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Agribusiness Jobs Outnumber Available College Graduates

OREGON STATE COLLEGE—Some 15,000 new positions open in agribusiness for college graduates each year, but a qualified college graduate can't be found for about two-thirds of the new jobs.

Sagging agricultural college enrollments on a nation-wide basis the past 10 years have been blamed for not supplying the manpower for the new positions.

What seems to hurt the most is that many prospective students don't realize that agricultural training does not mean farming alone as a career. It can also mean a variety of opportunities in the agribusiness field.

Agribusiness refers to all the operations involved in producing a farm commodity and getting it to the ultimate consumer in its final form. The term agribusiness is divided into three groups—farm supplies, farming and processing, distribution.

Wilbur Cooney, assistant dean of agriculture at Oregon State College, said farm organizations and agricultural colleges are uniting in an effort to tell the young people of the gainful and rewarding employment opportunities in agriculture.

The number of agricultural students as a proportion to the total land-grant college enrollment also has decreased consistently for the last 20 years.

At OSC this fall, the School of Agriculture enrollment has a

dropped nine per cent, from 766 to 695, over last year. Ten years ago, in 1950, the School of Agriculture had 942 students enrolled.

Cooney said although the student body has increased from 4,759 in 1940 to 7,896 in 1960, the number of students enrolled in agriculture was 46 higher in 1940. Percentage-wise, the School of Agriculture claimed 15 per cent of the total enrollment in 1940 and only nine per cent in 1960.

The national report, "College-Trained Manpower for Agribusiness," also states the number of agricultural students is decreasing in spite of the increase in number of employees in the farm supply and the crop processing-distribution industries which offer pay competitive to other fields. Starting pay in the new positions varies from \$4,800 to \$6,000.

The study reported that the quality of the graduate students in agriculture was third from the top in 15 classifications of professions and employment areas on the basis of a test scale.

Opportunities for good, highly-motivated graduate students are excellent. And as with the undergraduate, pay is competitive with practically all fields of endeavor, Cooney said.

Agribusiness positions have more than offset the decrease that has occurred the past 30 years in the labor force involved in crop and livestock production. It is estimated that 37 per cent

of the total labor force of the United States is engaged in agribusiness—a huge industry marketing approximately 100 billion dollars in products annually.

If the present trends continue, only one-fifth of the new 15,000 agribusiness positions opening each year will be filled by agricultural college graduates by 1970, Cooney said.

Agriculture Ranks Second In Economy

Oregon's second largest wealth producing industry — agriculture — continues to play a vital role in the state's economy, emphasized F. L. Ballard, associate director of the Oregon State College agricultural extension service in commenting on the Farm-City Week proclamation of President Eisenhower. Farm - City Week is Nov. 17-24.

Oregon farms generate over a half billion dollars a year buying power, he noted. One out of every two dollars taken in by Oregon farmers comes from out-of-state sales. For example, cash receipts to farmers are better than \$400 million a year, including \$200 million from out-of-state sales.

Agriculture is second only to the forestry industry which is valued at about \$1 billion a year in Oregon. Tourists and recreation, mines, and fisheries follow in that order.

Oregon farms place more than 100 kinds of farm products into commercial channels each year. They are converted and combined into many forms by processors and others. Some of the items that Oregon has become famous for the country over, Ballard pointed out, include: pears, apples, strawberries, Blue Lake beans, filberts, peppermint oil, lily bulbs, hops, wool and seed crops, especially rye grass.

Salem ranks high in the nation in the volume of canned goods production. And farm products accounted for two-thirds of the tonnage shipped out of the port of Portland in a recent year. But the real story of agriculture's economic importance to Oregon is the fact that it takes only slightly more than one-tenth of the labor force to produce this abundance, according to Ballard. Helped by discoveries in sciences affecting agriculture, Oregon farmers have become more and more efficient, he remarked.

