 90 per cent of the large delta wing and portions of the fuselage. It withstands heat of more than 250 degrees Fahrenheit without weakening.

Using the B-58's structural and engineering concepts, Convair engineers believe that by 1965 they could have a transport ready to fly 60 to 70 passengers on three-hour trans-Atlantic hops.
