

## AAUW Will Hear Talk By Hungarian Refugee

A former resident of Hungary, who experienced Communist rule and its results, Tibor Kalman, will speak to the Monday Luncheon Group of AAUW, Nov. 21 at the Winema Hotel. His topic will be "How People Live and Feel Behind the Iron Curtain."

Kalman at the present time is teaching music in Tulelake High and Elementary schools.

He was born in Eperjes, Hungary, and has devoted his life to music.

He was a violinist in the Budapest Symphony Orchestra and was a member of the Mikolc String Quartet and Harmony String Quartet.

He taught music at the Fodor Music Conservatory for three years, and after World War II taught instrumental music in the public schools of Budapest. In 1956 the Hungarian Ministry of Education presented him with a merit award in recognition of his outstanding educational performance. He also was a member of the Tucson Symphony Orchestra in this country.

## Morse Protests Postal Change

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Tuesday protested the moving of a regional post office headquarters from Portland, Ore. to Seattle, Wash.

Morse wrote Sen. Olin D. Johnston, D-S.C., Senate Post Office Committee chairman, asking him to request the postmaster general to hold up the announced move pending a committee investigation.

"The postmaster general's action is particularly alarming because it reflects an irresponsibility of the worst sort," Morse wrote.

"His action presents us with the spectacle of a lame duck postmaster general undertaking in the dying days of an outgoing administration to implement a policy decision that is of utmost importance and grave consequences to the postal service, the state of Oregon and almost 200 postal employees and their families."

"The Northwest regional post office is now located in a federal building in Portland and the postmaster general proposes to spend approximately \$100,000 of the taxpayers' money in moving personnel and equipment to rented quarters in Seattle."

"This move does not make business sense because it will saddle the government not only with sizable costs but with costs incident to the rental of space in Seattle."

## Idea For Glass Engine Puts Muscle In Missiles

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (UPI)—A Navy idea that a glass motor would be stronger than a steel motor was expected to pay off in bigger muscles for America's nuclear warhead Polaris ballistic missile by 1962.

If the proof is in the pudding, the Navy had a healthy and happy taste here today. A Polaris equipped for the first time with a glass motor tossed a dummy warhead more than 1,600 statute miles over the Atlantic—by far the greatest distance achieved in the program.

## Teachers Set 2 Conferences

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Science Teachers Association will hold two conferences to help schools make better use of radiological defense kits supplied by the state Civil Defense Agency.

The meetings will be in Eugene Saturday and La Grande Nov. 26. There are 183 kits in Oregon high schools and colleges. They are used in science classes to make students more familiar with radioactive materials. The Civil Defense Agency said the courses improve Oregon's chances of defending itself against fallout.
