

Surprising Missouri Faces 'All-Or-Nothing' Situation

What's ahead for those surprising Missouri Tigers?

Maybe top national ranking, the Big Eight championship, the Orange Bowl, a perfect season—or disaster this week at the hands of the Kansas Jayhawks.

Each is a possibility and the way heads are rolling among the top teams lately, the latter could almost be labeled a probability. Latest case in point: Minnesota, a 23-14 loser to Purdue Saturday after its amazing football resurgence earned it the top spot a week ago in The Associated Press poll, and had everyone talking Big Ten title, Rose Bowl, undefeated season and national championship.

Now Missouri, which soundly laced Oklahoma 41-19 over the

weekend, faces a similar situation. With the Tigers it is—all-or-nothing proposition. Currently ranked second with an 8-0 record, they seem almost certain to be the No. 1 team in this week's poll.

Kansas Banned

Kansas, which ironically has lost its only games to teams ranked No. 1 at the time (Syracuse and Iowa), is banned from post-season play by the NCAA. But the Jayhawks, which walloped Colorado 34-6 Saturday, have a 5-0-1 Big Eight record compared to Missouri's 6-0. To the winner go the conference spoils, and Mizzou also gets a choice bowl spot, probably the Orange Bowl.

Minnesota, while wounded, is not yet dead. The Gophers can still get a piece of the Big Ten title—and perhaps the nod to go to the Rose Bowl — by beating Wisconsin this week, Iowa, ranked fifth, is assured of part of the conference crown after it demolished Ohio State (No. 3) 35-12.

Iowa, Irish Meet

Iowa winds up its 1960 campaign this week against outsider Notre Dame (1-7). A Minnesota victory would match Iowa's 5-1 conference mark. But the Gophers 27-10 win a week ago over Iowa puts them in the fore if any bowl possibilities arise.

If the Rose Bowl is the place for the Gophers, then they can look forward to meeting Washington, which clinched its second straight Big Five title by beating California 27-7. The sixth-ranked Huskies beat Wisconsin 44-8 in the last Rose Bowl.

Ole Miss Alive

Also very much alive in the Southeastern Conference, not to mention the national picture, is Mississippi, fourth-ranked a week ago. Ole Miss soundly laced Tennessee 24-3 and can clinch the SEC title and a spot to defend its Sugar Bowl title by beating Mississippi State this weekend.

Also ready to go a-bowling, with perhaps one exception, are the other four teams in the select top ten. The exception is 8th-ranked Navy, which must beat Army Nov. 25 before it is free to accept any postseason bids. The Middies (8-1) ran Virginia's losing string to 25 with a 41-6 victory.

Duke Prominent

Duke (No. 7), which clinched at least a tie for the Atlantic Coast Conference title by beating Wake Forest 34-7, is prominently mentioned for the other spot in the Orange Bowl. The Blue Devils play traditional rival North Carolina Saturday to wind up conference play and a win, or loss by second-place N. C. State, gets the title.

Arkansas (No. 9) needs only to beat Texas Tech this weekend to nail down at least part of the Southwest Conference crown. The Razorbacks have a 5-1 mark after beating winless Southern Methodist 26-3. Second-place Rice must beat Texas Christian this week, then Baylor if it hopes to gain a tie for conference honors.

Field Goals Pay

Auburn, ranked tenth, once more relied on Ed Dyer's trusty toe for three field goals in a 9-6 victory over Georgia. Dyer now has 12 for the season and 26 for his career, both national records. Auburn and Florida (5-1) are tied for second. In the SEC Florida finished league play with a 21-1 victory over Tulane and received a bid to the Gator Bowl. It will decide after its game with Miami Nov. 26.

Unfinished Business

There is unfinished business elsewhere this weekend. Yale can cop the Ivy League crown and its first unbeaten season since 1910 by beating Harvard. The Elis crushed Princeton's title hopes with a 43-22 drubbing to run their record to 8-0, and 6-0 in the Ivy. Utah State, 9-0 over-all and 6-0 in the Skyline Conference, can win the title by beating second-place Utah, 6-1 in league play. State easily handled College of the Pacific 45-6.

Illinois Pro Walks Away With Loot

MEXICO CITY (UPI)—Howie Johnson, 35-year-old professional from Coghlin, Ill., captured the \$10,000 Mexican National Open Sunday with a 15-under-par 273 against stiff international competition from other golfers from the United States, Canada, South America and Europe.

Starting off the closely bunched field on the final day, the six-foot-three veteran, who hails originally from St. Paul, Minn., shot the best tournament score of his professional career after taking the lead at the halfway point with a course record round of nine-under-par 63. Despite heavy pressure, Johnson went all out Sunday with a 69 as his rivals decreased his margin from hole-to-hole.

The winner finished two strokes ahead of the hard-charging Billy Maxwell of Oceanside, Calif., and three ahead of Spain's Ramon Sota; Roberto De Vicenzo, three times winner of the Mexican Open and Jack Sellman of Houston, Maxwell had a 67 Sunday while Sota carded a 68 and De Vicenzo, who had a hole-in-one Saturday, settled for a 70.

In fourth place with a four-day total of 277 was Bob Stone of Junction City, Kan., one stroke ahead of Dave Marr of Houston and two in front of Tony Corda of Mexico City. Tied for seventh were Tommy Hanson of Sand Springs, Okla., Ernie Vossler of Fort Worth, Tex., Frank Boynton of Orlando, Fla., and Jack Cupit of Hot Springs, Ark.

