

FG Dept. Decision Posted

SACRAMENTO (UPI) — The California Fish and Game Commission, without even meeting, has announced its 1961 fishing season determinations.

A commission aide said no "determinations" meeting was held this time because "there was not enough controversial matter to require it."

"So," said the aide, "they just discussed it over the telephone."

The determinations contained these two main points:

—Proposals for a year-long fishing season statewide were not even considered in view of an adverse report of the Department of Fish and Game presented at the commission's last meeting.

—The test of skindivers using spear guns to catch rough fish in inland waters flunked. This won't be tried again.

The commission action—failure to hold any determinations meeting—was certain to face a protest in the state legislature from Assemblywoman Pauline L. Davis, D-Portland, chairman of the lower chamber fish and game committee.

Mrs. Davis and Assemblyman Ralph Brown, D-Modesto, have threatened to introduce legislation in 1961 to require that the commission open the doors of its closed meeting for determinations.

But the determinations meeting that brought their threat was held, although unannounced, in San Francisco. This time the commissioners didn't even meet.

State law is not too clear on whether such a meeting is required.

It says merely that the commission must hear proposals at an October meeting and then adopt the fishing season rules at a December meeting. It also mentions that "determinations" must be made public before the December session—but makes no provision for how the commissioners make these determinations.

The adoption meeting will be held Dec. 9 in Los Angeles.

Bald Eagle, Harmonizing Race Picks

LAUREL, Md. (UPI) — Eleven thoroughbreds from six countries are in the \$100,000 Washington, D.C., International at Laurel race course today with America's Bald Eagle, the 1959 winner, favored to repeat in the global classic.

In eight previous runnings no favorite ever has won the mile and one-half gallop over the turf course. Nor has any horse ever been able to win twice, although five others have had two chances in the world renowned race.

Most horsemen expect Bald Eagle to be between 2-1 and 7-5 at post time but Sam Keller, line maker for the track, listed America's second runner, Harmonizing, as a 5-2 favorite on the program.

Bald Eagle, owned by the Cain Hoy Stable of Harry F. Guggenheim, is being ridden by Manny Yacaza, the slashing Panamanian who guided the horse to victory a year ago. Harmonizing, a last minute substitute when Sword Dancer was withdrawn because of an injury, has Ireland-born Johnny Ruane in the saddle.

Also highly regarded are the two French horses, Henri Aubert's Puissant Chief, winner of the Arc de Triomphe, and Mrs. Jean Stern's Hautain who was second in the same race. Maxine Garcia rides Puissant Chief with Leon Flavian on Hautain.

For the first time Italy is represented in the race which in other years had drawn horses from such far away places as Australia, New Zealand and Argentina. The Italians are Raffaele Starazola's Santa Severa and Gino Mantovani's Rio Maria. Enrico Cantici, the 48-year-old "Edie Arcaro" of Italy, rode Santa Severa, a 3-year-old filly, with Silvio Parravanti on Rio Maria.

England and the Soviet Union also have two runners with one from Ireland rounding out the international field.

Cal Poly Fund

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Profits from a football game between Los Angeles State and Long Beach State Saturday at the Rose Bowl in Pasadena will go to the Cal Poly memorial fund, it was announced today.

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OTI Fear Justified; Rain In Aberdeen

Word from Grays Harbor Junior College in Aberdeen, Wash., today justified the Oregon Tech Owls' fear that they would have to play football wet both top and bottom Saturday night.

Chase Anderson, GH coach, said in a telephone conversation, "Yes, the rains finally came . . . and it shows no sign of letting up. It's odd, too . . . we've had so little this year, only about 90 inches."

The rains came to Klamath Falls, too, but not before the Tech squad, which seeks to complete its first unbeaten season against the Chokers this weekend, had hung up practice gear for the final time prior to the game.

The Owls wrapped up their preparations for Grays Harbor Thursday afternoon with both offensive and defensive drills.

