New Tiger Manager
No 'Miracle Man'

DETROIT (AP)—Bob Scheffing steps into one of baseball's most dangerous managerial jobs in Detroit with no illusions he'll be an overnight miracle man.

The Tigers hired him Monday as their eighth manager since 1952, knowing it'll take time—perhaps several years—before they can challenge for a pennant.

Tiger President John Fetzer spoke of how well Scheffing handles young players. Fetzer said he is patient enough to await their development.

He broke a long-standing club policy of one-year contracts and signed Scheffing through 1962.

"He knows how to develop young talent and he's the man who can do the job for us," said Fetzer. "He came about as highly recommended as any manager could be. Everyone we spoke to has a high regard for him."

Scheffing was manager of the Chicago Cubs for three seasons, 1957-59. The turnover on the Cubs is about as quick as with Detroit, and second-division finishes are as frequent.

"I don't feel I'm qualified to talk about the Tigers' problems right now," said Scheffing, who will receive a reported \$35,000 a year.

"I'm no miracle man, but I've always wanted to manage a young team and I'm sure it'll improve. It's a team with a lot of good players coming up from the minors and there are enough stars on the club who are solid major leaguers. I'm talking about Don Mossi, Jim Bunning, Al Kaline and Rocky Colavito and some others."

Scheffing, 45, has been in the National League all but two of his 15-year career as a big league manager, coach and player.

"I hope to make some inter-league deals," said the rugged catcher. "There are some players over there who'd look good in Detroit uniforms."

Army, Navy
Each Shed
Big Tears

NEW YORK (UPI) — Traditional crying towels hung from dressing room lockers of the Army and Navy head coaches today and "tears" were shed over the devastating obstacles each faced in Saturday's football meeting between the service schools.

Coach Dale Hall of Army is mourning that "somebody's crazy" in making Navy only a 1½ point favorite in the annual classic.

"Navy should be a big favorite and we should be the distinct underdog," the former Army quarterback emphasized at a football writers' luncheon Monday.

"I wish Navy were heavily favored to beat Army," coach Wayne Hardin sighed when reached by telephone at the Naval Academy.

"Perhaps Hall can convince his Army players that we have the better team," he added. "In fact, if Hall feels Navy has such tremendous power, I would appreciate it if he would post the number of points by which Navy should be favored on the scoreboard before the game."

Navy does enter the game with a more impressive record, having won eight and lost one, a 19-0 defeat by Duke, Army has won six, tied one and lost to Penn State and Nebraska.

"There'll be some head-knocking out there," Hall said. "Navy's got a great football player in Joe Bellino and a fine team, while we're in a rebuilding stage and have no stars, except Al Vanderbush."

Hardin disagreed with Hall's claim of a limited array of Army talent.

"I have tremendous respect for the entire Army team," Hardin hammered back. "They have other stars beside Vanderbush. On the whole, Army has a better team this year than the squad Navy faced last season. True, there may not be as many stars as in 1959, but they're good."

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — University of Washington's Rose Bowl bound Huskies grabbed four places and UCLA, the third-place finisher in the Big Five, got three on the 1960 United Press All-Coast college football team named today.

The Huskies, making their second straight trip to Pasadena after posting a 9-1 record this season and going through the second straight year without a loss to a West Coast team, got tackle Kurt Genger, guard Chuck Allen and center Roy McKasson on the first-team line. And George Fleming, the great break-away, went into the backfield.

The UCLA men chosen were guard Jack Metcalf, end Marv Luster and Bill Kilmer, the fine tailback.

The other four spots went to four different schools. Hugh Campbell, the national pass-catching champion from Washington State, drew down one end berth; Steve Barnett, 255-pound Oregon sophomore, is one of the tackles; and Terry Baker, Oregon State sophomore sensation, is in the backfield.

EUGENE (AP)—The University of Oregon football squad Monday named Dave Grosz, starting quarterback the past three seasons, its most valuable player of 1960.

He received the annual Hoffman Award at a banquet Monday night.

Grosz completed his career with a total offense record of 3,000 yards, just 100 less than Oregon's all-time record. He also was an effective blocker, defensive back and team leader.

The award presented annually to the player who accomplishes most despite injuries went to tackle Riley Mattson.

Grosz is a graduate of Kent-Meridian, Wash., High School and Mattson of Grant High in Portland.

Coach Len Casanova told the squad he was proud of the way it had developed. He said, "It was a squad which hustled all the time and one which had wonderful morale."

Club members credited his play with repeatedly stopping Oregon State threats when the teams played to a 14-14 tie last Saturday.

Honorable mention went to Oregon State tackle Mike Kline and Oregon center Joe Clesceri.

Only linemen received mention, and it was only the second time of the season that a lineman received the award.
