

Leehmann Quits His Board Post

LAKEVIEW — Walter H. Leehmann Sr. submitted his resignation as a member of the Lake County Advisory Board, Bureau of Land Management, during the recent annual meeting called to elect board members.

Leehmann served for the past 26 years and spent 25 years as chairman. He was elected to the first BLM Advisory Board in 1934. Henry Gerber was reelected cattle representative for the Bonanza unit. George Elder was chosen cattle representative for the Paisley-Silver Lake unit to fill a vacancy left by Tom Bratman who failed to file for another term.

Con Flynn and Walter Leehmann Jr. were nominated to fill the vacancy left by Leehmann Sr. The vote ended in a tie. A coin toss favored Flynn.

Members still serving are Kube Long, cattle, Christmas Lake-Fort Rock Unit; Con Lynch, cattle, North Warner-Little Juniper Unit; Terry Cahill, cattle, South Warner-Beatty Butte Unit; Henry O'Keefe, sheep, South Warner-Beatty Unit; Jerry O'Leary, sheep, Paisley-Silver Lake Unit, and Frank Gross, cattle, Bonanza Unit. T. R. Conn, district wildlife department representative, was reappointed to another three-year term by the Oregon Game Commission and the state BLM supervisor.
