

Canvasback, Redhead Kill Alarming, Observe Game Management People

'If Doubtful Don't Shoot' Warns Agent

Game management agents of this area are expressing alarm over the number of canvasback and redhead ducks being killed here this season.

Jim Cromwell, game management agent for this area for the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, said today that inexperienced hunters appear to be having difficulty in distinguishing the species.

"In case of doubt, don't shoot," he warned.

"Most of the canvasbacks and redheads are to be found along the rivers. Hunters who can't tell them from legal birds should limit their hunting to the open fields, away from the rivers," he cautioned.

Redhead hens are brown with gray wings and pearl gray speculum, he pointed out. The male of the species has a red head, black breast and gray body.

Canvasback hens are grayish in color. The drakes have red heads, black breasts and white bodies.

"These two species were added to the list of protected birds this year because poor nesting conditions in the north have resulted in decreasing populations of these birds," he said.

Numerous arrests have been made for shooting these protected birds and penalties are assessed upon conviction.

Cromwell invited hunters to get copies of the wildlife service's free folders, "Know Your Ducks." They are available from all sporting goods dealers, license agencies and game management agents.

"Swan, fully protected by law for several years, are beginning to move into the basin," he commented. "Hunters are reminded not to shoot these birds. They are much larger than the legal snow geese and have no black markings on their wingtips," he explained.

Wood silhouettes, showing the relative size of the two birds and painted to illustrate the difference in markings, are posted at most of the entrances to public shooting grounds.

"Three or four hundred swan have been noted this week on Spring Lake," Cromwell said. "No snow geese have been seen in that vicinity."

Hunt Luck Only Fair

Hunters seeking birds in Oregon have had only fair success in the past week, the Oregon Game Commission said today. The commission said weekend results probably would be good only for those hunters using dogs.

Elk success also was reported only fair in the face of continuing fair weather over the best hunting areas. Waterfowl prospects appeared somewhat better.

The commission's weekly report by area:

Northwest—Plentiful birds on Sauvie Island. Pheasant hunting in North Willamette Area fair for hunters with dogs. Waterfowl hunting poor along the Willamette from Salem north.

Southwest—Good success expected Saturday and Sunday in Umpqua River Valley extended deer hunt. Waterfowl hunting poor in Rogue River Valley.

Central—Pheasant hunting slow in Wasco, Sherman and Jefferson counties. A dog is a must. Average number of geese on Columbia. Duck population low.

Northeast—Desolation Creek and middle fork of John Day River good for hunters with cow elk permits. Elk only fair in Umatilla District. Meacham also fair. Elk hunting slow in Heppner and Wheeler units and in Union and Baker counties. Wallawa County fair for elk. Pheasants are plentiful in Umatilla County. Bird hunting slowing down in Union and Baker counties. Ducks and geese plentiful on Cold Springs and McKay reservoirs.

Southeast—Elk hunting fair in Silvies, Beulah and Malheur units. Pheasant hunting continues fair in Malheur County. Valley quail hunting good all areas. Large numbers of ducks and geese on Summer Lake and in Warner Valley.

Ex-Irish Still Suffers

CHICAGO (AP)—Notre Dame University is suffering through its longest losing streak in history this season—six games. And former Irish head coach Terry Brennan is suffering right along with the team.

"I've closely followed the team this year," he said today. "It is plagued by injuries and rugged competition has balanced off its strength."

In 1958, his last year as coach, Brennan had a 6-4 season record. His dismissal by Notre Dame stirred up considerable controversy.

Now a business representative for a steel firm, Terry said: "I think everybody has a 20-20 hindsight on whether (present Coach Joe) Kuharich made the right decision or what he should have done or what I should have done," he said.

"A coach has 10 seconds to make up his mind on what to do, and if it works out his record depends on it. I wouldn't want to be the one to say what they should have done."

Notre Dame under Kuharich this year has won one game in seven, its first with California, 21 to 7.

But the Irish are picked as a favorite over the University of Miami in the Orange Bowl Saturday night.

After beating California, the Irish lost in succession to Purdue 51-19, North Carolina 12-7, Michigan State 21-0, Northwestern 7-6, Navy 14-7 and Pittsburgh 20-13.

Bald Eagle Laurel Pick

LAUREL, Md. (UPI)—America's Bald Eagle loomed the probable favorite today to win Friday's renewal of the \$100,000 Washington, D.C., International and become the first horse in history to win the global classic twice.

Eleven horses from six countries have gathered at Laurel race course for the mile and one-half gallop over the grass course with Italy represented in the horse Olympics for the first time.

Also slated to run were Harmonizing from the U.S., France's Puissant Chef and Hautain, Apostle 2nd and Prolific from England, Zabeg and Zadorny from Russia with Zadorny carrying the silks of the Ukraine, Ireland's Farnley Fox, and the Italians, Rio Marin and Santa Severa, a filly.

Harmonizing, picked up from the claiming ranks four months ago, was named yesterday to start in place of the injured Sword Dancer. No immediate odds were listed on the six-year-old son of Counter Point who upset both Bald Eagle and Sword Dancer in the recent Man o'War Stakes at Belmont Park.

Bald Eagle, winner in record time a year ago, is ridden by Manny Ycaza.

Shasta Horse Pays Off Big

MOUNT SHASTA—Reelin Brandy, a big bay racehorse, won half of the daily double at Golden Gate Fields Monday to pay \$1,404 for a \$2 ticket. He is a product of Mount Shasta's horse breeding colony.

Robert Bates, Lassen Lane, produced the colt and owns the dam. As breeder, Bates gets a slice of all purses won by the horse who has been a consistent winner for several months.

Reelin Brandy has a half brother that is now being groomed for the races next year. Bates believes he will be as successful as the now famous big bay that stands at 16½ hands high, and is picked to be a sensation as a 3-year-old.

Vandals' Return Bolsters Idaho

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Idaho's Vandals have fullback Mike Sheeran back in uniform and will face Washington State here Saturday at full strength.

Wilt Nears '59 Mark; Baylor High

Wilt Chamberlain is approaching his league-leading 37.6 average of last season, but Los Angeles' Elgin Baylor continues to top the National Basketball Association in the total points column.

Chamberlain scored 46 points Wednesday night to boost his average this year to 36.0 in the Philadelphia Warriors' 125-118 victory over the Lakers. Wilt's point-production was the highest single game score in the NBA this season.

Baylor, who tossed in 40 points for the Lakers, ran his point total to 310 points for a 10-game average of 31.0. The victory was the seventh straight for the Warriors, who lead the Eastern Division with a 7-0 mark.

The St. Louis Hawks bettered their first place lead in the Western Division by downing the Detroit Pistons, 126-120, in the second game of the NBA doubleheader at St. Louis.

Bob Pettit's 39 points paced the Hawks to their fifth consecutive success and gave them an overall 6-1 record.
