

# Maurine Accepts Truce Talk Bid From Hatfield

Mrs. Maurine B. Neuberger, a Democrat fresh from a triumph in the race for U. S. senator from Oregon, said Wednesday night she has accepted a luncheon invitation from Gov. Mark Hatfield, a Republican who backed the loser in the Senate campaign.

"We must cooperate, and we will," Mrs. Neuberger said.

Mrs. Neuberger followed in the footsteps of her late husband, Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, in winning the Senate seat. Her luncheon with the governor will come two years after a similar meeting between Neuberger and Hatfield.

With all but a handful of precincts counted, Mrs. Neuberger drew the largest vote of any candidate on the ballot. Her victory came as Oregon voters showed a remarkable affinity for splitting the ticket.

Vice President Richard M. Nixon, a Republican, took Oregon's six electoral votes; the House delegation was split 2-2, Republicans took two of the three major state offices on the ballot; and the Democrats retained control of the state legislature.

Hatfield extended the luncheon invitation in a telegram Wednesday, saying: "It now behooves us to join forces behind the new administration in our nation's capital and behind projects of mutual interest and concern for the benefit of Oregon."

The governor alluded to that earlier meeting, held shortly after he was elected two years ago and added: "In the spirit of the meeting which I initiated in 1958, and you and Dick so graciously hosted in your home, may I cordially invite you for luncheon Dec. 2 in Salem."

Mrs. Neuberger said later that she had accepted the invitation, and added: "I look forward to it. I've always had a good working relationship with the governor, going back to our days together in the legislature. Maybe we can come to agreement on the national seashore park."

That was an allusion to a favorite project on the late Sen. Neuberger: creation of a national park in the scenic dunes area along the coast in the Florence-Reedsport area. Hatfield in the past showed some opposition to plans for the park.

Mrs. Neuberger added: "We certainly have common interests, and a common interest in success of efforts for the welfare of the state. We must cooperate, and we will. I know Dick always felt the meeting he had with Mark when Mark was elected was very beneficial."

In winning the Senate seat, Mrs. Neuberger defeated a Republican backed by Hatfield—Elmo Smith, a former Oregon governor and

now a newspaper publisher at Albany.

With all but a few precincts in, Mrs. Neuberger piled up a lead of nearly 75,000 in the race for the long term.

Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr., a Republican, won a four-year term to the post he now holds by appointment with a crushing defeat of state Sen. Monroe Sweetland, a Democrat.

Another appointee, state Treasurer Howard Belton, a Republican, rolled over Democrat Ward Cook.

Sweetland still holds his seat in the state senate, but Cook's term expires.

Atty. Gen. Robert Y. Thornton was the only Democrat to win in the races for the top three state government posts. For the second time in a row, he defeated state Sen. Carl Francis of Dayton.

The Republicans also carried the state for Nixon, but his vote was running behind that of Neuberger and Appling.

Republicans also were able to split the state's delegation to the U. S. House. Rep. Walter Norblad, a Republican, easily won his 8th term. Democratic Reps. Edith Green and Al Ullman also won handily. But in the 4th District, Rep. Charles O. Porter was stopped in his bid for a third term by state Sen. Edwin Durno, a Republican from Medford.

While the ticket-splitting was going on, the Democrats held onto the Oregon Senate by a 20-10 majority, and retained control of the Oregon House—but narrowly—31-29.

In a victory statement, Durno said at Medford that he will support the foreign policy of President-elect John F. Kennedy, a Democrat. Durno added: "I have had the experience before in the state senate with working with a large Democratic majority and I feel confident that I will be able to do likewise in the nation's capital."

Porter said he plans to return to his law practice in Eugene.

The Republicans that rode to victory in the statewide races did so despite a Democratic registration lead of about 75,000 persons. State officials had predicted a turnout of about 82 per cent of Oregon's 900,616 registered voters.

With all but a handful of returns in, the presidential race topped all the others in total votes—747,299.