Over the past 10 years, food has become cheaper for the consumer in relation to the number of hours of work required to buy it. On the average, it takes only 50 minutes of work to buy food that required an hour of working time 10 years ago. This leaves workers more money to purchase industrial goods — automobiles, boats, television sets, etc. Also, since fewer farmers are needed, more people are available to make these industrial goods and work in other jobs, the OSC leader said.

In addition to the 77,000 Oregonians actually engaged in farming, thousands of workers in related fields depend on agriculture for their jobs. Food processing, for example, provides about 20,000 jobs in Oregon. Other jobs based on agriculture include those in stores selling feed, seed and fertilizer, and handling farm machinery.

Figures aren't available for Oregon, but in the U.S. as a whole it has been estimated that 40 per cent of the labor force works at jobs of supplying farmers, and producing, processing and distributing farm products.

Stamps In The News

Coinciding with India's national holiday, Republic Day, Jan. 26, 1961, the U.S. Post Office Department will issue its previously announced Mahatma Gandhi "Champion of Liberty" stamps at Washington, D.C.

The 4-cent and 8-cent stamps featuring a likeness of the re-



vered Indian leader are the 10th in the "Champion of Liberty" series.

Surrounding the head of Gandhi is the inscription "Mahatma Gandhi 1869 - 1948 Apostle of Non-Violence." The 4 center is blue and the 8 center red, blue and gold.

Collectors desiring first day cancellations may send their addressed envelopes to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D.C., with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed. Each envelope must be marked in pencil in the upper right corner indicating the denomination to be affixed.

Remember that under the new first day cover policy of the Post Office Department, requests for the Gandhi covers must be postmarked five days in advance of the issuance date.

Belgium has issued a four value set of stamps honoring the 100th anniversary of the "Credit Communal de Belgium." Each stamp pictures the founder of the society, Brother Orban. The values are 10 centimes, 40 c, 1.50 francs and 3 francs. This set will be available in Belgium post offices for a limited time as they will be discontinued on Dec. 31. Here is some information concerning new catalogs:

The 1961 editions of the Minkus Regional Catalogs, first intro-

duced last season, are now available. Fourteen of these pocket-sized editions include British Commonwealth, Latin America, Free Asia and Africa, Austria (plus Switzerland and Liechtenstein), Belgium (plus Netherlands and Luxembourg), Hungary (plus Poland and Yugoslavia). The French Community of Nations and Monaco, Germany and colonies, Greece (plus Albania and Turkey), Italy and colonies (plus San Marino and Vatican), Portugal and Spain (and colonies), Russia (and Romania), Scandinavia.

The 1961 edition of Scott's Specialized U.S. Catalogue, being published on Dec. 1, will introduce a new section for Boating Stamps and will provide 18 new illustrations in four sections. This edition will contain 632 pages.

Yugoslavia reports several upcoming commemorative issues. Among them are the following: a stamp honoring the National Serbian Theater in Novi Sad; a stamp commemorating the Centenary of the National Croatian Theater in Zagreb; a stamp for the first airplane flights in Yugoslavia; a stamp honoring the 15th anniversary of the Popular Federal Republic; a stamp dedicated to the 15th anniversary of the United Nations.

The Ryukyu Islands has issued a two value set of stamps commemorating the ninth annual Athletic Meeting between Kyushu and Okinawa. One stamp shows a landscape scene and the other a runner.

For the month of November, France has announced it will issue the following stamps: a 15 centimes honoring the centenary of the birth of General Estienne; a 20 c commemorating the 10th anniversary of the death of Marc Sangnier; a 20 c marking the 20th anniversary of the creation of the Order of Liberation; a 30 c and 50 c for wildlife preservation; and a 30 c paying tribute to A. Honnorat.

The Republic of Tunisia has honored the 15th anniversary of the United Nations with a new stamp. The 40 mille shows a flower with arms representing the different races of the world as petals reaching toward the U.N. symbol in the center.
