

Webb, O'Malley In Center Of Stormy Stage

NEW YORK (AP)—Del Webb and Walter O'Malley, the two titans of the major leagues, were expected to hold the center of the stormy stage today as the beleaguered American League resumed its formidable task of locating a franchise in Los Angeles.

Webb, co-owner of the New York Yankees, and O'Malley, head of the Los Angeles Dodgers, arrived here this morning for a summit meeting in Commissioner Ford Frick's office with league president Joe Cronin of the American League and Warren Giles of the National League.

O'Malley made his position quite clear even before he left the West Coast.

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The position of Webb and O'Malley is just as plain. They are determined to grant a franchise to Los Angeles, and in 1961, O'Malley notwithstanding.

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kind of a fair and reasonable settlement with O'Malley. Now it's up to the commissioner to weigh all the evidence and make his decision.

While in Los Angeles, Webb conferred with Kenyon Brown, former stockholder in the Detroit Tigers, on the prospect of Brown heading a syndicate, including hotel owner Conrad Hilton, to take over the Los Angeles franchise. He was expected to make his report at the league meeting.

Charles A. Finley, who last week offered to invest \$5 million of his own money if granted the LA franchise, has been receiving support from American League backers.

Finley's staunchest supporter is Frank Lane, general manager of the Indians.

"I think, along with several others, that the American League is fortunate to have a fellow like Finley who, at least on five different occasions, has attempted to buy a baseball franchise. As far back as six years ago he tried to buy the Philadelphia Athletics."

Hank Greenberg and Bill Veck, who at one time were interested in acquiring the Los Angeles franchise themselves, are other boosters of Finley. Only a week ago

he termed "its abortive attempt to expand," and predicted that the two newest members—Washington and Los Angeles—would forfeit their franchises a month after the opening of the 1961 season.

Rickey, who long has professed the only true expansion is a third major league, also decried the National League's announced plans to grant franchises to New York and Houston to operate in 1962.

"Both moves are illogical to the point of absurdity," he said. "The new teams cannot endure. It will be a matter of years before the ninth and tenth place teams can progress to the point of respectability."

The already clouded future of the American League received an additional jolt Monday night from Branch Rickey, the retiring head of the ill-fated Continental League, the would-be third major circuit.

In a farewell speech to the press, the 79-year-old baseball executive declared the American League would soon regret what

Stilt Regains Score Lead

NEW YORK (AP)—Wilt Chamberlain of Philadelphia has regained the National Basketball Association individual scoring lead despite a tremendous scoring spree by Elgin Baylor of Los Angeles.

Chamberlain leads the West Coast flash 549-513, but the Philadelphia has played one more game than Baylor, who set an NBA single game record by scoring 71 points against New York last week, and got 52 in another game.

Baylor, however, has averaged 36.64 points a game to 36.60 for Chamberlain. Both marks are the highest in the 15-year history of the league.

Oscar Robertson of Cincinnati continues in third place with 43.3 points.

AFL Seeks Linemen

DALLAS, Tex. (UPI)—The backs may grab the headlines and draw the crowds, but in the American Football League the search is on the men in the front lines to open the holes and make it all possible in the first place.

In a partial player draft conducted during the weekend by the club owners of the eight AFL teams, 23 of the first 32 players named were linemen.

Ken Rice, a rugged 250-pound tackle from Auburn was No. 1 choice in the draft. The 6-3 Bainbridge, Ga., husky — rated 62 — both a line blocker and a vicious tackler for the Plainsmen — was picked up by the Buffalo Bills, who had first call.