# Cities, Counties Vote Measures Down

Money matters before voters all over Oregon Tuesday got a hard—

**Pacific Power To Buy Systems**

PORTLAND (AP)—The Pacific Power and Light Co. said today it has completed arrangements to buy for \$3,200,000 electric and water service systems in the Rock Springs and Green River areas of Wyoming.

The firm said the systems now are operated by the Southern Wyoming Utilities Co., a subsidiary of the Union Pacific Coal Co., and have 5,900 electric customers and 4,200 water customers in the two areas which produce annual revenues of about \$1,192,000.

Pacific Power and Light also announced that the sale price includes a 20,000 - kilowatt steam-electric generating plant now owned by the Union Pacific Coal Co., another subsidiary of the railroad.

Prior to the transaction, Pacific Power and Light had 41,200 electric customers in the Casper, Big Horn and Wind River areas of Wyoming. It has another 250,000 in Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana.

# Kennedy's Promised Program Faces Several Tough Hurdles In Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—President-elect John F. Kennedy's promised package of economic-welfare measures will face a number of tough hurdles in the first session of the 87th Congress.

But the new chief executive also will have several things in his favor as he tries to put through four proposals which he repeatedly told his campaign crowds would be high on the agenda of a Kennedy administration.

The four are minimum wage liberalization, a medical care program tied to the Social Security system, federal aid to education, and depressed areas legislation.

These have been debated for years: all were hot issues in the last Congress, but failed of enactment because of vetoes or a legislative snarl or just plain lack of votes.

On the debit side for Kennedy in his drive to win passage of the measures will be:

1. The closeness of his popular vote victory, which foes of the measures can interpret as meaning he has no mandate for his program.
2. The falling off of Democratic majorities in both Senate and House.
3. The stiff opposition of many groups and particular economic interests to the four measures; this has contributed heavily to their defeat so far.
4. The likelihood of a continued conservative Democratic - Republican majority on the House Rules Committee. This body has wide roadblock powers, but efforts may be made to trim these when the new Congress meets.

On the credit side:

1. The important powers of a new president, which Kennedy has had a chance to study from the congressional viewpoint for 14 years. These include the appointive power and the job of drawing up the federal budget with all its far-reaching ramifications.
2. The affirmative White House leadership which Kennedy will give in behalf of the measures, in contrast to President Eisenhower's opposition to them.
3. The switch in the chairmanship of the House Labor and Education Committee from conservative Rep. Graham Barden D-N.C., to liberal Rep. Adam Clayton Powell R-N.Y. This committee handles the wage and school bills, Barden is retiring from Congress.

Depressed areas legislation would seem to have the best chance of quick action in the 1961 session. Democrats got such a measure through in 1958 and 1960 but Eisenhower each time killed it with a veto.

The legislation is designed to help areas of high and chronic unemployment attract new industries.

# Cash Puts Life Into Program

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's farm and home loan program for veterans will get back into full swing in February because of voter approval of a \$125 million bond issue. H. C. Sanfield, director of the state Department of Veterans Affairs, said today.

The program has been curtailed for several months because of the lack of authority to issue more bonds.

Sanfield said first priority would be given to the \$15 million in applications now on hand.

He also said that his staff, now 105 persons, would be increased to handle the new loans.

The question of writing a medical care program into Social Security stirred one of the biggest fights of the 1960 session.

In the end Congress rejected this and instead increased greatly the federal share of medical costs under the public assistance program for indigent persons.

But the Senate vote against the Social Security proposal was close and several Democrats said they favored the alternative because Eisenhower had indicated he would veto the Social Security plan. They said they expected medical benefits to be added to Social Security when the time was ripe.

The new Senate will be 64-36 Democratic instead of 66-34 as in the past Congress. In the House, the Democrats apparently lost a net of 22 seats. With 5 races undecided, the lineup so far for the 87th Congress is 257-175 Democratic as compared with 283-154 in the 86th.