In addition to the cloud that spilled belated rain on the Owl practice field, another dark spot loomed when it was learned that sophomore fullback Bud Maupin had sprained an ankle and would probably be unable to perform Saturday night.

The Tech squad and staff had searched the sky for rain that might help produce simulated Aberdeen game playing conditions, but it didn't come until too late.

Grays Harbor, with a 4-win, 2-loss record, has displayed some stingy defensive characteristics. In their six games to date they have allowed their foes only

47 points. Not an overly-strong offensive team, they have scored 78 points of their own.

One of their two losses was a 13-12 stinging at the hands of strong Everett Junior College, the kingdom of Washington State junior colleges.

Led by passer-punter quarterback Rick Fisher, 6-2, 195 pounds, the Choker lineup claims only two men over 200 pounds. Tackles Larry Seovel and Gary Griffith weigh in at 210 and 245 respectively.

At end posts are Bob Izzi 5-11, and Clark Forsberg, 5-11. Guard posts are filled by Dick Fournier, 174, and Jim Randall, 190. Don Yeager, 175, handles the center slot.

With Fisher in the backfield are Wilbur Fennel, 165, and Dave Rees, 170, at halfbacks, and Jerry Olson, 175, at fullback. The Chokers run from a straight T primarily.

Wing Goalie Halts Bruins

Goalie Hank Bassen of the Detroit Red Wings is making the most of the chance in the National Hockey League he sought for six years.

A 28-year-old native of Calgary, Alta., Bassen turned in a brilliant performance Thursday night to lead the Red Wings to a 4-1 victory over the Boston Bruins. It was the fifth straight victory for the Red Wings and enabled them to remain tied for first place with the Montreal Canadiens, who trounced the New York Rangers, 9-7.

Bassen lost his bid for a shutout when Bronco Horvath scored for the Bruins at 17:52 of the third period.

The Canadiens, who trailed, 4-1, in the first period and 7-4 with eight minutes left in the third period, whipped three late goals past U.S. Olympic hero Jack McCartan for their spectacular triumph. Dick Moore tied the score at 11:58 of the third period and Bernie Geoffrion tallied unassisted at 14:34 to put the Canadiens ahead. Moore's two goals gave him a total of 17 in the Canadiens' 16 games.

The varsity is a temporary situation as there will be many changes in personnel for both groups as the need arises. At present 19 men are listed on the roster.

McCullough is seeking guards to replace the three lettermen lost from last season's team. The only remaining letterman who saw action last year is Lloyd Cole, a sophomore from Baker.

Transfer Earl Goldman, and freshmen Roy Reeves, Mike McMahon and Lee Lands seem to be the strongest contenders for the job.

One of the guards from last year who is not out for the varsity this season is senior Ron Jolima who has taken over the coaching duties for the junior varsity.

The 1960-61 schedule opens Dec. 1 when the Wolves meet Willamette University in the first night game in the NAIA Tip-Off Tournament in Salem. Conference action begins in January.

Mackinaw Takes Trip

BEND — A Mackinaw trout, commonly called lake trout, planted by the game commission in Big Cultus Lake in 1958 suddenly got the wanderlust and made an extensive journey through the lake basin area of central Oregon.

During fish population studies conducted at several Cascade lakes and reservoirs this summer by game commission personnel the lake trout was recovered in Little Lava Lake, the first ever reported from this body of water. No previous plant of lake trout was made in Little Lava Lake.

To reach this body of water, the Mackinaw had to migrate out of Big Cultus Lake and into Crane Prairie Reservoir, then up the Deschutes River into Little Lava, a distance of some 13 miles.

The big lake trout weighed 3 1/2 pounds and had been feeding on fingerling trout.

LA, Miami Preferred

GENEVA, Switzerland (AP) — Ingemar Johansson said he prefers Los Angeles or Miami for his third meeting with heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson, and he hopes the bout will be held between January and March. The ex-champion has been training here.
