Cassady, Kreutzer Picked As 4-H All-Star Members

YREKA — Wendy Cassady, 16, Young, Willow Creek, food preparation; Fred Jones, Etna, forestry; Doug Jenner, Etna, garden; County's 4-H Club all-star members during the annual 4-H Achievement Day program at Winema Hall at the county fairgrounds here recently.

Etna 4-H Club was named the county's outstanding club for the second consecutive year. Nancy Mathews, the club's president, received the award from Glenn Barnes, director of the county Farm Bureau.

The Etna club also won the herdsman trophy, presented by Mrs. Blair Smith, president of Siskiyou County Cow Belles organization.

Shirley Brooks, Delphi 4-H Club, received the Klamath Dairy Association award for outstanding accomplishment in dairy project work. Ken Waters of Big Springs, a club leader, made the award.

Millie Miller, Big Springs 4-H Club, won the Siskiyou County Cattleman's Association award for economical beef feeding. Norman Sears, Montague, association director, made the presentation.

The all-star cap insignia and pin were presented to Kreutzer by Ralph King, president of the Yreka Lions Club, and to Miss Cassady by Marge LaFever, president of Yreka Business and Professional Women's Club.

Those organizations annually sponsor the all-star award winners as delegates to the all-star convention in Berkeley.

Bill Ruddiman, county 4-H adviser, presented white all-star sweaters and insignia. They were a gift of state Sen. Randolph Collier, Yreka.

The meritorious service to 4-H plaque went to Ralph King, Yreka Lions president, in recognition of the club's 11-year sponsorship of the all-star youth. Mr. and Mrs. Ed Mathews received a similar award. Both were presented by Jim Davidson, Greenhorn 4-H Club leader.

Phil Robustelli, active in 4-H work for a long time, presented official seals to charter clubs. Four Killed In Mishaps

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Fourteen persons were killed during the weekend in Northern California traffic accidents.

Four of the victims died in San Joaquin Valley.

The other dead included: Mrs. Rena Avelar, mother of five children, was killed Sunday in a three-car accident at a ranslick intersection near her home at Citrus Heights, a suburb of Sacramento.

Sophie Schoomover, 30, Santa Cruz, was fatally injured Sunday when she was struck by a car as she crossed a street in front of her home.

Frank Barry Boylin, 17, Sonora, was killed Saturday night in a head-on collision involving his car and a sports car on Highway 49 north of Sonora.

Urige S. Whiffen, 59, Stockton, was fatally injured Saturday night when he was struck by a car as he crossed a street in Stockton.

Donald E. Hetzel, 9, San Pablo, was killed Saturday when he ran in front of a car on Highway 40 near San Pablo.

Ruth Evelyn Alton, 53, Richmond, died Saturday shortly after the car in which she was riding skidded on rain-slick Nimitz Freeway and crashed into a dividing strip near Oakland.

Michael Ann Hazlewood, 15 months, and August William Niehaus, 31, both of Clovis, were killed Friday when a car driven by the baby's mother crashed broadside into a bitane truck operated by McBain.

Robert L. Niehaus, 31, Capitola, was killed Friday when his pickup truck collided with a sports car near Santa Cruz and plunged down a 50-foot embankment.

Mrs. Apolinaria Leyva, 39, Yuba City, was killed late Friday when her car crashed head-on into another automobile on rain-slick El Centro Road near Yuba City.

Mrs. Emilia Sheveleff, 72, San Francisco, died today of injuries suffered Sunday night when she stepped in front of a car driven by Louis Katz, 76, San Francisco.

County Supervisors Allow Time On Airport Plan

YREKA—County supervisors allowed Leo Purington additional time to think over their airport rental proposal, during a board meeting here last week.

Purington leases Siskiyou County Airport six miles north of the Montague. Supervisors are asking \$130 per month for the next five years. The board made the decision during an earlier meeting, when county officials recommended supervisors rent the airport for \$600 per year, its hangar and facilities for \$950 and an additional 3.1 acres for \$300.

Those officials were Jess O'Roke, county administrator; L. D. "Babe" Taylor, county assessor, and F. H. Christiansen, county airport coordinator.

HAILS NATO ALLIANCE BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—A U.S. representative to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization said Friday the organization probably is the most important alliance the United States now has.

Gen. Clark L. Ruffner, a member of the military committee and standing group of NATO, told a world peace luncheon here during Veterans Day ceremonies the importance of the group may be measured by the fact Russia regards its breakup as a foremost political objective.

Purington's lease expired Nov. 9. He protested the new rate and called it exorbitant. Purington said other airports in the region with better facilities rent for less. In some instances, he said, airport managers receive a salary.

Purington also struck at a clause in the proposed contract that would place the burden on his wife and family in the event of his death.

