

Oregon Tech Gridders Just One Away From Perfect Season

A trip to Washington and a Saturday night battle with the Grays Harbor Junior College Chokers are all that stand between the Oregon Tech football team and the first perfect season in the history of the Mile High school.

A victory in Aberdeen will extend the Owls' victory streak to nine straight. The game is scheduled at 8 p.m. in rainy Aberdeen. The Tech squad and coaches Rex Hunsaker, George Miller and Jim Cordial will leave the Owl campus at noon Friday.

In the Chokers the Owls meet a ball club noted for its running and throwing ability under adverse conditions. A soggy field and a wet ball are standard equipment on the Choker gridiron.

Three of the Tech squad are playing their final game wearing the Owl colors and they will attempt to put the cap on college careers that have been standouts in the Oregon Collegiate Conference annals.

Quarterback Roy Johnson, halfback Charlie Wilson and end-halfback Ardell Hamilton will hang up their gear for the final time at the completion of the Saturday night action.

The trio, all of whom have been awarded All-Conference honors in past seasons, are again, in company with numerous other Owls, in line for All-Star awards.

Johnson has been voted AC honors at both the quarterback and linebacker slots, Wilson at a defensive halfback post, and Hamilton at end. Should he get through the Saturday test okay, Hamilton will have completed his first season for the Owls without serious injury.

Hunsaker, who has been drilling his club ardently on defensive measures figured to contain the Chokers, noted that the entire team was back in harness and ready to go.

Only All-Conference candidate guard Windell Winterbottom, the Grants Pass sophomore who was injured in the Whitman contest last Saturday, is showing any vestiges of a limp. Winterbottom twisted an ankle but he plans to play this weekend, with or without the sore spot.

The probable starting offensive unit for the Techmen will include Johnson, fullback Bud Maupin, the OCC's number two rusher, and halfbacks Wilson and freshman Ken Lowers. Hamilton will alternate with Wilson through much of the action, depending on the Choker defenses.

The Andersons, no relation, are also candidates for all-conference honors along with Palmore, Madden and Cook. Each has displayed tremendous desire and ability throughout the long season.

The offensive unit will include Ted Morris and Rog Hooper at ends, Gary Vuget and Cook at guard posts, and tackles Madden and Ed Anderson. Winterbottom, although he will not start will alternate at the guard hole.

Johnson will serve at linebacker along with Jack Williams and Bob Skinner. The deep chores will be covered by Dan Behnke,

Palmore and Wilson and Hamilton alternately.

The Owls, although confident of their ability, are inclined to keep the proper respect for the Chokers.

Warned Hunsaker, "Over-confidence at this time could run everything. The club is eager for the win—and I believe they will get it, but it won't be an easy one or I miss my guess."

Maris Edges Mickey Mantle For American Loop MVP Title

RAYTOWN, Mo. (AP)—Roger Maris, the American League's most valuable player for 1960, brushed aside comment on his award today with the declaration that the New York Yankees "should go on and win it again next year."

A four-year major league veteran, Maris edged Yankee teammate outfielder Mickey Mantle by only three points—225 to 222—in the voting of a 24-man committee of the Baseball Writers Association of America. Ten players were included in the voting, announced Wednesday, with 14 points awarded for first place, nine for second, eight for third, etc.

Asked how he felt about beating out Mantle—most valuable in 1956 and 1957—the Yankee outfielder said:

"I'm just happy I won it. I thought it was possible but I wasn't sure."

SF Manager Hires Hands

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Alvin Dark made his first decisions as manager of the San Francisco Giants Wednesday. He hired two former teammates as coaches.

Dark, signed last week, selected Larry Jansen and Whitey Lockman and retained Wes Westrum and Salty Parker for his coaching staff. Bill Posedel was released to make way for Jansen as boss of the bullpen.

Dark, Lockman, Jansen and Westrum were all key figures for the Giants that October day in 1951 when Bobby Thomson's home run beat the Brooklyn Dodgers in a National League playoff and gave the Giants their first pennant in 14 years.

