

Auburn Back Sets Field Goal Record

AUBURN, Ala. (AP) — The night before he set a new college field goal record, Ed Dye disappeared from the Auburn campus.

Spectators at a high school football game spotted him later in the evening surrounded by seven small boys he had rounded up and taken to the game as his guests.

That's typical of the studious premed student whose spectacular performance against Georgia last Saturday won him acclaim as the Associated Press' "Back of the Week."

The 203-pound fullback from Mobile, Ala., kicked three field goals to give the Tigers a 9-6 victory over Georgia and establish a national record for the most field goals in a college career—16.

Dye has booted 12 of them this year, another collegiate record. He has kicked at least one in each of Auburn's eight games.

Despite his kicking accuracy, the mild-mannered gridiron hero, who turned 21 Friday, isn't essentially a field goal specialist. He has gained 393 yards rushing for a 5.2-yard average, and has

scored two touchdowns.

Despite his success, Dye is modest. When a mixup in records made it appear that he had broken the career field goal record earlier than he did, it was Dye himself who corrected it.

Scholastically, he's as good as he is on the football field. His grade average is just shy of "A." He will complete his work in 3½ years instead of the usual four.

Cougar Star Chances Fade

Mel Melin of Washington State and Harold Stephens of Hardin, Simmons, the nation's total offense and passing leaders in college football, play their final games of the season Saturday. Chances are neither will be on top when their rivals finish.

Melin, with gains of 1,487 yards to show for nine games, faces the task of piling up enough yardage to stand off Bill Kilmer of UCLA, now fourth with 1,340 yards, who will have two games to play after Melin is all through.

If Melin should make it, Stephens probably will lose his passing lead right there. Stephens has completed 113 of 206 passes for 1,039 yards. Melin is second with 104 completions for 1,450 yards.

Other individual offense leaders are Bob Gaiters of New Mexico State and Dick Fitzsimmons of Denver in punting. Gaiters has run for 1,071 yards in eight games. Fitzsimmons has averaged 44.3 yards on 24 kicks.

TV BOUTS SCHEDULED

Quarterbacks Pose Problem For Coach

NEW YORK (AP) — Quarterbacks—the one he has to face and the one he may not have—are the bane of New York Giants Coach Jim Lee Howell today as he prepares his team for Sunday's crucial National Football League game here against Philadelphia.

The Giants trail the Eastern Conference-leading Eagles by a half game, and must play them again the following Sunday in Philadelphia. A double victory is almost a must if the Giants hope to win their third straight conference title.

The quarterback he must face is Norm Van Brocklin, the 11-year NFL veteran who has hustled the Eagles to six straight victories after an opening loss, later avenged, to Cleveland.

What worries Howell even more is the one he may not have—12-year veteran Charley Conerly, who twisted ligaments in his left knee in Sunday's 27-24 victory over Pittsburgh. Doctors were to determine later if Conerly might be fit to face the Eagles.

George Shaw will get the call if Conerly is unable to play.

Brown Tops NFL Gainers

NEW YORK (AP) — Jimmy Brown of Cleveland is in his accustomed spot—ground gaining leader of the National Football League.

The former Syracuse star enjoyed his best day of the season last Sunday when he clipped off 173 yards on 28 carries to boost his season's total to 694 yards on 123 carries for an average of 5.6 yards.

Jimmy Taylor of Green Bay, who led a week ago, has gained 661 yards on 143 attempts for a 4.6 average.

Green Bay's Paul Hornung needs only 39 points in five games to better the individual one-season scoring record. The former Notre Dame star has scored eight touchdowns, 25 successive extra points, and has booted 9 of 17 field goals for an even 100 points.

Oregon Tech Ends Share Score Lead

All that remains on the activity slate for the Oregon Tech Owls during their highly successful 1960 football season is the annual awards banquet scheduled in the Mile High cafeteria Sunday night, Dec. 4.

The Techmen will celebrate their first unbeaten-untied grid season in the 14-year history of the school. In battling through the nine-game schedule, the Owls developed a notorious "come-from-behind-the-hard-way" reputation but still, in totaling statistics, they compiled a total of 234 points while allowing their competition only 113.

The Owls are wearing the Oregon Collegiate Conference championship tiara for the third consecutive year, although in 1958 they were relieved of the title on an eligibility technicality. Over the three-year period they have won 21 games while losing only four.