He explained to supervisors reasons for complaints that fuel service has been poor at the airport. Purington said until supervisors raised the rental he hired a youth to provide aircraft fuel service for \$300 per month, though the gasoline pumped was worth only about \$50. He has since stopped providing such service, Purington stated.

He said pilots needing fuel may contact him or his assistant at

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Montague Municipal Airport. Meanwhile, supervisors heard but made no decisions concerning a request by Joe Mihaci, an aircraft mechanic formerly employed by Purington, and Bud Davis, Fort Jones, for lease of seven acres of airport property. Davis and Mihaci said they planned establishing a combination maintenance and rental hangar. A motel and restaurant would be added later, they said.

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Council Will Let Bids On Razing 2 Buildings

DORRIS—The city council, during a meeting this month, decided to get bids for razing the Homestead and Mom's Cafe buildings and to have the lots cleaned.

Councilmen acted on a letter by the referee in bankruptcy, U.S. District Court, Sacramento, stating that a trustee in the bankruptcy case filed a report stating that the case involves no assets. The trustee asked abandonment of the lots on grounds they are of no value to the bankrupt estate.

Since no liens are outstanding against the property, councilmen made their decision.

The property is a portion of 232 tax title lots purchased by the city a few years ago.

Bidders will be required to post a \$100 cash performance bond and do the work within 90 days.

The council also rented a 10-yard dump truck and hired a driver from American Forest Products Corporation at Dorris for \$10 per hour to haul cinders for several city streets. Councilmen will obtain the combination for five days.

In other action, the council: 1. Accepted an offer from a firm to clean the interior of the city water tank when the company makes its annual inspection.

2. Approved expenditure of \$1,000 in gasoline tax funds for engineering services concerning streets in the city.

3. Heard a report that Oscar Piemme, Yreka engineer, has begun a preliminary cost survey of the proposed sewage system for Dorris.

4. Approved a motion by Councilman Bob Carnini that the city clerk inquire about the Tulelake city attorney and other lawyers qualified to serve Dorris.

Carnini said city attorneys elsewhere attend city meetings and are able to give immediate counsel in most cases. Councilmen agreed that though Albert Tebbe, Yreka attorney, is paid a \$25 monthly retainer fee, he has not attended a Dorris council meeting for five years.

YREKA—George van Buskirk, manager of the Yreka office of the state Department of Employment claims service will be extended to Etna, Happy Camp, Fort Jones and Dorris.

Unemployment claims will be processed in Etna Nov. 15 at 10 a.m., in Happy Camp Nov. 18 at 10 a.m., in Fort Jones Nov. 22 at 9:30 a.m., and at Dorris Nov. 22 at 10 a.m.

According to Van Buskirk, processing will be done at the city hall of each of these towns with the exception of Happy Camp, where meetings will be arranged at Happy Camp Grange Hall.

Meetings will be held in those four cities each alternate week until they are no longer required. Van Buskirk stated the meetings are arranged for more convenience of filing claims and to lessen the work load of the central office at Yreka, he said.

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Democrats Hold In Most States

CHICAGO (AP) — Democrats still are in control of most of the nation's state legislatures in spite of a surge Nov. 8 of Republican representation in many state governing bodies.

There were contests in 45 states in last Tuesday's election.

Republicans reversed the Democrats' control of both house and senate in Idaho and Ohio. They took the South Dakota Senate from the Democrats and won the house in Connecticut, Illinois, Iowa, Montana, Wisconsin and Wyoming.

The GOP also retained the house in South Dakota and the senate in Wyoming, Wisconsin, Iowa and Illinois.

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Sen. Morse Due Seniority

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., is due for seniority advancement on two committees when the 87th session of Congress convenes next January.

Openings in committee rankings are caused by election results, of course, and also by retirement and death.

Morse is in line to move from fifth to third ranking member of the Labor committee, and from sixth to fifth rank on the Foreign Relations Committee.

He is to continue as second ranking member of the District of Columbia Committee and in similar rank on the Joint Committee on District of Columbia Expansion.

Mrs. Maurine Neuberger, who won election from Oregon to her late husband's seat in the Senate, will receive committee assignments when Congress convenes.

Because her service starts with the date of election, she will have a slight seniority edge on other freshman senators.

Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., is to move from eighth to sixth ranking position on the Education and Labor Committee, and will retain her position as 12th ranking member of the House Administration Committee.

Rep. Walter Norblad, R-Ore., will continue as third ranking Republican on the Armed Services Committee and Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., will remain 12th ranking member of the Interior Committee.

Edwin R. Durno, a Republican who unseated Rep. Charles O. Porter, a Democrat, in Oregon's 4th District, will be assigned to committees in January. Porter held the seventh ranking position on the Post Office and Civil Service Committee.

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
