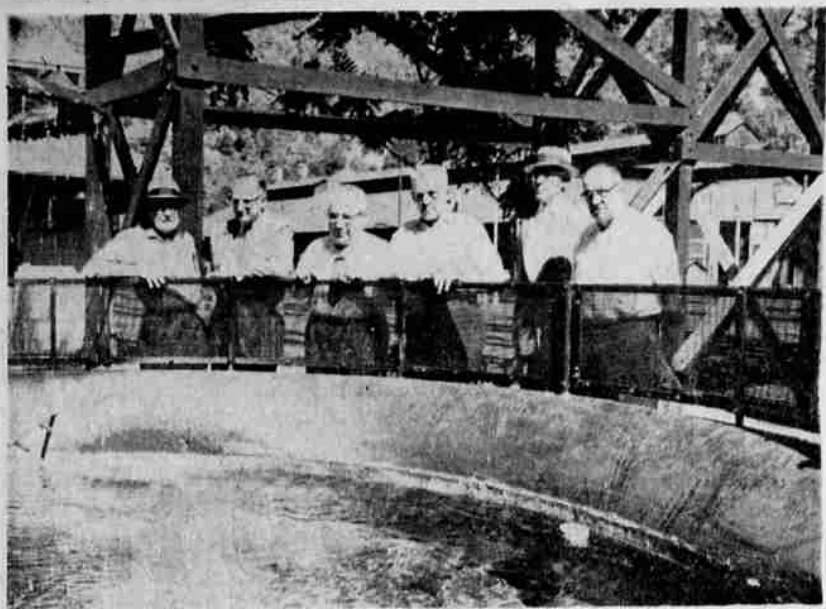

Bald Mountain Lumber Co. Buys Timber On Gulch Unit

MONTAGUE — Bald Mountain Lumber Company of Montague, bid \$83,480 recently for 7,900,000 board feet of pine and fir timber appraised at \$40,435 in the Kelley Gulch unit, Salmon River working circle, Klamath National Forest. The bid was successful.

Pine Mountain Lumber Company of Yreka was the lone competitive bidder during an oral auction in the Warrens Building, Yreka, Tuesday.

The area contained an estimated 200,000 board feet of ponderosa pine appraised at \$7.15 per thousand, and 600,000 board feet of sugar pine, appraised at \$12.35 per thousand, a small amount of white and Shasta red fir, appraised at \$5.15 per thousand, and 7,100,000 feet of Douglas fir, estimated to be worth \$4.45 per thousand, and a nominal amount of knobcone pine, appraised at \$3.15 per thousand.

The purchaser bid \$44.50 per thousand feet of ponderosa pine, \$14.25 for sugar pine, \$3.15 for white and red fir, \$9.30 for Douglas fir and \$3.15 for knobcone pine.

Siskiyou Sheriff Lists His Cases

YREKA — Siskiyou County Sheriff A. B. Cottar said his department handled the following cases Nov. 14 and 15:

Siskiyou Firm Wins Awards At State Fair

YREKA—Products of Siskiyou Stone, Inc., of Yreka and Montague won a series of awards at the recent California State Fair and the Los Angeles County Fair.

W. D. Houston, company president, said a complete exhibit won a first place award at the state fair.

Samples of polished granite, building stone, cement products and polished marble earned four blue ribbons at the Los Angeles fair, Houston said.

He said material for the exhibit originated within a 38-mile radius of Yreka.

The company's processing plant in Montague still is under construction. Houston said the corporation has spent \$300,000 in development and another \$100,000 is expected to be spent before full operation is possible.

About 50 men will work in the plant and quarries, he added. The plant should be ready for full operation in about six months. It currently produces rubble and cinders for building use.

Houston said about 100 persons hold about 5,000 shares of stock in the company.

Purington, during a recent board meeting, protested the new rental rates as exorbitant. Various county officials recommended the rates be hiked.

