

Davis, Britt Are Married

HOLLYWOOD (UPI) — Sammy Davis Jr. and May (pronounced My) Britt, married only Sunday in a Jewish ceremony, faced the prospect today of having to part temporarily because of the blonde actress' health.

Miss Britt, 24, was suffering from a minor virus ailment which prevented her from attending her own wedding reception Sunday night along with her Negro husband and a score of top Hollywood stars, including Frank Sinatra and Peter Lawford and his wife, sister of President-elect Kennedy.

The couple had hoped to leave today for a combined honeymoon and show business engagement in San Francisco where Davis, 34, opens Tuesday at a local theater.

A spokesman said Miss Britt would have to remain home today if she weren't feeling better. He said in that case Davis would go on as planned and Miss Britt would join him as soon as she has recovered, probably within several days.

Leaves Early

Davis remained with about 200 persons at the reception atop the Beverly Hilton Hotel for only about an hour before returning to his home overlooking famed Sunset Strip where his bride remained.

Davis refused to allow guests to cut an eight-tier wedding cake, saying, "If she (Miss Britt) can't cut it, it's not worth cutting. We'll save it till she can cut it."

Davis had the five-foot cake dismantled and removed to his home. The cake's cost was estimated at \$5,000.

In the 20-minute ceremony restricted to a select group of about 30 friends and relatives, Davis and Miss Britt were wed in the afternoon at his home in a Jewish service presided over by Rabbi William M. Kramer. Sinatra was best man.

Miss Britt was dressed in a white dress and managed to smile despite her illness. Davis wore a black suit.

Both Are Converts

Both Davis and Miss Britt are converts to Judaism.

"It gives us more ties together," Miss Britt said. "In any (racially) mixed marriage they are doubly needed."

"I'm silly happy," shouted Davis at a press conference held for nearly 50 reporters and photographers from throughout much of world who went to his house.

"I would like to take the opportunity to thank the American people for the acceptance they gave us," he said. "We got hundreds and hundreds of letters from people who wished us luck and happiness and said they hoped our marriage worked."

Davis said he hoped there would be no more unpleasant incidents such as picketing which occurred in London and Hollywood protesting his engagement to Miss Britt earlier in the year.

Among those attending the reception were Miss Britt's parents who came here from Sweden, Edward G. Robinson Jr., Diana Dors, Janet Leigh, Leo Durocher, Shirley McLaine and Milton Berle.

Stock Raising Is Becoming Lead Industry

REDMOND (AP)—Central Oregon's Deschutes is being converted from a cash crop county to one of livestock production, County Agent Jim McAllister said Thursday.

He said beef cattle, dairy cattle and sheep are providing an increasingly important income source.

Census figures this year show the county has 27,000 acres of cropland pasture, compared with only 8,500 in 1955 and 9,500 acres last year. McAllister pointed out, though, that a change in census classifications may have something to do with new figures.

Deschutes showed decreases in grain, potato and clover seed acreages and the number of turkeys dropped from 44,000 to 17,000 in the past five years.

In contrast beef cows increased in number from 8,000 to 8,500, dairy cows from 3,500 to 5,000 and other cows from 14,500 to 16,000.

Sheep and hog numbers also are up several hundred.

To Build Bridge

PORTLAND (AP)—The Bureau of Public Roads today disclosed plans to build a 617-foot-long reinforced concrete bridge over the Umpqua River near Tyee.

It is part of a timber access road project. The bridge will be on Tyee Road near the Tyee community, northwest of Roseburg.

Bids for the bridge construction will be opened here Dec. 5.

BEARLY ABLE TO VOTE

HOKKAIDO, Japan (UPI)—Representatives of Bekkai village, on Japan's northernmost island of Hokkaido, have told the local election supervisors committee that the villagers will vote in the Nov. 20 general election only if the committee "guarantees" their safety from the wild bears that infest the area.

900 Expected To Attend California NRA Meeting

For the first time in eight years, the National Reclamation Association is bringing its annual convention to California.

The three-day meeting will open at Bakersfield on Nov. 16, and Kern County groups and the Irrigation Districts Association of California have prepared a program packed with varied events. The association, NRA's largest affiliate, will simultaneously be celebrating its 50th anniversary.

Advance registrations indicate that attendance at the convention may well exceed the record of 907 delegates set at the Phoenix Convention in 1941.

Two 60-mile tours of the Bakersfield area have been arranged for convention delegates. One will cover the area's wine-growing and producing district and will also include a visit to the largest cattle-feeding operation in the West. The other tour will include visits to oil refineries, cotton-ginning facilities, and some famous harness-racing stables.

Following the convention, the Pacific Gas and Electric Company will sponsor a tour of its Kings River Project and the Haas Underground Powerhouse.

Featuring the convention program will be a morning-long panel discussion by four outstanding authorities of a problem on which the future of the Reclamation movement in the West may be at stake—the question of which benefits are to be counted in estimating the value of a given proposed reclamation project to the nation.

The panel will be moderated by Theodore Schad, executive staff director of the U.S. Senate Select Committee on National Water Resources. The speakers will be Prof. Emory N. Castle of Oregon State College, who will state the problem and define the issues; James van Loben Sels of the Southern Pacific Company, who will discuss the effect of reclamation projects upon the transportation industry and upon the general economic development of the West; Dr. Elroy Nelson of the First Security Corporation of Salt Lake City, who will speak about the relation of the reclamation movement to general business conditions; and James K. Carr, chairman of the California State Water Commission, formerly a consultant to the U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs, who will talk about the economic-benefits issues as they relate to the approval of reclamation projects by Congress.

Another convention speaker will be Sen. Wallace F. Bennett of Utah. Senator Bennett will talk on wilderness legislation, the saline water program and problems involved in sugar beet legislation, as well as states' water rights.

Gets More Aid

KARACHI, Pakistan (AP)—Finance Minister Mohammad Shoaib says the United States has agreed to provide Pakistan with \$90 million in defense aid this year, \$10 million more than last year's amount. He gave his report at a news conference Friday on his return from a visit to Washington.

Elizabeth Taylor Back In Hospital In Terrible Pain

LONDON (AP)—A spokesman for Elizabeth Taylor's studio said today "a terrible headache causing almost unbelievable pain" had sent the beautiful actress back to a hospital.

"It hit her a little before 9 o'clock last night," said the spokesman, "and the headache was so awful that it alarmed everyone—including her doctors."

Weeping and clutching her head, Miss Taylor was carried from her hotel on a stretcher and rushed to the hospital in an ambulance.

The spokesman said her personal physician, Dr. Carol Goldman, and one of Queen Elizabeth II's doctors, Lord Evans, were "worried and puzzled."

Neither would immediately answer reporters' questions.

Both were extremely cautious—for good reasons.

For weeks the actress had been reported suffering from a mysterious virus that brought on high temperatures in the afternoon.

Unable to diagnose the cause of the fever at her penthouse apartment in a London hotel, the doctors ordered her into the London Clinic on Oct. 30.

They made several tests on her and she was allowed to leave the clinic three days after being admitted.

The fever still persisted, however.

Last week she complained of a severe tooth ache. X-rays were taken and an abscessed tooth discovered.

A dentist pulled it and her fever went down.

Jubilantly, Miss Taylor's fourth husband, Eddie Fisher, told reporters that at last the cause of her lengthy illness seemed to be solved.

Miss Taylor's studio, 20th Century-Fox, shared Fisher's joy.
