

## Need For Nursing Home Told To County Board

YREKA—The need for a nursing home to handle ambulatory and old age security patients in Siskiyou County was brought to the attention of the Siskiyou County Board of Supervisors during the Tuesday morning session.

Dr. F. W. Martin, county physician, and W. M. VanOver, county welfare director, appeared before the board with Robert McKean, county hospital administrator, to report.

Dr. Martin commended supervisors for the well-staffed and equipped county hospital.

However, he pointed out that the hospital contains a little more than 100 beds, of which 78 are in use by ambulatory and old age security patients, leaving only about 25 beds for other patients.

Dr. Martin said that some ways and means must be developed to care for these patients. The situation is becoming acute, with more and more patients of this type entering the hospital, he stated, adding that it will soon be necessary to squeeze three beds into a two-bed ward, and eight beds into a six-bed ward. He said that a few beds already have been placed in hallways.

Dr. Martin stated further that facilities should be available to accommodate ambulatory or convalescing patients in order to make room for those acutely ill. He said many patients now in the hospital could be in a nursing home, Dr. Martin said, "It is a fact, the problem is big and very few people want to operate a nursing home in the county."

VanOver told supervisors one person is interested in converting Dunsuir Hotel into a nursing home. He asked supervisors if the exception of W. A. Barr.

Supervisor Don Avery spoke of the nursing home in Etna, whose major problem has been meeting the state fire marshal's requirements.

County Administrator Jess O'Roke said he believes the county board would not object to paying the \$206 for care of nursing home patients.

The board voted to adopt an amendment to the general relief policy, which would authorize payment to a nursing or boarding home for care of ambulatory or old age security patients.

The policy, adopted in 1959, was presented by VanOver. It is a general relief policy which the welfare department uses as a guide to determine eligibility of persons to receive aid or emergency relief. All supervisors voted in favor of the amendment with the exception of W. A. Barr.

## Mix-Up In Bodies Follows Accident

BURLINGAME, Calif. (UPI) — Four attractive airline stewardesses were identical uniforms and hairdos and carried similar handbags and luggage.

They looked enough alike to be called twins, one of them recalled later.

They piled into a taxicab for a trip that one never finished, that led another to a hospital bed with her pretty face swathed in bandages and that resulted in what a coroner called a 10,000 to 1 mix-up in bodies solved only because one of the women had a pearl-inset gold ring.

The taxicab carrying Mary Hawthorne, 26, and Joan Frost, 26, and two other American Airlines stewardesses was involved in a head-on collision near San Francisco International Airport at nearby San Bruno. One of the young women and the taxi driver were killed. The other three women were critically injured.

Miss Hawthorne's purse and identification arrived at the hospital beside the blanket-draped form of the girl who was killed. Airline officials notified Mrs. Elsie Schnell in New York that the body of her daughter, Mary Hawthorne, would be sent home to New York.

Thomas Frost, an employee of a Philadelphia art gallery, was notified that his daughter, Joan, was injured. He and a son flew here to begin their bedside vigil beside the heavily bandaged girl who was in coma.

Today, Mrs. Schnell, who had mourned and made funeral arrangements for the body in New York, exchanged places with a grieving Frost who flew to New York to claim the body of his daughter, Joan.

He collapsed in shock when he was told that the bandaged woman was his daughter.

**Rooney Claims He Can't Pay His Alimony**

SANTA MONICA, Calif. (UPI) — Christmas is a confusing day for five-time married Mickey Rooney.

"I've had so many wives and so many children," said the actor Thursday in court. "I don't know which house to go to first on Christmas."

The 39-year-old Rooney has four children from his marriages and his present wife expects a child in January.

He was in court over \$12,932 in back alimony his fourth wife, Elaine Mahnen, claims he owes her. Rooney claimed he was unable to pay, but Miss Mahnen's attorney charged the actor earned \$425,000 last year and turned all the money over to a corporation the actor controls.

The attorney, Simon Taub, said he would petition Superior Court to appoint a receiver for the corporation to prevent Rooney from evading alimony payments.

Edward Lawson, general manager, said the shutdown will affect some 170 employees and he blamed the fluctuating lumber market.

He said the lumber market was expected to stabilize by mid-December and that the mill should return to full capacity then.

Eight policemen and auxiliary policemen participated in the search.
