# Second Fiddle Now One-Man Band

NEW YORK (UPI)—Al Dorow, who always has played second fiddle in financial football, had to be regarded today as a one-man band.

It's been almost a decade since he proved his touchdown talents by leading Michigan State on a 26-game winning streak. And ever since then as a pro griddle he has stood in somebody else's shadow.

Until this season in general and Thursday in particular.

For the durable Dorow put on a one-man Thanksgiving Day show as he led the New York Titans of the American Football League to a breathless 41-35 victory over the Dallas Texans.

All he did was:

—Pass for two touchdowns, set up two others with his aerials and score another.

—Complete 21 of 33 passes for

301 yards.

—Pick up 40 yards rushing to personally account for all but 58 of the Titans' 399 total yards gained.

"You don't do it without the blocking," shrugged the balding, cigar-smoking 28-year-old modestly.

Played Second Fiddle

That's a time-proven cliché in football. But he passed off the times he nimble side-stepped on-rushing linemen to get off pin-point tosses or rolled out around the end to keep the defense honest. For his was a performance which made you wonder why other teams had him playing second fiddle.

Washington's Redskins did when they used him behind Eddie LeBaron. So did the Philadelphia Eagles, who gave first call to Norm Van Brocklin. And even Toronto of the Canadian League

had him only as a relief for Tobin Rote.

True, the American Football League doesn't play the brand of ball they do in the long-established National League. In its first season it has many weaknesses; many soft spots. But it is, on the whole good football with its full share of professional ruggedness. When a 235-pounder hits you it doesn't matter whether his name is Bronko Nagurski or Joe Zilch. It hurts and you've gotta go.

Sparks Titan Attack

Thus Dorow as the keystone of the Titan attack was the number one target of the Texans and he earned everything he got. Which was plenty.

The Titans went 75 yards for a touchdown. Dorow passed for 36 yards and ran for three in that drive, copping it with his 45-yard touchdown pass to Don Maynard.

The Titans went 84 yards to score. Dorow passed for 61 of those yards and rolled out from the three to score it.

New York drove 57 yards to score. Dorow's passes contributed every inch and, from the one, he crossed up the Texas defense by pitching to Art Powell.

Then it was a 70-yard drive. Dorow ran for 14 in two tries and passed for 46 yards—meaning he figured in 60 of the 70 yards which ended when Bill Mathis banged over from the one, where Dorow put it with a 12-yard run.

The Titans scored finally on a 55-yard march. Dorow passed for 38 yards which put it on the two. Dewey Bohling carried it in.

Throw in Roger Donahoe's 57-yard touchdown sprint with a Texas fumble and Bill Shockley's live placements and that gives you 41 points. Making quite a soloist out of the second fiddle.

## Tips For Public Shooting Grounds

Along with a big percentage of the other gunners in this area I have been making rather heavy use of the public shooting grounds so gracefully provided for the sportsmen by the state.

As a result of these trips I have come up with a few suggestions that I think might profitably be employed in the operation of these grounds. Not that I am complaining or trying to make it sound like the state had let the hunters down. Not a bit of it. Just a few little ideas that I believe would make a more pleasant situation for all concerned.

I would not suggest expansion of the present shooting grounds. In fact I would suggest taking some of the actual field shooting ground away from its present status and changing it to another.

For instance, I would put up a shotgun target range. This could be either in the open or at least partially sheltered. If sheltered it would draw a larger attendance on those days when the weather is inclement. I would have three stations here, 150, 200 and 250 yards from the firing line. At each station there would be several inflatable rubber decoys in both duck and goose species. Any watergunner managing to puncture one of these dummies would be awarded a small cash prize.

by the state. Since no one has yet killed a duck at any of these ranges it wouldn't cost the state a dime. But it would give the confirmed barrel stretchers a chance to compete with each other and might keep them out of the field where all they do is drive away the birds that want to come in to a decent range.

Then I would set up another firing point, at some distance from everything else, for the benefit of those who wish merely to fire their guns and hear the sound of the bang. There seem to be an awful lot of these people who go out into the public shooting grounds and it seems to me they should be taken care of.

