

### Coos County Man Elected County Association Head

PORTLAND (AP)—Coos County Judge James W. Harrison is the new president of the Association of Oregon Counties.

He was elected Friday at the organization's annual meeting here.

Jefferson County Judge H. A. Dussault was named vice president and Yamhill County Judge R. E. Reene was re-elected treasurer.

The association turned down resolutions calling for:

- A plan permitting or requiring counties to enter into collective bargaining agreements with county workers.
- School elections to be held when possible on the regular primary and general election dates.
- A law to give juvenile judges jurisdiction over illegitimate children.

Approved resolutions call for:

- Ten per cent of Oregon Liquor Control Commission revenues to be turned over to counties; a law making a misdemeanor for an unrelated adult to live in the home of a welfare recipient or be supported by the family's welfare grant; legislation to permit counties to set indicated speed limits on county roads; a law to bring school buildings within the scope of county zoning; a retirement plan for county officials; the state to reimburse counties for costs incurred as the result of a mistake on election ballots; repeal of the law requiring monthly publication of county expenditures; no change

### Commission To Open Bids

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Highway Commission will open bids here Dec. 9 on 20 projects worth \$8,800,000. They include these jobs costing more than \$1 million each:

- Grading and paving 7.16 miles of the Pacific Highway between Rice Hill and Oakland, grading and oiling 3.9 miles of the Coos-Bay-Roseburg Highway east of Myrtle Point, and grading and paving 3.56 miles of the Columbia River Highway west of Cascade Locks.

The projects include:

- Umatilla—Grade and pave .69 miles of S. E. 9th St.-S. W. 4th St. section of Pendleton-John Day (northbound) highway in Pendleton.
- Union—Grade and pave 2.87 miles of Rhinehart-Elgin section of Wallowa Lake Highway, 1.2 miles south of Elgin.

### Lusk To Sit On High Court

SALEM (AP)—Former Supreme Court Justice Hall S. Lusk will return to the court in January in a temporary capacity, Chief Justice William McAllister said today.

Lusk, a member of the court since 1937, resigned last March when he was appointed to succeed the late Sen. Richard L. Neuberger in the U. S. Senate. Lusk's Senate term ended election day.

McAllister said that when Lusk takes over his pro tem duties, the court will be able to do away with its system of having two circuit justices act as temporary supreme justices. This system has been in use for the past 18 months to help the court catch up with its backlog of cases.

The high court's docket now is almost current, McAllister said that with Lusk added to the bench, it will be able to keep it current.

"We are very pleased that Mr. Justice Lusk will again be sitting with us as a justice of the Supreme Court. Because of his long judicial experience and notable ability, his services will be of great value to the court," McAllister said.

There are seven regular justices.

### City Hall Sold By Councilmen

EUGENE (AP)—Sale of Eugene's city hall was approved Thursday night by the City Council—subject to voters' approval later of bonds to build a new city hall.

The corner location of the hall was purchased by Pacific First Federal Savings and Loan Assn. for future use. Pacific First was the only bidder on the property and submitted an offer more than \$100,000 over the appraised price.

The sales contract gives the city use of the building for up to four years. It provides that the sale is conditional upon voter approval of a bond issue by May, 1962, for construction of a new city hall in a civic center location.

The council will decide later on which of two alternate bids to accept. One offers \$267,200 for the property, with payment at time of delivery. The other offers \$251,160 with payment by Nov. 9, 1963, or one year prior to delivery of the site, at the council's option.

### Dams Damaged By Flash Flood

PORTLAND (AP)—Flood damage to two coffer dams at Portland's Bull Run project was estimated Friday night at \$15,000.

The dams were washed out by a flash flood earlier in the day. They had been built to divert water so construction could continue on the main dam which holds back Portland's water supply.

Commissioner Mark A. Grayson said the damage will delay construction on the main dam. He was unable to estimate how long the flood was caused by recent heavy rains.