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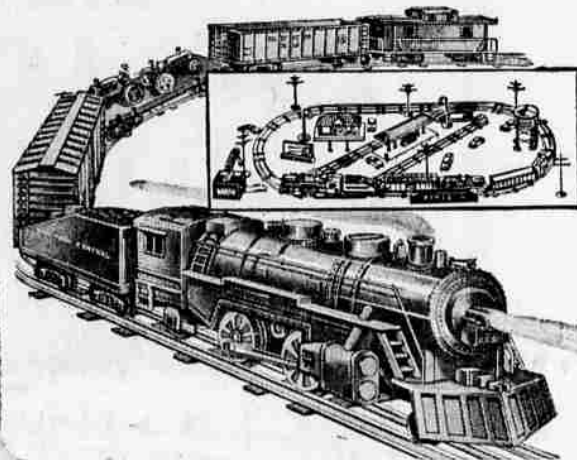
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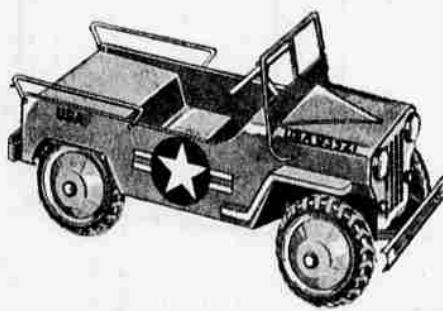
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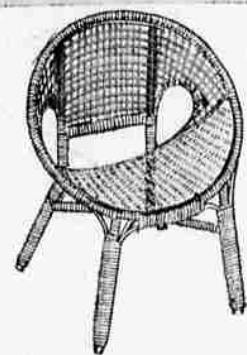
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CHAMBER COMMENTS

Organization of the chamber's work committees for 1960-61 is about completed, following President Bob Kent's appointment of directors in charge of the various groups. The naming of chairmen and organizational meetings of the committees are expected within the next several days.

R. P. Laudenschlager, newly elected treasurer of the chamber, will supervise the work of the Area Beautification Committee. James Bocchi will direct the activities of the Aviation Committee, and Dr. Mel Amsberry will continue to head up the important program of the Community Hospital Committee.

The Forest Products Committee, organized last year as an Industrial Development sub-committee, swings out on its own this year under the direction of John Moehl, while James Stillwell, chairman of the Industrial Development Committee last year, will serve as that group's director during the next 11 months. Frank Tarr will continue as director-in-charge of the Local and State Affairs Committee which will find its activities greatly expanded with the convening of the Legislature in January.

The chamber's Membership Committee, known as The Eye Openers, will remain under the direction of J. D. Monteith. Noel Flynn will assume direction of the OTI and Public Schools Committee. Richard Beesley will head the Rates and Traffic group, and Ralph Hunter will provide the direction for the Roads and Highways Committee.

Work of the chamber's Taxation Committee will be under the direction of Duke Zamsky. The Tourist and Convention Committee, with participation in the 1961 Los Angeles Sports Show on its agenda, will have Bob Mest as its director, and Mel Miller will again serve as director-in-charge of the important Upper Klamath Lake Development Committee.

You can save a lot of money and avoid a lot of grief by exercising ordinary common sense. The following suggestions may also be helpful.

Ignore all "something-for-nothing" propositions. Be wary of those letters bearing faraway postmarks that begin "Dear

Friend: Here is a thrilling offer you won't want to miss," and go on to offer some unknown brand of merchandise for less than cost. And finally, keep these points in mind if you should receive any unordered merchandise.

You are not obliged to acknowledge receipt of it; to return it; to pay for it, unless used, or to keep it beyond a reasonable time, if the sender should call for it, in person, within a reasonable time, you are obliged to surrender it—but that seldom happens.

The practical way to curb the sending of unordered merchandise—and that includes Christmas cards—is to make the practice unprofitable.
