### Huitt Enters Innocent Plea

A plea of not guilty to a charge of concealing stolen property was entered for Ralph David Huitt, 30, Beatty, Thursday morning in circuit court.

Huitt chose to stand mute. He is charged in connection with the theft of six rifles from Morgan Gadowa of Beatty on July 6. The case went to the grand jury four times.

Judge David R. Vandenberg set Monday at 10 a.m. for the beginning of the trial. Huitt will be defended by Richard Beesley.

### Attorney Fined For Being Late

EUGENE (AP) — Attorney Keith Rodman, asked why he was late to court for sentencing of a client Wednesday, said he was sorry but he had no reason.

Circuit Judge William Fort then noted that Rodman was 22 minutes late, ruled he was in contempt of court and fined him \$1 a minute.

Rodman's net loss on the case was \$7. As a court-appointed attorney, he had received the standard fee of \$15.

### Forgery Charge

A charge of forgery by endorsement was filed Thursday against Gerald Duane Dedmon, 22, 121 Iowa Street. He was alleged to have endorsed a \$25 unemployment check made out to his brother.

The district attorney's office said Dedmon signed a statement in which he said his brother told him to pick up the check and pay some debts with it.

Bail was set at \$3,000.

## Adoption Of Columbia River Compact Urged At SCD Meeting

THE DALLES, Ore. (AP) — Adoption of the proposed Columbia River compact as the vehicle for management of the Columbia Basin's vast resources was urged here Thursday.

"Although it doesn't go as far as one would like, neither would it have the power that others fear," asserted Cecil Hagen, managing editor of the Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Utah Farmers.

Hagen told the Oregon Association of Soil Conservation Districts that differences of opinion on power were ironed out within the compact commission.

Assuming both the United States and Canada will ratify an agreement for joint development of the upper Columbia River power, he said, the power shortage fears at the bottom of much original disagreement may be removed.

"Satisfactory disposition of the power issue would enable us to concentrate on other aspects of

best utilization of the Columbia's waters," he said in his prepared remarks.

"Farmers in the United States portion of the river basin are dependent on water for irrigating approximately 5,100,000 acres of their best lands. The U. S. Bureau of Reclamation estimates that by the year 2010 — 50 years from now — about 8,000,000 acres will be irrigated in the basin."

Hagen said one of the things the Columbia compact would do is set a priority for consumptive uses of water. He said it would permit a disappearance of up to 7 per cent of the river's total flow.

"This section states in effect that there is no substitute for irrigation water and that a de-

crease in stream flow as a result of using water for irrigation shall be recognized as necessary," he said.

Hagen said more stress must be placed on heading off pollution, the Northwest Power Pool will need to be expanded when power available increases, industry water needs will be met, and the very real possibility of diverting Columbia waters to other areas may face the region.

"All these and many other considerations which we must face in management of our valuable water resources might best be achieved with a Columbia compact as a legal vehicle," Hagen said.

Calling hydroelectric power the

bellwether of much of the progress already made, Hagen said further development with coordinated planning probably could pay maximum dividends.

"Should the compact be adopted, it would represent a major victory for local control and states right forces as against proponents of federal government control," Hagen said. "I for one should like to move its adoption."

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### Farm Credit Directors Reelected

Reelection of two Spokane District Farm Credit Board directors and the election of that board's chairman to the board of the Central Bank for Cooperatives, Washington, D.C., is announced by Fred Knutsen, general agent of the Farm Credit Banks of Spokane.

Federal land bank associations in Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington have returned Oscar G. Swenson, Malone, Wash., dairyman, to a three-year term on the district board, and production credit associations in the same four-state area have renominated Thomas A. Ross, Chinook, Mont., stockman, also for a three-year term.

Knutsen said the board of the Spokane Bank for Cooperatives has elected William J. Holman, Boise, farmer-stockman, to a three-year term as the Spokane district's director on the board of the Central Bank for Cooperatives. Holman is chairman of the District Farm Credit Board which also serves as the board of the Spokane cooperative bank.

Major functions of the central bank, Knutsen explained, are to participate with the district banks for cooperatives in carrying loans which are too large for the district banks to make individually, and to make loans to the district banks.

Holman, who owns and operates an irrigated farm in Boise Valley, specializing in dairying and the production of hogs, has been a member of the district board since 1944 and chairman since 1955. He is president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Boise, president of the Dairyman's Cooperative Creamery of Boise Valley, vice president of the United Dairyman's Association and a director of the National Cooperative Milk Producers Federation and the Consolidated Dairy Products Company.

Swenson, a district farm credit board member since 1948, owns and operates a 150-acre dairy farm in Grays Harbor County and is president of the Federal Land Bank Association of Elma.

Ross, a district director since 1954, operates a 4,400-acre cattle ranch with his son in the Bearpaw Mountain area. He is a director of the Montana Livestock Production Credit Association, and a member of the Montana State College Council.

Other members of the district board, in addition to Holman, Swenson and Ross, are George L. Watt, Buhl, Idaho; William F. Barratt, Heppner, Ore.; George W. Lacey, Drummond, Mont., and Don H. Phipps, Wenatchee, Wash.

### State Board Will Explain Compensation

The three-man State Industrial Accident Commission will conduct a public meeting in Klamath Falls Nov. 29, field representative Bob Travis announced Thursday.

The meeting will be held Nov. 29 at 7:30 p.m. in the Klamath County Library building.

The purpose of the meeting will be to inform the public concerning workers' compensation rates, safety, existing laws and proposed legislation, Travis said. William Callahan, Salem, chairman of the commission, will moderate the meeting.

"We are contacting employers in the Klamath area now," Travis said. "This is the first time the commission has traveled throughout the state. We think it's a good idea." Travis said there would be a question-and-answer session at the end of the meeting.

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### Woman Killed In 50-Foot Fall

SALEM (AP) — Mrs. Elmer Kleinke, 50, of Salem, died Wednesday night from injuries suffered in a 50-foot fall from the Marion Street Bridge here.

She was found lying in a street below the bridge at daybreak Wednesday. Her husband had reported her missing during the night. Kleinke said she had been in poor health.

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
