College Dean PTA Speaker

DUNSMUIR—"Curriculum consists of all learning experiences which a child has under the direction of the school," Dr. Victor Houston, dean of education at Chico State College, told members of Dunsmuir Elementary School Parent Teacher Association during its November meeting.

Troop 305, Girl Scouts, under the direction of Barbara Stanley, gave the flag salute. Seventy-seven dollars was raised from the teen-age dance, it was announced.

Houston defined the elementary school's purpose as giving the child an understanding of himself and the world he lives in, his obligations and opportunities.

He said he feels that if subject matter requirements are made too specific by policy-making bodies, the teachers could be hampered in their work.

All aims must be considered, Houston said, in presentation of a subject. He believes that timed study of democracy and patriotism are valueless unless knowledge of, practice in, and zeal for them are imparted to students.

Following Houston's talk, Roger Ellis, school principal, briefly summarized the school's required curricula and the way Dunsmuir Elementary School exceeds the basic requirements. Ellis stated there are even some values in cramped playground space. "It teaches tolerance," he concluded.
