

### Taxpayers' Share Given

WASHINGTON (AP) — Taxpayers provided only 55.5 per cent of the \$280,578,705 in federal funds being spent on reclamation projects in the year ending June 30, the Interior Department says.

The department, in a statement Saturday, said the remaining 44.5 per cent will come from non-tax sources.

Most of this non-tax money comes from the reclamation fund, which is replenished chiefly by royalties from federal oil leases and public power revenues.

Proceeds from sales of public lands and timber contributed 6 per cent. The remainder came from project construction cost repayments, project operation and maintenance payments, and water rentals and other miscellaneous sources.

### College Prexy Attends Conference

WEED—Dr. Marion J. Green, president, attended the annual meeting of the state Association of Junior Colleges in Yosemite National Park Oct. 26 through 28.

All of the state's 63 junior colleges were represented. Delegates centered most of their discussion on possibility of state support for junior college operation and construction.

Delegates said the state needs more colleges—preferably junior colleges. Junior colleges on the average depend on their school districts for about 75 per cent of expense funds, they said. Bills that would support junior colleges will meet in January to discuss proposed bills that would support junior colleges.
