Argentina
Greets
Governors

BUENOS AIRES (AP)—Twenty-nine U. S. governors and their wives Monday started their second round of sightseeing as official guests for the 150th anniversary of Argentina's independence.

President Arturo Frondizi headed the group of Argentine officials who greeted the governors Sunday. U. S. Ambassador Roy Rubottom provided them with a private briefing at the beginning of their eight-day tour through this country.

There was reportedly much discussion between the Argentine officials and their guests of the need to increase trade between the United States and Latin America and otherwise improve relations to offset the Communist influence in the Western Hemisphere represented by Prime Minister Fidel Castro's Cuban government.

Early their first day the governors placed a wreath at the Buenos Aires monument to Argentina's war of independence. They went on to hear a lecture on the economy and culture of Argentina and to take a yacht trip through the canals of the delta of the Plata River.

Gov. Stephen L. R. McNichols of Colorado brought a message from President-elect John F. Kennedy. He said Kennedy told him by telephone he wanted Latin Americans to know he is "looking forward to a vigorous re-establishment of the good neighbor policy as it was understood under the terms of Franklin D. Roosevelt."

Quake Hits
Off Islands

SEATTLE (AP)—A quake strong enough to have damaged a settled area but not severe enough to cause a tidal wave was recorded in the region of the Aleutian Islands, off Alaska, Sunday.

Frank Neumann, seismologist at the University of Washington, said instruments showed the magnitude of the tremor was 6 on the Richter scale. He was the one who said it could have damaged a populated area but not have caused a tidal wave.

Neumann said the epicenter of the quake was 2,350 miles from Seattle, and shocks lasted about two hours.

At Meeting

VANCOUVER, Wash. (AP)—The new president of the Oregon-Washington Farmers Union is Robert Elkins of Mblalla.

He was elected Saturday at the close of a three-day meeting here. Elkins moves up from vice president to replace Russell Sires, Redmond, Wash., who was named vice president.

Fulton MacGill of Independence, Joe Jaross of Hillsboro, Ed Zimmerman of Sublimity and Paul Youngman of McMinnville were elected as Oregon's board members.

Washington directors are Charles Cutting of Enumclaw and William Scott of Sunnyside.

Sires was elected delegate to the organization's national convention in Washington, D. C. His alternate is Cecil Holtman, Independence, Ore.

Members passed a resolution opposing the proposed intertie that would send Bonneville Power Administration electricity from the Northwest to California.

A resolution upholding the right of farm laborers to organize was adopted.

Oregon delegates passed a resolution opposing the scheduled move of the Northwest regional post office from Portland to Seattle. Jaross said that Postmaster General Arthur Summerfield ordered the move to create jobs for friends of the outgoing administration because these would be vacated by employees refusing to move from Portland.

The Oregon delegates also criticized Gov. Mark Hatfield for "frequent trips" out of the state and urged adoption of a constitutional amendment creating the office of lieutenant governor.

Turks Have
New Leader

ANKARA, Turkey (AP)—General Gursel, 65, emerged today as political leader of Turkey after firing 14 members of the revolutionary government that took over after the ouster of Premier Adnan Menderes last May.

Gursel told correspondents Sunday night the shakeup strengthened the moderate wing of the revolutionary government and "put an end to discord within the country's ruling National Unity Committee."

Heading the list of those dismissed was Col. Alpaslan Turkesh, an extreme nationalist who once supported the union of all Turkish speaking people including those living in the Soviet Union.

His chief rival, Maj. Gen. Cemal Madanoglu, was among officers appointed to a new 23-member National Unity Committee announced by Gursel.
