Amateur and professional vocalists from the Klamath community are invited for the second consecutive year to join the chorus that will present Handel's "Messiah" Sunday evening, Dec. 18, at Pelican Court, Klamath Union High School. Comic Shows Election Humor

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (UPI)—In his first public appearance after the election, Sahl said the vote was so close it was "ridiculous. It doesn't seem that we've made up our minds as a nation." Sahl noted that Kennedy earlier had trouble getting administration briefings on foreign policy "But Allen Dulles will go to see him now—it's okay now to give him our secrets." The comic hit equally hard at Kennedy and Republican rival Richard M. Nixon in comments on fatherhood: "I identify myself with Kennedy. I couldn't prove myself to my father, either." "Ike was a sort of father image for Nixon—but it wasn't transferable." The casually dressed Sahl, flailing a newspaper for emphasis, said the press might blame the election outcome on the debates. But he said it was actually a case of "Kennedy didn't win the debates—Nixon lost them." "It's too bad the election has to be lost because of a make-up man's mistakes." Sahl said the debates "didn't tell us anything." He said a typical closing was one in which Kennedy discoursed on the gross national product, while Nixon told voters to "get your children to bed before Truman comes on the air."
