Policies Discriminate Against West - Dominy

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (AP)—Bakersfield Commissioner Floyd E. Dominy said Wednesday that federal public works and natural resource development policies discriminate against the 17 western reclamation states.

Dominy told the 29th annual convention of the National Reclamation Association this is true because federal law requires reimbursement to the federal treasury of expenditures for services in connection with reclamation development while similar services in connection with other federal resource development are not reimbursable.

"Other agencies appear able to offer almost unlimited funds for research and investigative purposes simply because virtually their entire program is nonreimbursable," Dominy said in a speech.

"In reclamation development, these expenditures are billed against the project and the water and power users ultimately find them on the bill which must be paid to the federal treasury."

"I believe firmly in the repayment principle, but in fairness and equity it should apply uniformly to all purposes benefited and to all federal programs."

"Or, conversely, it should not be applied to reclamation if other benefits are to enjoy the free ride. Congress needs to take a look at the ground rules under which federal public works and resource and development agencies operate. At the present time, western water and power users are being unfairly discriminated against."

He did not identify the other government agencies which do not require reimbursement for reclamation development but they include the Army Engineers and the Agriculture Department.

Dominy called for more effective salesmanship by westerners of the values and benefits of reclamation.

Bodies Taken From Airplane

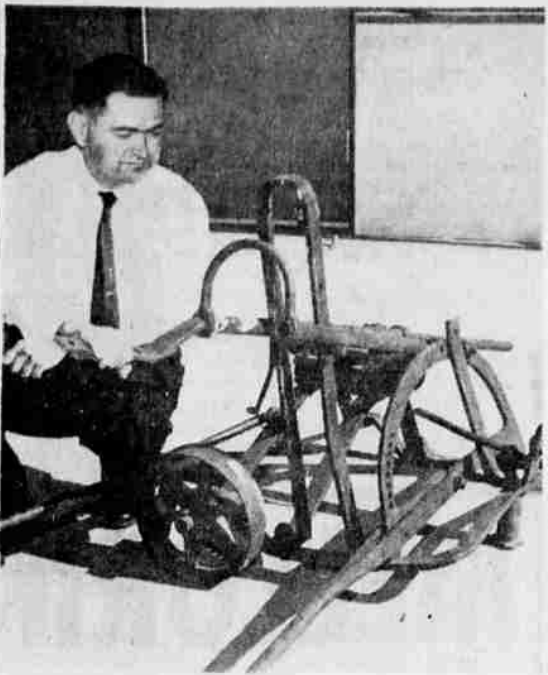

Expect Party Struggles On Congressional Hikes

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Many state legislatures today faced the prospect of a tug-of-war between Democrats and Republicans trying to gain political advantage from the reshaping of congressional districts.

Between now and then, nine state legislatures will have to grapple with the problem of redrawing their congressional districts to accommodate one or more new House members. Sixteen states will have to realign district boundaries to take care of the loss of one or more House seats.

The states that gained the most in the reapportionment are California, with eight new House members, and Florida, with four new seats. One new seat each was awarded to Arizona, Maryland, Michigan, New Jersey, Hawaii, Ohio and Texas.

Pennsylvania was the big loser, dropping three members. New York, Massachusetts and Arkansas each lost two. One seat each was taken from Alabama, Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Kentucky, Maine, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, North Carolina and West Virginia.

The party in power in each state legislature usually attempts to redraw congressional district boundaries so that it will have the best chance to win new seats or so that lost seats will be taken from members of the opposition party. This is called gerrymandering.

Under federal law, if a state which lost seats failed to decide on new congressional districts by the 1962 election, all of its House members would be elected at large by voters of the entire state.

If a state which gained seats was unable to agree on new districts, its new members would be elected at large.

College Move Being Planned

PORTLAND (AP)—Trustees of Cascade College said Tuesday that the interdenominational school will be moved from north Portland to a site near the Willamette River in northwestern Clackamas County.

They are seeking a 50-acre campus site.

The present enrollment is 275 students. Plans call for a campus with classrooms for 500 students and dormitories for 250 in the next five years. The trustees said they believe enrollment will increase to 1,000 by 1970.

Washington Man Survives 'Incurable' Lung Cancer

BREMERTON, Wash. (UPI)—Every tick of the clock adds a bonus second to the life of Joseph W. Mayerle, 39, tavern manager.

This life bonus now totals more than 18 months for Mayerle, a World War II veteran who was told he had incurable lung cancer in April, 1959.

Doctors have yet to determine how the cancer disappeared, and Mayerle doesn't know either. He is certain only that he has never felt better, and his last X-ray Nov. 8 showed not a trace of the disease.

"On my last check-up at the Veterans' Hospital, they told me I was in fine health," Mayerle said.

He said he works about 15 hours a day at the tavern he manages. Mayerle has only a few hours each day and Sundays to enjoy his 13-month-old son, the child he never would have seen if his cancer had worsened instead of mysteriously disappearing.

Mayerle discovered he had cancer in the early spring of 1959. He hadn't been feeling well, his

Rancher Buys House Spread

SAN DIEGO, Tex. (AP) —

Laredo rancher, J. O. Walker, Tuesday, bought three rivals Tuesday to buy a south Texas ranch sold for \$1,575,000 to satisfy creditors of political boss George Parr.

The 55,700-acre ranch astride Nueces River west of here was a showplace where Parr often entertained before 1957, when he pleaded bankruptcy.

Walker's final bid at an auction on the county courthouse steps topped the last offer of \$1,555,000 from a group represented by Henry Grace of Wichita Falls, Tex.

Parr's bankrupt estate will collect 20 per cent of the sale price. Duval County, the onetime private political domain of Parr, gets the rest. Parr had borrowed \$662,000 from the county.

Veteran City Men Honored

SALEM (AP)—Ten veteran city officials whose service to Oregon cities totals nearly four centuries were honored at a session of the League of Oregon Cities Tuesday.

Veteran of the group is James A. Gallagher, Corvallis city councilman whose municipal service began in 1906 when he was named fire chief and city marshal of Yamhill.

Others honored were: Salem Fire Chief Robert Mills, whose service began in 1917; Salem city engineer J. H. Davis, 1922; Salem city recorder Alfred Mundt, 1923; Ed Boatwright, retired Portland fire chief, 1914; Ivan Pearson, for 45 years chief of the McMinnville fire department; Wayne Osterby, Astoria fire chief, 1920; Elmer Biegel, Ashland city administrator, 1924; Robert Duff, Medford city manager, 1925; and Walter Vandervelden, Forest Grove fire chief, 1924.