Although national wire services refuse to recognize them as such, the Owls are one of 10 colleges across the nation who can claim a nine-game unbeaten-untied record. The others are Missouri, Utah State, Ohio University, Humboldt State, Arkansas Tech, Iowa Teachers, Lenoir Rhyne, Whitworth, and Ottawa, Kans. Willamette University, also an Oregon college, boasts an eight-

game skein. Only Oregon and California are represented by two teams in the unbeaten lists. Fresno and Humboldt State also claim unbeaten status.

The Owls' defensive ability has proven the key to their season although the spectacular pass play or rugged ground gains at crucial times have provided the ultimate winning scores in the bulk of their games.

Ends Ardeell Hamilton and Arties Palmore share the Owls' score lead with six touchdowns apiece although 12 members of the team have gotten into the scoring column. Fullback Bud Maupin, with five TDs, is next, followed by quarterback Dick Olivas with a pair of six-pointers plus 16 point-after, and halfback Charlie Wilson, with four touchdowns and three PATs, in that order.

Maupin and Wilson top the ground gaining statistics with totals of 337 and 307 respectively. Ken Lewers is third with 261 yards followed by Hamilton and L. T. Tennerson with 185 and 173. Quarterback Roy Johnson has completed 35 of 65 pass attempts for an average of 8.57 per toss while Olivas hit on 38 of 90 for a 6.39 mark.

End Dennis Farster completed 29 aeriels, Hamilton 23 and Palmore 14.

UCLA Flash Dominating Big 5 Stax

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — Bill Kilmer, All-America candidate from UCLA, dominates Big Five statistics released today.

What makes the UCLA tailback's feats more amazing is that he and his Bruin teammates have played only seven games, while the other four teams in the league have played nine each.

Kilmer has picked up 1330 yards rushing and passing to lead total offense figures.

He has gained 447 yards rushing, good for second place in the league, and 893 passing, which places him third in the loop.

Washington soph Charlie Mitchell leads the rushers with 456 yards while Stanford's Dick Norman tops the passers with 294 yards. Bob Hivner of Washington is also impressive in the passing statistics. He has the best completion record with 26 of 46 and has gained 486 yards for an average of well over 10 yards per pass.

Norman's favorite receivers, Skip Face and Mac Wylie, lead the reception figures. Face has caught 25 passes for 254 yards and Wylie 20 for 303 yards.

George Fleming of Washington is way out in front of the scoring race with 65 points and the versatile Kilmer is the loop's top punter.

Giel May Quit Pro Baseball

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Paul Giel, who was signed off the University of Minnesota campus for a reported \$80,000 bonus by the New York Giants in 1954, Tuesday said he may quit baseball rather than play Triple A ball.

Giel, presently attending San Francisco State College where he is studying for his general secondary physical education credentials, said the Pittsburgh Pirates have sold his contract to Columbus of the American Association. "If that means I've been relegated to Triple A ball, I might consider teaching," the 27-year-old former All-America halfback said.

Ohio U Boss Cited UPI Coach Of Week

ATHENS, Ohio (UPI)—He said, "Give me three years to rebuild Ohio University football," and today he's right on schedule.

His "grind it out" attack minimizes mistakes and takes full advantage of the opposition's mis-cues. The result is an unbeaten-untied record going into the final

game of the season, and the No. 1 small college rating.

He is Bill Hess of Ohio University, who was named college football's "coach of the week" by United Press International today for a showdown 14-7 victory last Saturday over defending small college champion Bowling Green State in the "battle of the little giants."

Hess is a sincere, hard-working coach who believes in his assistants and his boys. He took over the sagging Ohio U. football fortunes in 1947, after serving seven years on Coach Woody Hayes' staff at Ohio State University.

Hess and Ohio U. fans and alumni never have regretted his return to his alma mater. In three seasons, with one game remaining, Hess has rolled up a 21-6 record, including nine consecutive victories this year.

Hess believes the Mid-American Conference, of which Ohio U. and Bowling Green are members, should be rated in the major college category.

"We play major college football, and as far as a comparison between this and the Western Conference, they have a few more great athletes on each team than we do but that's about all."

13 Players Die In 1960

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Thirteen players have received fatal injuries as a direct result of 1960 football competition, compared with 16 at this time last season.

So says the annual mid season report of Dr. Floyd R. Eastwood of Los Angeles State College, reporting for the American Football Coaches Association's Committee on Injuries and Fatalities.

Dr. Eastwood said Tuesday night that one reason for the decline may be the delay his committee experiences in receiving reports of injuries sustained in sandlot games. Five sandlot fatalities had occurred at this time last year, but only one has been reported so far in 1960.

Five football deaths last year were due to heat stroke, while two have been reported this season.