### Suits Total \$200,000 In Accident

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Three damage suits totaling nearly \$200,000 were filed Thursday as a result of the Nov. 7 cab-auto collision that resulted in the wrong identification of a dead airline stewardess.

Killed in the Bayshore Freeway collision were cab driver Harry Glick and stewardess Joan Anne Frost, 26, Philadelphia. Among the four injured was Mary Hawthorne, 26, Jackson Heights, N.Y., who was at first believed dead instead of Miss Frost.

All three suits were filed against Willard Joseelyn, driver of the car which collided with the cab in which the stewardesses were riding; Union Oil Co., owner of the car; Barrett Transportation Co., owner of the cab; and L. C. Smith Co., contracting firm which had been working on the freeway.

A \$100,000 suit was filed on behalf of the Philadelphia parents of Miss Frost. A second suit asked \$50,000 plus medical expenses for Sheila C. Murray, New York, an injured stewardess. A third suit asked \$35,000 plus medical costs for Teresa E. Di Placido, Philadelphia, another injured stewardess. Both Miss Murray and Miss Di Placido have been released from the hospital.

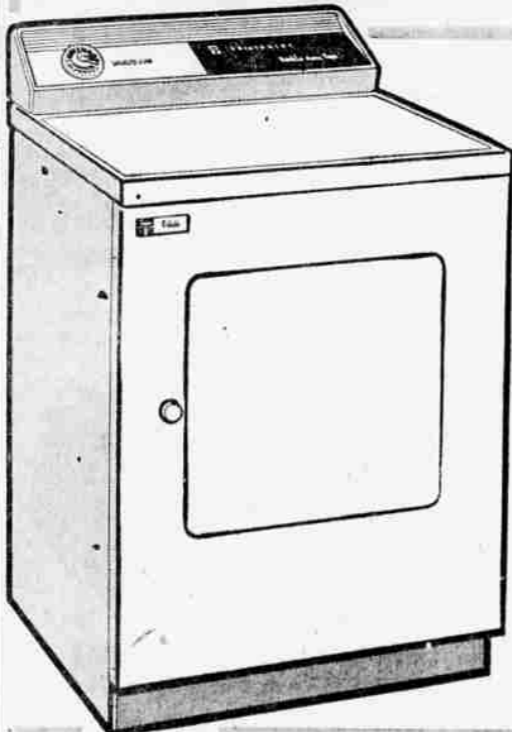
The suits charged faulty operation of the auto, which jumped the dividing line and crashed into the cab. They also charged inadequate precautions on the freeway by the construction firm.

The view from the 1,472-foot Empire State Building reaches as far as 50 miles into five states.

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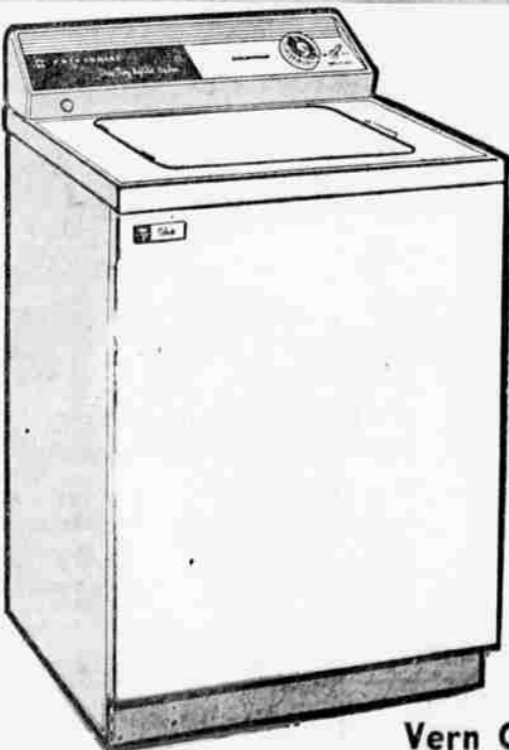
