WALL STREET

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market declined sharply in lively trading early this afternoon.

Key stocks fell from fractions to about 2 points.

A large cloud of uncertainty hung over Wall Street and many investors were baffled by the implications of the long drawn-out tally of presidential election returns.

The street reacted as it always does to uncertainty. Traders pulled in their horns.

Early in the session prices were mixed with the aircraft-missile stocks and gold shares prominently on the upside. Their advance faded into a hedge-podge of gains and losses.

Sharply lower were steels, autos, rails, oils, and electrical equipments.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks at noon was down 1.90 to 209.90 with the industrials down 3.20, the rails down 1.20 and the utilities down .40.

The Dow Jones industrial average at noon was off 7.66 at 389.97.

Corporate bonds were mixed. U.S. government bonds advanced.

Testimony Is Heard In Court

George W. Krohn's sister, Mrs. Mildred Clark, was called to the witness stand Wednesday forenoon by Deputy District Attorney Robert M. Redding.

The state is attempting to prove that Krohn knew what he was doing when he allegedly shot Elks Club bartender Carl B. Young five times on the early morning of October 13. Mrs. Clark is the owner of a rooming house at 310 South Fifth Street, where Krohn was living at the time of the shooting. He is said to have returned to the house and talked with his sister after the shooting.

City police officer Gerald Flochini concluded his testimony Wednesday morning. He followed officers Floyd Pierce and Darrell Hilliker, who also testified as to the investigation of the alleged assault and the capture of Krohn. Flochini told of an interrogation of Krohn by him and Detective Sergeant Walter Conrady.

"Krohn was asked if he had been to the Elks Club," Flochini said. "He replied that he had and that he had been to the American Legion Club earlier. He said he didn't know what had taken place at the Elks Club."

"Krohn admitted that the 25 caliber pistol in his pocket was his," Flochini said. "He said he had shot it last weekend of October 8-9. He also acknowledged that a butcher knife found at the scene of the capture was his. He said he was going to trim some roses with it."

"Krohn said all was quiet when he left the Elks Club," Flochini testified. "He claimed that he was in bed at the rooming house before midnight."

Krohn is charged with assault with intent to kill. Maximum sentence for the crime is life imprisonment.

Delay Try Is Bailed On Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The attempt of the Washington Public Power System to get a delay in the Federal Power Commission hearing on rival applications to build dams on the Snake River was turned down Tuesday.

The WPPSS asked additional time to prepare for cross-examination of witnesses in its contest with the Pacific Northwest Power Co. The commission upheld a ruling denying the request.

The WPPSS, made up of 14 public utility districts, seeks to build the Nez Perce Dam on the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon. The PNP, a four-firm combination which wants to build the high Mountain Sheep Dam at another site, objected to the delay. The hearing has been postponed three times since last March.

Cross-examination of Kinsey M. Robinson, PNP board chairman, continued at Tuesday's half-day session. He repeated his previous statement that his group can finance and proceed at once with a start on the \$257 million Mountain Sheep dam job.

Falls Again

PORTLAND (AP)—Four years ago Mrs. Maude Weller, 81, fell on the steps leading to her polling place and broke her hip. Before going to a hospital, though, she cast a ballot for President Eisenhower.

Tuesday as Mrs. Weller was going down the same steps she fell again. This time her left arm was fractured. She went to a hospital after casting a vote for Vice President Nixon.

Idaho Backs Dick Nixon

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon carried Idaho as expected Tuesday, but veteran Republican Rep. Hamer Budge lost out to a 31-year-old political novice.

Budge, 40, a veteran of 10 years in Congress and member of the powerful House Rules Committee, was defeated by young Ralph Harding, a Blackfoot businessman.

Harding had 72,292 votes early Wednesday, and Budge 75,964 with returns in from 469 of the 403 precincts in Idaho's Second Congressional District.

Sen. Henry Dworshak, who has spent 12 years in the Senate, easily turned back the bid of Democrat Robert F. McLaughlin and Rep. Gracie Pfost had little trouble in the First District with Thomas A. Leupp, the Republican mayor of Nampa.

Nixon carried the state's four electoral votes, defeating Sen. John F. Kennedy 129,240 to 114,927 to 114,927 in 776 of 886 precincts.

The election set forth boldly the declining importance of the farm vote. This decline reflects the fact that farmers are becoming a smaller and smaller portion of the total population of the country as well as of the farm states themselves.

A single protest lodged by Mrs. Angus B. Lee, who owns property on the outskirts of the proposed city limits, was withdrawn when spokesmen for the committee explained that only a small portion of her property will be included in the area.

The committee offered no objections to exclusion of Carrick and Warren additions. Weed's total assessed valuation in the boundaries proposed is \$1,500,000. Assessed valuation of property in those additions is \$12,400, the committee announced.

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Ferric Sulfate Breaks Up 'Dobe' Clay on Irrigated Farmland

Agricultural Ferric Sulfate has proved its ability to loosen the heavy adobe clay that forms slick spots and lumpy, unworkable patches in many Pacific Northwest pastures and fields.
