

Drastic Overhaul Of Education Suggested

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — A drastic overhaul of public education, designed to raise the quality and eliminate the frills, was proposed Thursday by a group of education experts.

They outlined suggested programs in mathematics, chemistry, English, social studies, foreign languages, biology and economics.

Some of the beefed-up courses are being taught in a few schools, others are in the planning stage.

The proposals were made during the annual meeting of the Council of Chief State School Officers, an association of state commissioners and superintendents of schools.

Highlights of the prepared statements:

G. Bailey Price, executive secretary of the Conference Board of the Mathematical Sciences, told of a Yale experiment in which in-

tuitive geometry is introduced in the fourth grade, vectors in the eleventh grade, and matrix algebra and probability and statistics in the twelfth grade.

"Many schools now start algebra in the eighth grade instead of the ninth," he said. "Previously much time has been lost in the seventh and eighth grades in review and on too much drill on trivial social application of arithmetic."

Floyd Rinker of the College Entrance Examination Board's Commission on English said the problem in his field is to bridge the gap between what is taught in high school and what is required in college.

Robert E. Henze of the American Chemical Society told of two experimental programs being taught to a small number of high school students. In one there is

emphasis on "atomic and molecular structures of substances and the nature of chemical bonding between atoms."

George E. Smith of the Indiana State Department of Public Instruction called for a 10-year course in modern foreign languages, starting with all third grade pupils. Those who show aptitude and ability would continue the language through the twelfth grade.

Roy E. Simpson, superintendent of public instruction for California, reported on a survey of the social sciences program in that state. He said the committee agreed that non-academic subjects attached to the social studies, such as driver education and instruction in the ill effects of alcohol and narcotics, be removed. (Some school officials be-

lieve driver education should be part of the civics course, because it teaches respect for the law.)

Simpson also said it was agreed that the eight academic disci-

plines which should make up the social studies program are geography, history, political science, economics, anthropology, psychology, sociology and philosophy.
