

### Klamath County Officials At Portland Meeting

Six Klamath County officials are in Portland this week attending the annual meeting of the Association of Oregon Counties. The officials are Charlie DeLap, county clerk; R. R. (Bob) Kalinski, county engineer, and Eva Cook, county treasurer. Problems common to county governments throughout the state are being discussed. Special reports will be made by committees regarding governmental reorganization and needed legislation.

Special guests at the meeting are Dan Gray, Alabama, president of the National Association of County Officials, and J. W. Forester Jr., editor of the Pendleton East Oregonian.

### Boivin Backers To Be Absent At Salem Meet

PORTLAND (AP) — Several Democratic Party members of the next state Legislature will be absent at a caucus to be held Saturday in Salem.

They are backers of Sen. Harry Boivin, Klamath Falls conservative, who seeks election as president of the upper house.

Sen. Alfred H. Corbett, Portland liberal, has said a majority of Senate Democrats are backing him, but he is not sure of the majority of Senate votes needed for election.

Walter Pearson of Portland, who was president of the 1959 Senate, said Wednesday that he will be acting governor and plans to see the Oregon-Oregon State football game at Corvallis instead of attending the caucus.

Sen. Daniel Thiel of Astoria said he has to keep a dental appointment Saturday. Boivin said he will be preparing for a business trip away from Oregon. Sen. E. D. Potts of Grants Pass said he will be out of the State. Sen. Boyd Overhulse of Madras said he also will be at the football game.

All of the announced absentees are Boivin supporters.

### FB Fights Attempts To Organize

EUGENE (AP) — The Oregon Farm Bureau Federation called Wednesday for legislative aid against a possible attempt to organize farm workers.

The group proposed a law to exclude harvest operations from any labor dispute. The resolution was adopted after the group heard warnings that an attempt to organize farm workers in California may spread to Oregon.

Sponsors said such a law would enable a farmer to get migrant workers from state and federal agencies even if pickets appeared at a harvest operation. At present the law prevents the agencies from taking sides in a labor dispute and forbids them from sending workers to a picketed operation.

Another resolution urged organization of a bargaining association to represent farmers in dealing with buyers and wholesalers.

The federation, which in the past has called for elimination of marketing quotas and acreage allotments for wheat, this time voted down such a resolution. Delegates from wheat areas led the successful fight against the proposal.

The group reiterated earlier stands in favor of a sales tax, a reduction of property taxes, and gradual elimination of government agricultural regulations. Also reiterated was opposition to the so-called Brannan plan of direct subsidies in lieu of production.

Wiley Clowers, Madras, was elected first vice president and Barry Brownell, Oregon City, second vice president. The offices of president and third vice president will be up for election next year.

### 28 Governors Still On Tour

CORDOBA, Argentina (AP) — The 28 visiting governors of the United States arrived today in this Central Argentine town.

They came from the Atlantic Coast resort of Mar Del Plata in three special planes. After welcoming addresses, the governors and their wives left for a sightseeing tour of the city. They later saw the Kaiser industries plant, where motor cars are being built.

The governors, guests of the Argentine government, will leave by plane tonight for Mendoza, at the foot of the Andes.

### Fund Just Beneath Its Quota

The Governmental Division of Klamath County United Fund was only a fraction beneath its quota during a report meeting Tuesday.

The division, under Clyde (Hap) Caldwell, was just \$43 short of the goal. Frank Stennett's federal sub-unit has attained 77 per cent, Mrs. Julia Brown's state unit, 119, George Price's county unit, 122 per cent of last year's level.

Jack Kalinski's county Road Department unit has 122 per cent, Chief of Police Charlie Howard's city unit, 117 per cent, and John Stewart's miscellaneous governmental unit, 112 per cent. The drive total stands at \$116,625, or 84 per cent of the \$138,942 goal.

### Morse Requests Survey Of Cost

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., Wednesday asked Comptroller General Joseph Campbell to have the General Accounting Office conduct a complete cost survey on the proposed move from Portland to Seattle of the Northwest regional office of the Post Office Department.

Morse told Campbell he had asked Sen. Orin D. Johnson, D-S.C., chairman of the Senate Post Office Committee, "to take further and emphatic request of the postmaster general to delay transfer of the Northwest regional office."

Postmaster General Arthur S. Summerfield agreed last summer to delay the transfer until the committee could study its advisability. On Nov. 10, however, the department announced it would go ahead with the move, starting Dec. 1.

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### County Officials Oppose Fund Plan

PORTLAND (AP) — There was opposition in the Association of Oregon Counties Wednesday to a proposed formula under which the state would put up more money for public schools.

The plan was outlined by State Sen. Ward Cook of Portland, chairman of the legislature's Interim Committee on Education. He said that under the formula, the state would gradually raise its support until 50 per cent of the cost would come from state funds by the 1964-65 fiscal year.

Distribution would be based on costs in the prior year rather than on a per census child basis. Rep. Clarence Barton of Coquille, chairman of the Interim Tax Committee, criticized this, saying, "It is a cost plus figure. We prefer so much per census child, rather than on what the school administrators choose to spend."

Barton also criticized an education committee proposal to use some O&C funds in counties getting O&C money from the federal government.

He said, "We are going to oppose efforts by anyone to raid these funds unless all taxpayers are being treated alike."

Rep. Stafford Hansel of Umatilla County said Eastern Oregon would be hurt by the proposed formula, and urged a return to flat grants.

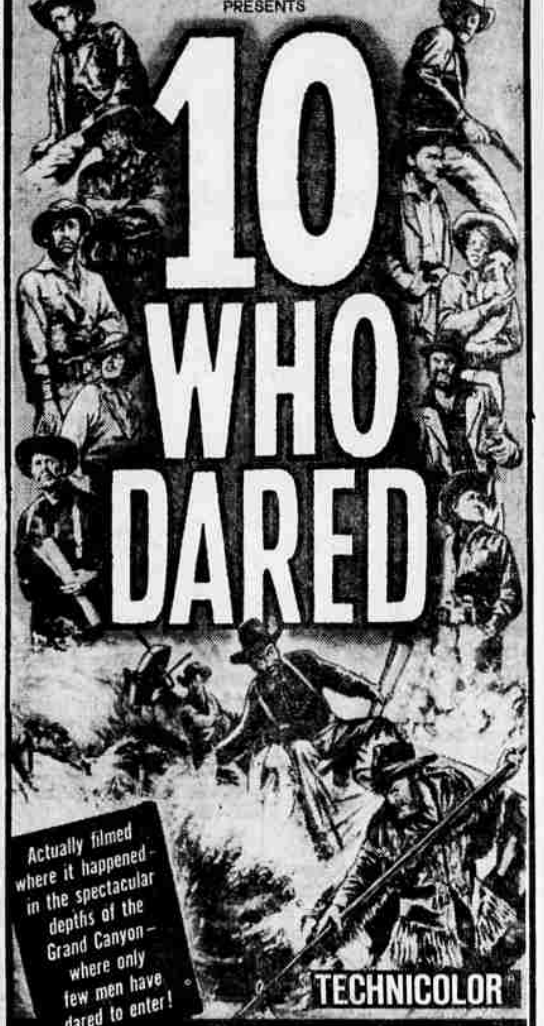
"We don't want any of your O&C money if you'll just leave our equalization money alone," he said.

Forrest Cooper of Lakeview, counsel for the Interstate Association of Public Lands Counties, said equalization of school money should be kept at the local level. He said the present system uses up \$500,000 in clerical expenses that might otherwise go to school aid.
