# County Library System Keeps Fresh Supply Of Books At County Schools

No exception is the county library system that keeps a fresh supply of books available in schools throughout the county by means of bookmobiles.

How important this is to school children probably can be put more succinctly than in the words of the youngsters who use the service. The following are comments by members of Fairview School Library Club:

"The library benefits and helps us in our education by providing us with reference books, with books on history and geography, and books and materials giving us facts and information about the earth, things on the earth and about space. It helps us find facts about people and countries and other books that will help us in social studies. Books on religion, sports, useful and fine arts are found in the library. The library will also provide books for reports," said Joyce Smith.

"The library teaches us many new things such as how to use the card catalog and how to find the information on the things we need to know. These are only a few things that we can learn from using the library," says Carolyn Day.

"The library benefits me in my education in many different ways. When I need a reference book for a report, the library provides the book needed. If I want to show a picture in a report, I may check one out. All types of information may be found in the library," states Donna Kettler.

"The library means much to every student. It is useful in a great many ways. In this modern age it is very useful to have a knowledge of space. Also information is needed on the United Nations because these are the days of the cold war. You may find books on countries, biographies, encyclopedias, Atlases, and other books that will help you in social studies. Books on religion, sports, useful and fine arts are found in the library. The library will also provide books for reports," said Joyce Smith.

make-up that followed the ruckuses in the South, it turned out that Tilden needed TWO electoral votes from Oregon, instead of only one.

He lost by ONE vote—184 to Hayes' 185.

This recital is included here in some detail merely as historical data to point out the basic absurdity of the electoral college system. It leaves unanswered a lot of questions. These, for example:

1. Just what IS the electoral college system?
2. How does it work?
3. Most important of all, perhaps: Why did the Founding Fathers—wise, patriotic, dedicated men—come to include in our constitution this institution that now, after the lapse of nearly two centuries, seems to us such a patent absurdity?

There isn't room here today to go into all that. An attempt will be made in this space later to provide some answers to the questions here raised.