LA Charger Hold Solidified; Raiders Gain Sweet Revenge

The Los Angeles Chargers, leading the Western Division in the American Football League, solidified their hold on the top spot by beating Houston's Eastern pacemakers in a game that may be replayed for the circuit's championship later in the season.

The Chargers boosted their record to 6-3—the same as the Oilers — by edging Houston 24-21 Sunday for a one-game edge over the runner-up Dallas Texans.

The Texans hopped over Denver into second place by whipping the Broncos 34-7 while Oakland upended the Buffalo Bills 20-7 in the other games on the AFL program. Charger quarterback Jack Kemp hit end Ralph Anderson with two scoring passes in the first quarter to send the Chargers into a 14-0 lead, and they never relinquished it despite some passing heroics by George Blanda.

Blanda, former Chicago Bear star, threw three touchdown passes. Four of his tosses were intercepted.

It was sweet revenge for the Oakland Raiders, who had lost to

Buffalo Oct. 23 by a 38-9 score. Halfback Tony Teresa raced 83 yards for a touchdown on the last play of the third quarter to give Oakland a 20-0 lead. Buffalo's lone touchdown came with only 13 seconds left to play.

Billy Post crashed over from the one in the first period for Oakland's first score, and Larry Barnes accounted for the other

Oakland points with two field goals and two conversions.

Favorable breaks, the ledger-main of Abner Haynes and the passing and running of Cotton Davidson, Curley Johnson, Bo Dickson and Johnny Robinson were too much for Denver as Dallas won a wacky game from the Broncos.

It was a costly game for the losers. Al Carmichael, their right halfback, suffered a broken left leg and will be lost for the season. Haynes was in the middle of everything, putting on key blocks, catching long passes and fumbling. David Webster intercepted a pass and ran 39 yards for a touchdown. Haynes raced seven for another, Johnson scored on a 36-yard pass and Robinson ran four yards for another touchdown. Jack Spikes kicked two field goals and four extra points as his contribution.

Denver took a 7-0 lead in the first quarter, with Dave Rolle scoring on a one-yard blast, maxing a 54-yard drive, but that was all it could do.

Bantam Title Bout Slated On Weekend

Undefeated Eder Jofre of Brazil and Mexico's Eloy Sanchez clash in Los Angeles Friday night for the American National Boxing Association's recognition as world bantamweight champion.

Each has agreed that the winner will meet France's Alphonse Halimi, the European-recognized king of the 118-pounders.

The 15-rounder won't be broadcast or telecast in the United States.

Len Matthews, top-ranking lightweight contender from Philadelphia, faces hard-hitting Alfredo Urbina of Mexico in a ten-rounder at the Philadelphia arena tonight. Matthews has a 28-3-2 record, including 19 knockouts. Urbina's record is 27-4-2, including 19 kayos.

Cuba's Isaac Logart, onetime welterweight contender, meets Puerto Rican-born Jose Gonzalez in the feature 10-rounder at New York's St. Nicholas Arena tonight. Logart's record is 60-14-7 compared to the younger Gonzalez' 15-3-1.

Middleweight Henry Hank (46-12-2) of Detroit takes on Ace Armstrong (18-2-1) of Elizabeth, N. J., in a television 10-rounder — ABC TV, 10 p.m., EST — at New York's Madison Square Garden Saturday night. Hank is ranked sixth among the 160-pounders.

Joey Giambra, another middleweight contender, faces rugged Rory Calhoun of White Plains, N. Y., Tuesday night in Giambra's hometown of Buffalo, N. Y.

The same night in Boston, Tom McNeely, unbeaten, Arlington, Mass., meets George Logan of Boise in a return bout. McNeely stopped Logan on cuts in their first clash.

Luis Rodriguez, the unbeaten Cuban welterweight contender who is clamoring for a title fight, opposes Yama Bahama at Miami Beach, Fla., Wednesday night.

Florentino Fernandez' fifth-round technical knockout of Phil Meyer in the Saturday night TV fight has earned the left-hooking Cuban a Jan. 28 TV date in Madison Square Garden. Matchmaker Teddy Brenner said he would book the hard-hitting invader against Joey Giambra, Marcel Pignon or a middleweight of that caliber.

Leg Injury Expensive For Eagles

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Fullback Clarence Peaks, enjoying his best year in professional football, was lost to the Philadelphia Eagles for the remainder of the season today because of a broken leg.

Peaks suffered a fracture of the fibula just above the ankle of his right leg in the second period of Sunday's 19-13 Eagle victory over the Washington Redskins here.

The injury was regarded as a severe blow for the Eagles in their battle with the New York Giants for the championship of the National Football League's Eastern Conference.

The fullback burdens will fall on rookie Ted Dean, who replaced Peaks in the lineup in Sunday's game.

Royals Lose To Detroit

Detroit's ability to provide three good rookies against Cincinnati's hotshot newcomer, Oscar Robertson, is beginning to offset the Royals' early surge in the National Basketball Association. The Pistons defeated Cincinnati for the third straight time this season, 125-113, Sunday night as their first-year trio accounted for more than half of Detroit's point total. Don Ohl of Illinois led with 31, Jackie Moreland of Louisiana Tech netted 24 and George Lee of Michigan had 12.

Robertson and Jack Twyman each scored 34 points for Cincinnati, but the ineptness of their teammates sent the Royals down to their fourth straight loss. The Royals started the season by winning four in a row.
