Making arrangements for the evening were John Ownes, Jeanne Dixon and Albert Trump.

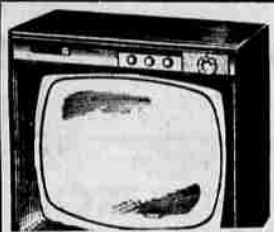
