Purdue Dumps Mighty Minnesota 23-14

MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Purdue's Boilermakers, four-time losers with a disdain for the mighty, caught Minnesota Saturday with a first half aerial offensive and whipped the nation's No. 1 ranked football team, 23-14.

With their dream of an unbeaten season and national title fading, the Gophers scored two second half touchdowns but were beaten by Bernie Allen's 35-yard field goal in the third period.

Purdue got a freak touchdown on the game's final play. Allen's rifle arm shot Purdue to two first half touchdowns and a 14-0 lead before Minnesota recovered.

Minnesota swept back on touchdowns by Bill Munsey and Roger Hagberg, but Purdue twice braced in the final four minutes when Minnesota threatened to pull it out.

The loss prevented Minnesota from capturing at least a share of its first Big Ten championship since 1941, although the Gophers can still make it next week against Wisconsin. For Purdue the victory was only No. 3 of the season.

Cadets Fight To 7-7 Tie With Pitt

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Army's Tom Blanda missed a 23-yard field goal attempt with 35 seconds left and the Cadets had to settle for a 7-7 tie Saturday with bowl-minded Pitt.

Blanda, who kicked an all-important field goal in Army's 9-6 upset of Syracuse last week, almost did it again. The ball hit the crossbar and bounced under it into the end zone.

Just a few seconds before, line-man William Douglas signaled that Army had caught Pitt's Johnny Yaccino in the Panthers' end zone for a safety. But Referee Francis P. Brennan ruled Yaccino was downed on the 1-yard line.

A 39-yard run on a pass interception by Ed Shrockman and a conversion by Fred Cox gave Pitt a 7-0 lead in the first quarter. Army tied the score at 7-7 in the third quarter on a one-yard plunge by Alfred Ruszhatz and a conversion by Blanda after Bob McCarthy grabbed a fumble by Pitt's Jim Cunningham on the Panther 28.

Six yards later Ruszhatz drove over guard for the touchdown. Blanda, 173-pound quarterback, set a Cadet record for pass completions, hitting on 24 of 35 for 235 yards.

UCLA Grounds Air Force Cadets 22-0

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Hallback Bill Kilmer of UCLA uncorked a brilliant 88-yard touchdown run from scrimmage and personally grounded the Air Force Cadets, 22-0, in a soggy Memorial Coliseum Saturday.

An outstanding All-America candidate, the tailback in the UCLA single wing attack scored another touchdown from one yard out and started the Bruins to victory in the first quarter with a 29-yard touchdown strike to Chuck Hicks. "Kill-em" Kilmer also has a hand in the other score. He held the ball for a 27-yard field goal by Ivory Jones.

A soaked crowd of 21,914 watched the game as UCLA registered its fifth victory against one defeat by Washington and a tie with Purdue.

The loss was the Cadets' fifth against three wins. Quarterback Rich Mayo kept UCLA agitated but the Falcons could never score. The Air Force got to the Bruin nine but fumbled the ball away in the first quarter. Mayo passed the Cadets 70 of 79 yards in a drive that ended one yard shy of a touchdown as the halftime clock ran out.

Cougars Defeat Tough Idaho On Strong Defense, Punting

MOSCOW, Idaho (AP)—Mel Melin fired three touchdown strikes — two of them to the nation's leading receiver Hugh Campbell — as Washington State beat surprisingly tough Idaho 18-7 Saturday.

Campbell pulled down eight passes during the afternoon for a season total of 60 — just two short of the NCAA record. But it was the strong WSU defense plus a 74-yard punt by All-America candidate Keith Lincoln which kept the Cougars ahead in the final minutes of the game.
