

Oregon Forests Bring \$49,176,600

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U. S. Forest Service reports that federal forest lands in Oregon brought in \$49,176,600 in the year ended June 30.

It said 25 per cent of these receipts from the 14 forests in the state go to the state for apportionment in counties for schools and national leases.

Another 10 per cent is used by the government for forest roads and trails in Oregon.

The funds come mainly from timber sales, but also from grazing permits and power and recreation leases.

Here are the forests and fiscal year 1960 receipts as reported by the Forest Service:

Russians Aided In Liberating, Declares Fidel

HAVANA (AP)—Three Russians helped the Cubans liberate their island from Spain during the war 62 years ago, the Castro-controlled newspaper El Mundo said Friday.

The power gave front-page attention to a Cuban news agency dispatch from Moscow that bases the claim on information in the national archives there.

The archives disclose, said the news agency, that a Russian ship sailed from Leningrad — then called St. Petersburg — to Cuba in 1898. Three Russians aboard fought six months with the insurgent forces of Gen. Antonio Maceo and Guillermo Moncada, but were captured and sentenced to death. They were freed through the intervention of the Russian consul in Havana, the agency said.

Propagandists for Fidel Castro have been trying to rewrite Cuban history lately to show that United States, rather than helping to free Cuba, entered a war already won from Spain to gain economic penetration.

Many Doctors Get Walking Papers In U.S.

CHICAGO (AP)—Nearly 2,500 foreign-trained physicians working as staff members, residents or interns in American hospitals have been given their walking papers.

They failed to pass recent examinations testing their qualifications by American standards.

Many of them in America on student visas issued under the exchange program face return to their home countries. Others, with permanent immigrant visas, will be required to leave the hospitals or take lesser non-clinical positions. Some may be kept on an emergency basis in certain hospitals where their sudden removal would pose a hardship problem.

Dr. Dean Smiley, executive director of the Educational Council for Foreign Medical Graduates, said in an interview today that the examinations were given to 8,713. A total of 3,776 passed with scores of 75 or better. A second group of 2,456 scored from 70 to 75 and were given a two-year extension. They must pass with a higher mark to stay on after that.

The 2,401 failures, Dr. Smiley said, are employed in hospitals in various parts of the nation.

U.S. Hits Cuba Trials Of Citizens

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States charged Saturday that Cuba's trial and execution of three Americans last month was carried out in a "Roman circus atmosphere."

It also charged that Premier Fidel Castro's regime was guilty of "inhuman behavior" in refusing to release the bodies to relatives for burial.

The State Department released the text of a scathing formal protest handed to the Cuban Foreign Ministry in Havana Friday by U.S. Charge d'Affaires Daniel M. Braddock. The note said Cuban authorities had "failed to observe basic civilized standards."

The executed Americans were charged with having participated in an alleged invasion of eastern Cuba on Oct. 5. They were Anthony Zarba, 28, Somerville, Mass.; Robert Otis Fuller, 25, Miami, and Allen Dale Thompson, 36, Queen City, Tex., and Moorington, La.

Zarba was tried Oct. 12 and executed the next day. Fuller and Thompson were tried Oct. 15 and executed the following day.

The State Department said that in both cases the defendants were denied "fundamental, humanitarian rights," had no opportunity to prepare a defense, and were forced to make appeals "less than one hour after the verdicts in both cases."

Zarba, the note said, was "not able to confer with any lawyer prior to his trial" and his appeal was "denied after only 15 minutes of deliberation." Appeals by Fuller and Thompson were denied "after only 10 minutes of deliberation."

The department said the United States "is compelled to reach the conclusion that the three were given death rather than prison sentences because of their U.S. citizenship." It said that Cuban citizens charged with the same offense were given only prison terms.

335,900 Acres Burned Over

PORTLAND (AP)—The Bureau of Land Management today reported 1,195 fires swept across more than 335,900 acres of BLM lands last summer in the worst fire season in 30 years.

Edward Woolley, BLM director, said rehabilitation work on the burned area, under a \$1,425,000 special appropriation by Congress, is well along. This includes grass seeding and preparing sites for spring tree planting.

Idaho was hardest hit as 368 fires burned 121,000 acres. Alaska had 195 fires that blackened 86,745 acres and Oregon had 188 fires that swept 79,640 acres.

Ike Suggests Sharing Food

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP)—President Eisenhower has given a go-ahead for his representative to discuss transfer of government power to the new Democratic regime.

He has suggested that Americans observe Thanksgiving Day by helping send food to less fortunate people around the world.

In proclaiming Nov. 24 as annual Thanksgiving Day, he called on Americans to contribute to voluntary relief agencies which have been shipping food packages overseas.

Eisenhower issued his annual proclamation as he relaxed on the Augusta National golf course on the fourth day of his Georgia vacation.

"Let us hope that some day, under a benevolent providence and through the best use of the world's God-given resources, each nation will have reason to celebrate its own Thanksgiving Day," Eisenhower said.

The President disclosed Friday.