Oregon's class A-1 high school football playoffs get under way tonight with a game between Jefferson, the Portland city league champion, and David Douglas, titlist in the Portland Metropolitan League.

There will be a father-son rivalry in the contest. Terry DeSylvia, David Douglas' ace passer, is the son of Tom DeSylvia, the Jefferson coach. He completed 10 of 13 passes in last week's league championship game against Central Catholic.

The New Mexico State star has scored 16 touchdowns and two extra points for a 98-point total. Jones, with 22 extra points and eight touchdowns has 85 points after touchdowns for 89 points.

WS Snagger Nears Mark

Washington State's Hugh Campbell is catching passes at a rate almost unprecedented in major college football. After eight games, the Cougar sophomore has snagged 33 for 712 yards and seven touchdowns. NCAA Service Bureau statistics showed today.

Only three players have caught more even during an entire season, and if Campbell can pass them in his two remaining games, he likely will become the third record-breaker this season.

Already one NCAA modern record has been broken and two have been tied, all in the kicking department. Ed Dvas, Auburn fullback, has kicked nine field goals, a record for one season, and his career total of 13 equals another record. Nolan Jones, Arizona State placekicker, has booted 22 points after touchdown without a miss, equalling the full-season record.

Campbell is 19 pass receptions and 383 yards ahead of his nearest rival, Duke's Ted Moorman.

Kansas Jayhawks Get Chance To Collect Big Eight Crown

Give Kansas Coach Jack Mitchell credit for one of the smartest moves of the 1960 college football season when he shifted John Hadl from halfback to quarterback.

The move was made last spring when Mitchell was faced with the loss of his only signal-caller Duane Morris. Hadl, who made the 1959 All Big Eight team as a halfback, did such a good job then, and in pre-season training that Mitchell never hesitated in keeping him at quarterback.

What has it accomplished? The Jayhawks, now banned by the NCAA from post-season competition in football for a year, still have a chance to take the Big Eight title. They have an overall 4-2-1 record, with the losses com-

ing from Syracuse, when the Orange was considered the nation's top-ranked team, and Iowa, when the Hawkeyes were No. 1.

In the conference, Kansas is undefeated with a 4-0-1 record. Missouri is the conference leader with 5-0.

And behind all of this is the artistry of Hadl, a 19-year old, 191-pound junior from Lawrence, Kan., home town of K.U.

He presently leads the team in passing, punting, kickoff returns, scoring, is second in rushing and punt returns and even has caught a couple of passes for 18 yards.

Minnesota's top-ranked Gophers have linebacker Billy Kautz back from the injured list for this week's game against Purdue. Southern Cal's quarterback, Bill Nelsen, is a doubtful starter against Baylor because of a fractured finger. Ben Charles may start.

Mike Lind, a fullback, returned from Notre Dame's injury list but is not expected to play Saturday night in Miami. Texas will be without fullback Ray Poague and halfback Jack Collins against Texas Christian.

Ex-NY Boss Conferring With Tigers

GLENDALE, Calif. (AP)—Casey Stengel went into conference with executives of the Detroit Tigers today after indicating he "might be interested" in managing the American League team in 1961.

"I want to see if it's a good situation they have, what their plans are for getting ballplayers, and making deals," said the 70-year-old ex-New York Yankee pilot of the sixth place Tigers.

"I do not want to get tangled up with any second division team unless it is willing to make some important changes."

Some observers took that to mean Casey is not at all interested in the Los Angeles Americans, whose roster will be composed of nonexempts from other teams in the league.

Stengel is meeting at his home with Rick Ferrell, chief aide to President John Feter of the Tigers, and Vice President James Campbell.

The game here, Washington's last Big Five clash of the season, is the Huskies' homecoming contest. It has been sold out for a week.

Owens drilled his first and second strings for an hour and a half Wednesday, then kept the third and fourth squads after school for another hour.
