Roosevelt School Built In September Of 1929

Here is another in a series of historical and informational articles written during the recent National Education Week by faculty members of city schools.

Roosevelt School was completed and occupied for the first time in September, 1929.

The original building contained eight classrooms and two gymnasiums. There were plans for two wings on each end of the building, which were completed in the early '30s.

At that time the cafeteria was completed and Room 1 was used as a manual training room.

Room 5 was the home economics room. Eight grades were contained in the building.

In 1948 the library was made a permanent unit on the northwest end of the building. It contained 1,800 volumes. At present it has approximately 5,000 books.

The new music room was completed in the fall of 1953. Roosevelt was built in the city system to replace the old Central School which used to be in the block where the Medical Dental Building stands.

Members of the school board in 1929 were C. H. Underwood, Leslie Rogers, Mrs. Edna Chambers, Dr. George A. Massey and Charles W. Thomas.

Principals who have been at Roosevelt since it was constructed were Lena Hackett, Carl Muenster, Lowell Kapp, Gary Robertson, Ed Attebury, Darrell Potter and Gerald Clemens.

Teachers there now are as follows:

Police Capture Hitchhiker

OREGON CITY (AP) — State police nabbed a hitchhiker near Wilsonville Tuesday and accused him of taking part in a robbery attempt in which a holdup man was killed.

Donald William Farrell, 30, Hubbard, was fatally wounded Monday night in the attempted robbery at the Wilsonville grocery store of William G. Lowrie, 45. Lowrie's son, Terry, 18, said he fired the fatal bullet.

Two other holdup men fled in a car, then raced away on foot after the car smashed into a utility pole.

Police arrested Theodore M. Logsdan, 24, Portland, as he tried to hitch a ride on a road leading to Newberg. He was charged with armed robbery and bond was set at \$10,000. He was held at the Clackamas County jail.

Police said they still are looking for a third holdup man.

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Violent Court Battle Involves Tough Tomcat

ALAMEDA, Calif. (UPI)—Every time the mailman brings a bundle of letters to the Russel Bowler home addressed simply to Herman...

A bar in the Oakland financial district set up a jar labeled "Herman's defense fund" and within a few hours it was filled with greenbacks and silver...

And when President Eisenhower visited San Francisco last month, he was reported to have commented with some amusement over the fact he had to share the front pages with Herman...

Herman is a 2½-year-old, 10-pound orange and white striped tomcat who is the storm center of a violent neighborhood quarrel that has been carried to the courts.

Mr. and Mrs. J. Howard Cook have sued Herman's owners for \$3,500. They claim Herman attacked Mrs. Cook on two occasions, broke a window, ripped a screen door and "beat up" several of the Cooks' 12 Siamese cats.

Make Surgery Offer
Furthermore, the Cooks want something done to control Herman. They offered to pay the cost of surgery to quiet his allegedly roughneck, amorous behavior.

But the Bowlers counter-sued for \$1,500, arguing that Herman is only a "red-blooded American tomcat... led astray by the plaintiffs' females, being the more deadly of the species."

A hearing on the case was scheduled today before Alameda County Superior Judge Ralph Hoyt.

Mrs. Cook said she was not concerned about Herman disrupting the blood line of her Siamese pets. She has "her own tomcat," she said, and anybody who knows anything about cats knows that the Siamese will have nothing to do with another tom.

"Everybody thinks Herman is a big Don Juan when he's really just a Jack the Ripper," Mrs. Cook said.

Herman Fights Back
"You go 'sst' at any other 'cat in the world and he'll run away. Herman stands there and goes 'sst' right back and then advances toward you."

Herman's owner, an Alameda woman, denies that Herman is a bully.

"Everybody seems to think I have a lion on my hands," he said. "But he's just an old tomcat who chases every female."

"And I'm not going to have him neutered, either. It's a matter of principle."

Herman hit the headlines again Tuesday when Mrs. Bowler reported to police he was a cat-nap victim. She said he had been taken from their basement and she searched for 2½ hours with a flashlight before finding him bruised and bloody in a neighbor's basement.

When she brought Herman home, she said, her husband took one look at him and yelled: "This is war!"

Police are investigating.

Ski Bowl To Operate
