Sen. Hall Lusk today announced that a booklet entitled "The Disposition of the Public Domain in Oregon" has just been released by the Senate Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs. The idea of printing this thesis, rich in the historical background of Oregon's development, originated with the late Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, who was impressed with its value.

The publication is a doctoral thesis by Jerry O'Callaghan, a Klamath Falls native, who is now legislative assistant to Senator O'Mahoney of Wyoming, a colleague of the Oregon senator.

At Senator Neuberger's request the publication was authorized by the committee and O'Callaghan proceeded to condense the thesis so that all the essential facts would be available with adequate reference material for other researchers and historians.
