Kiwanis Club Foundation Outlined To Member Meet

Formation of the Kiwanis Foundation was announced by Greer Drew at the regular Thursday noon meeting of the service club at the Willard Hotel.

The foundation has been under study and planning for the past several years. Members of the club were presented with a printed folder on the formation of the foundation and its purpose.

Drew outlined the information to members, pointing out that the foundation is organized to promote charitable and educational opportunities through the receipt of monies or property, by gift or bequest, to administer such monies and property, and to award the benefits from such principal to qualified candidates for charitable and educational purposes.

Contributions to the foundation may be made in a number of ways. A Kiwanian qualifies as a "donor member" when he contributes \$10 or more in one lump sum; he qualifies as a "sustaining member" by contributing \$10 per year to the foundation.

A Kiwanian may qualify as a "life member" by contributing a minimum of \$500 to the foundation.

Dr. George A. Massey, one of the senior members of the club, became a "life member" even before Drew finished his presentation. He sent a note to the head table pledging himself as a \$500 contributor to the foundation.

A special planned investment procedure was also outlined for the foundation in its founding principles. Drew, past president of the Kiwanis Club and a director of the foundation, noted that corporation papers on the foundation had been filed in December 1959.

The president and vice president of the club will serve on the foundation board. The remaining three trustees shall be elected by the Board of Directors of the Kiwanis Club.

Rayburn Says Congress To Pass Aid, Care Bills

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Speaker Sam Rayburn, D-Tex., predicted today that the new Congress would pass bills to aid depressed areas, housing and school construction and raise the minimum wage.

Rayburn also listed a farm bill and medical care for the aged as among "the principal things that we will try to get to early in the session and get through with as early as possible."

The veteran House leader indicated he foresaw no chance of a tax cut but said he hoped Congress would close some tax loopholes. He said he did not look upon the oil depletion allowance as a loophole, however.

Rayburn, 78, who has served as speaker longer than any man in history, made the statements in a copyrighted interview with U. S. News and World Report at his home in Bonham, Tex.

He predicted that President John F. Kennedy and the Democratic leadership in Congress would work well together. The fact that the White House and Congress will be controlled by the same party "will make a tremendous difference," he said.

New Budget Is Balanced

SALEM (AP)—The budget that Gov. Mark Hatfield will submit to the 1961 Legislature will be disclosed Dec. 1, state Finance Director Freeman Holmer said today.

This proposed budget, for the two years beginning next July 1, probably will be considerably larger than the \$312 million general fund budget for the current biennium.

Holmer said the budget would be balanced without asking for any increased taxes.

The reasons the budget will be bigger are that the governor is asking for increased funds for education, higher state salaries, and medical care for the aged.

Teacher Plan To Legislature

PORTLAND (AP)—The next session of the legislature will be asked to approve a program which would permit teachers and school administrators to establish an organization similar to the Oregon State Bar or the state medical society.

The organization would have a commission on professional equity and practice which would police the teaching profession.

The program was outlined at a meeting of the Oregon Education Association's Commission on Teacher Education and Professional Standards by Dr. D. David Darland, an officer of the National Education Association.

Court Mulls Voter Laws

WASHINGTON (UPI)—For the second time this session, the Supreme Court today opened the way for federal court intervention in the treatment of voters under state political apportionment laws.

In today's action, the court granted a hearing to a group of Tennesseeans who challenged the way seats in the state General Assembly were allotted.

This means the court will soon schedule arguments in the case and deliver a written opinion later.

Last week, the court directed a lower federal court to reconsider the gerrymandering of the Alabama community of Tuskegee on grounds that Negroes were deliberately fenced out of their voting rights in the city.

The decision to review the Tennessee case went even further inasmuch as no question of race was involved.

In other actions today, the Supreme Court:

—Denied without comment a complaint of scientist Linus C. Pauling who last summer fought a Senate demand that he disclose the names of distributors of a petition against further nuclear testing.

—Declined to intervene in a Maryland Supreme Court ruling which barred a retailer from suing another for cutting minimum prices set by a manufacturer under the state's fair trade law.

—Let stand a California ruling that gas sales by pipeline direct from a producer to a single industrial customer are exempt from state regulation.

Experts Design Space Shield

SEATTLE (AP)—Boeing scientists are working on a shield of electricity to cloak space vehicles and protect them and their occupants from the man-killing radiation of outer space.

A company spokesman says a blanket of negatively charged electricity would enclose spacecraft to repel other negatively charged particles like electrons.

The radiation shielding would force radioactive electrons from the paths of the space vehicles.

The company spokesman said the cloak would protect spacecraft from the massive Van Allen radiation belt circling the earth like a huge doughnut. The belt is considered a major barrier against space travel.

Wool Growers Meet

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Wool Growers Association went into its first general session of its annual convention Monday.

Committee meetings opened the annual three-day session Sunday. James Short, Oregon director of agriculture, and Kenneth Quast, counsel for the American Sheep Producers, were scheduled to speak at the general sessions.

Resolutions and committee reports are expected to reach the convention floor Tuesday.

Judge Dismisses Charge, Finds Confession Faulty

The cattle rustling case against a 27-year-old Chiloquin man, Worden Gale Eggsman, was dismissed Monday afternoon when Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg granted a motion to quash the indictment against Eggsman.

The motion was made on behalf of Eggsman by his attorney, Hal F. Coe, on the grounds that a written confession was obtained illegally by livestock inspectors Eldon Beckner and Everett Malone.

"Eggsman was railroaded right down the track," Coe said. "The so-called confession was made after the officers promised leniency." The Chiloquin man had been accused of stealing a calf belonging to George Hagelstein of Chiloquin on Oct. 15.

In making his ruling, Judge

Vandenberg deplored tactics used by the livestock inspectors and Chiloquin Police Chief Lou Jones. The judge said Eggsman was confronted by officers on four different days and was jailed although he wasn't under arrest. Judge Vandenberg alluded to statements made to the effect that someone would talk to the district attorney and the judge if Eggsman signed a confession.

"The element of fear was used to exact a confession," the judge said. "Nobody is going to tell me how a case will be decided. The motion to quash is allowed."

Another motion to quash is pending before the court. Arguments will resume Tuesday morning on a motion by attorney Richard Boesley to quash the concealing stolen property indictment against Ralph D. Huitt, 30, Beatty, on the grounds that two people from the district attorney's office were in the grand jury room at the same time.
