

Nixon Hopes Kennedy Will Control Spending

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon said in a filmed television interview Sunday night he shared the hope with millions of other Americans that President-elect John F. Kennedy would not start a spending spree after taking office.

Nixon granted the first personal interview of his Florida vacation to WPST television news director Bill Bayer, an old friend, before leaving Saturday on a trip to Nassau.

Nixon said he hoped that big-spending programs of the Democrats would have "tough sledding" in Congress and added, "that's as it should be. It would be bad for the country."

On other matters, Nixon urged the Kennedy administration to

keep a watchful eye on Fidel Castro's moves in Latin America.

"We cannot stand by and see Communists infiltrate and take over in Latin America," the vice president said. "If countries request aid we should step in and give them the assistance they need."

Nixon said Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev would make a fatal mistake if he believed "he can push us beyond a point where we will react."

"We'll react very strongly if they attempt to push us around," Nixon said. "We must stand firm and outlast those who are the enemies of the Free World."

Nixon said he could not determine the exact reason for losing the presidential election to Kennedy. But he indicated Kennedy told him at their meeting here last week that key Democratic victories came in states where there was considerable unemployment.

"They were able to promise more than we were," Nixon said.

He said he would postpone serious thought on his future plans until he returned to Washington, but revealed he had received "a number of offers from most of the states."

He squelched a rumor that he would enter Thomas E. Dewey's law firm in New York by saying, "I do not intend to join any law firm in New York and that includes Mr. Dewey's."

Raul Castro Criticizes U.S. Caribbean Maneuver

HAVANA (AP)—Cuban Armed Forces Minister Raul Castro says President Eisenhower's dispatch of U.S. warships to the Caribbean is criminal and "unmasks United States' puppets in Central America."

But the younger brother of Prime Minister Fidel Castro in an angry speech Sunday refrained from rattling Soviet rockets as a threat to the United States. The omission was in line with a trend noted recently in speeches by other top figures in the Castro regime.

The softer tone lent weight to speculation that Moscow had nudged Castro to take the Soviet Union out of the Cuban revolution's frontlines to preserve other

Soviet irons in Latin America. Premier Khrushchev himself said recently his rocket offer to defend Cuba was "symbolic."

The younger Castro told his audience of petroleum workers that Eisenhower's order of last week, made in response to requests by Guatemala and Nicaragua, represented "a warning by Yankee imperialism to all the peoples of Latin America that it is not going to permit Cuban-style revolutions."

Castro said Cuba supports countries in revolt in Latin America but he denied that Cuba had given any direct military assistance to rebels in the recent uprisings in Guatemala and Nicaragua.

"Our best help to them," he said, "is to preserve the revolution here, which will be a great contribution to the final liberation of all our brothers of Latin America."

Castro's speech came only hours after the shooting of a young U.S. Embassy clerk by a Cuban army captain during a scuffle outside a Havana nightclub.

Wayne Henderson, 22, of Pasadena, Calif., a communications clerk in the embassy, was seriously wounded Saturday night.

Henderson's condition was described as satisfactory after a 2½-hour operation for the removal of the bullet, which entered his body near the hip.

Cuban police said the shooting by Capt. Jorge Robreno was accidental.

Move Described As Retaliation

WASHINGTON (UPI) — State Department officials said today that Russia's expulsion of a U.S. air attaché appeared to be a "propaganda retaliation" for the recent espionage indictment of a Russian employe of the United Nations.

They referred to Igor Y. Melekh, chief of the Russian language section, Office of Conference Services, in the U.S. Secretariat. Melekh was indicted by a federal grand jury Oct. 27 on charges that he tried to obtain aerial photographs of Chicago.

The U.S. attaché, Irving T. McDonald Jr., Boston, was ordered to leave Russia with his wife and two children by Friday on charges of "activities incompatible with his diplomatic status."

The State Department had no formal comment because it has not yet received official word of the expulsion. But officials said privately that they were not too surprised by Russia's action.

It was noted that the Soviets on Aug. 10 named McDonald as an accomplice of Col. Edwin M. Kirton, U.S. air attaché in Moscow, who was expelled from Russia for allegedly photographing military objectives.

Although the Russians merely warned McDonald off at the time, the Kremlin presumably kept him in mind for the next time it wanted to oust a U.S. official.

Frank, Sophie Cause Summons

NEW YORK (AP)—The owners of two night clubs where Frank Sinatra and Sophie Tucker performed without valid entertainer's licenses have been summoned to a police department hearing today.

The hearing is part of a widespread investigation into cabarets and the licensing of performers. Over the weekend more than 1,000 police inspected 2,478 cabarets, dance halls and other licensed premises.

Among the 1,218 cabarets inspected, police said they found 114 violations, including those at Jack Silverman's International restaurant where Miss Tucker has been singing, and at Jules Podell's Copacabana, where Sinatra has admitted performing without an identity card.

Miss Tucker, "last of the red hot mamas," ended her engagement on schedule Sunday night. Police said she had been singing at Silverman's International since Oct. 19 with an expired license. Her pianist, Ted Shapiro, had no card.

To sing again in New York City, Miss Tucker need only apply at the division of licenses for a two-year renewal of her identity card, police said.
