Unitarians Planning Thanks Day

Particularly appropriate will be the "Day of Thanks" service of the Klamath Falls Unitarian Fellowship Sunday, Nov. 20, at 11 a.m., combining observance of the Thanksgiving season with the first meeting of the fellowship in its new meetinghouse.

Earlier this week, local Unitarians took over the Pine Grove School, long a landmark just outside Klamath Falls on the Lakeview highway. The building's early day character, even to the original bell and bell tower, has been preserved through the years. It was remodeled a few years ago by the late Sheldon Brumbaugh, architect, for his office, and the distinctive style was maintained even with the addition of floor to ceiling windows and a full wall fireplace. Negotiations for the transaction were by Mrs. Sheldon Brumbaugh and the local Unitarian group.

A new form of meeting is planned by Unitarians who will have both adult and junior fellowship meetings at the same time. Previous space limitations had made such an arrangement impractical.

The Sunday program will include prelude music by Mrs. Norman Poulshock and Jan Gippo. Welcome will be by Hugh Killmeyer, fellowship president, and Mrs. Stephen Sanford, religious education chairman. Program topic will be "Great Thoughts by Great Unitarians," and is being arranged by Joe Russell, program chairman.

Adding to the setting will be selected original art works on display by the Klamath Art Association. Following the program, refreshments will be served. All members and friends and those interested are cordially invited.

The local fellowship was formed only three years ago and has continued in its plan of a free discussion group for religious liberals. It is affiliated with the American Unitarian Association as one of over 300 groups organized throughout the country in the past decade. The Klamath fellowship, like most others, is lay led and operated and controlled entirely by its local membership.

Conference Set On OSC Campus

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—A special conference on geography will be given Dec. 10 at Oregon State College as a service to elementary and high school teachers of the state.

The new social studies curriculum in both grade and high schools calls for greatly increased emphasis on geography. It was pointed out, and the conference will give teachers additional background on best ways to present subject matter and use maps, globes and charts in the classroom.

Latest materials available for teaching geography will be demonstrated and displayed as part of the program, according to Dr. J. Granville Jensen, head of geography at OSC.

Guest speaker for the all-day program will be Dr. Neville Scarfe, dean of education at University of British Columbia and former head of the geography department at University of London, England. He is author of several geography references and was a member of the International Geographical Union Committee on geography in schools.

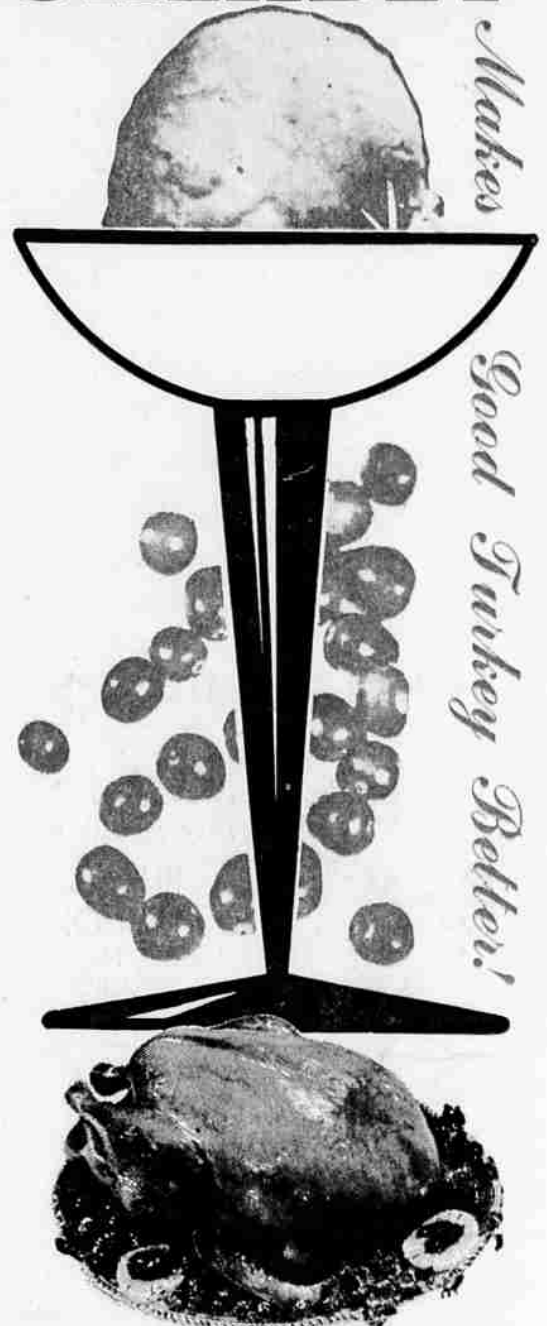
At 4:15 p.m. there will be a study in the Watchtower on the subject, "Security during War of the Great Day of God Almighty." The public is invited. No collections are taken.

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
