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Bump Causes Death Dive

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — A car bumped an auto on a highway lashed by rain and wind, state police said, and then veered out of control and skipped over a guard rail into a lake, carrying seven persons to their death.

Sgt. Robert Baker gave that account today as state police investigators continued their probe into the Sunday crash that killed Mr. and Mrs. Howard R. Lemons of Westfir, Ore., and their five young children.

The main part of the story, Baker said, was supplied by Oscar A. Roessler, 42, of Bellevue, Wash., who told police that his auto was struck by another car that then vanished moments later. Baker said Roessler gave this account to police.

Roessler was driving along the highway some 19 miles southeast of here about 5:30 p.m. Sunday. Night had fallen, and heavy rain and wind lashed the area.

A truck passed him. A short time later, as Roessler was driving between 40 and 45 miles an hour, a car started to pass him.

But the car cut in too sharply and its right rear fender struck Roessler's left front fender. The other car, Roessler said, then appeared to go out of control, swerving first to the right, then to the left, and then back to the right.

Roessler said he passed the car as it veered the last time to the right. Roessler said he was busy trying to keep his own car under control, and that when he glanced in his rear view mirror a few moments later, the other auto had vanished.

Roessler went back but could find no sign of the car in the darkness. He could find no place where the guard rail had been smashed.

He tried to telephone police from several homes, but telephone lines all were out from the storm. He then drove toward Oakridge, some 20 miles away, but again was delayed by trees across the road. He was able to reach Oakridge and report to police about 7 p.m.

The search for the missing car started that night. On Monday morning, skindivers found the auto in 25 feet of water, and recovered the bodies.

Baker said that the Lemons car was yellow. There was yellow paint found in the dent in Roessler's car, he said, and smears of yellow paint on the guard rail. But he added that the guard rail was not smashed. The Lemons car, he said, apparently skipped over the top of the 2½-foot high rail, perhaps only brushing it.

Funeral services will be held here at 10 a.m. Friday at the St. Mary's Catholic Church.

Demos Plug For Corbett

PORTLAND (AP)—The Democratic Party's Oregon executive committee today urged election of state Sen. Alfred Corbett, D-Portland, as Senate president.

This put the committee in a direct fight with adherents of Sen. Harry Boivin of Klamath Falls, a Democrat who expects to get nearly unanimous Republican backing to go with some Democratic support.

Corbett is lined up for Senate Democratic votes believed to have 13 Democratic votes lined up for Senate president and the state committee in its Monday night meeting urged those pledged to him to vote for him. Boivin and six others have not been behind Corbett. There are 10 Republicans.

The committee resolution said that the Democrats have a clear Senate majority and only if the party organizes the Senate will the people be able to assess their leadership.