I would suggest that the state provide enough room here for several contests at once. You could have one group competing to see who could fire three rounds (the legal limit) the fastest. Another group could be contesting holty to see who could fire the most shots in any given length of time. Again I should think it proper to offer a small prize at the end of the day.

Then there should be a style room for the use of those who delight in bright clothing. A place where the hunters, if you can call them that, could get together in a well-lighted room with several three-way mirrors and admire each other's yellow hats, red hunting coats and bright,

flashing silver belt buckles, canes, thermos bottles and so on. Perhaps a small prize for the most colorful costume of the day.

Of course there are other little niceties that could be provided as soon as the revenues allowed. We could have rain barrels for leather-lunged nimrods to shout down. If these were equipped with decibel meters it would give these early morning game frighteners a chance to compare lung power with others of their own ilk.

A special compound might be set up for the dog callers. This would afford a podium, as it were, for those who spend so much of their time hollering at their dogs while in the field. If costs allowed we could equip this spot with plastic dummy dogs and provide the contestants with a supply of stones and clods to fling at them.

Another very important addition, if room could be found for it, would be a pre-shooting hole. This would be a typical duck marsh and could even be placed under cover if you wanted to. It would consist solely of a nice looking marsh well populated with birds. Any kind of birds will do, they need not be ducks or geese because these flocks never get around to shooting any of these anyway. They only scare them out so no one else gets any shooting either. In this department the gunners could

start in the darkness of pre-dawn and wade noisily through the water and weeds toward the sound of resting birds. When they got close the birds, being well trained, would flush with a great roar and fly away, leaving only an empty marsh. Then the hunter (?) could go in and call it a day while telling his troubles to friends at the bar.

I might suggest that if the state installed a bar it would make enough money to support the whole shebang right there alone. But at any rate such a dummy pond with its early leaving birds would delight the souls of those who invariably wade directly out into a mass of feeding birds and put them out of the country before shooting time.

Of course these are only a few suggestions. There are hundreds of others and I'm sure if you'll just sit down and think about it for a minute you can come up with any number of better ones. But something should be done to take care of the knuckleheaded percentage of the hunting public. They have earned and richly deserve a place of their own.

As for the real sportsmen and the hunters who know what they are doing, you can forget about them. They'll get along perfectly all right with just what they have. Or they would if they didn't have to contend with the boneheads.

## UPI Names Threesome To Board

NEW YORK (UPI)—Three new coaches will serve on the 1960-61 United Press International basketball coaches rating board, which will begin rating the nation's major collegiate teams weekly for UPI clients after games of Saturday, Dec. 3.

As in the past, five outstanding coaches from each of the seven geographical sections of the country will make up the board. Their weekly ratings have become recognized generally as the most authoritative in college basketball.

The new board members are: George King of West Virginia; Harold Dallmar of Stanford; and Bob Feerick of Santa Clara.

King succeeds Fred Schaus, who left West Virginia to coach the Los Angeles Lakers of the National Basketball Association; Dallmar and Feerick take the places on the board formerly occupied by Pete Newell of California and Phil Woolpert of San Francisco. Newell left the basketball coaching berth at California to step up as athletic director at the university while Woolpert resigned his San Francisco post because of his health.

This will be the 11th season that the nation's foremost college coaches have rated the teams for UPI clients. The board crowned Kentucky champion in 1961 and again in 1952; Indiana in 1953 and 1954; San Francisco in 1955 and 1956; North Carolina in 1957; West Virginia in 1958; Cincinnati in 1959 and California last season.

## OSAA Eyes Tourney Shift

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon School Activities Association met today, expected to take up the question of whether to move the class A-I high school basketball tournament to Portland.

The tournament has been held at Eugene the past 13 years, but recently Portlanders have urged its transfer to Portland's new coliseum in 1961.

Also expected is a Portland Interscholastic League request to allow more than nine football games in the regular season.

## Veteran, Youngster Share Sub-Par Tie

MOBILE, Ala. (AP)—A veteran who hasn't won a tournament in nearly seven years and a young pro seeking his first tournament victory are tied with 6-under par 66 after the first round of the Mobile Open golf tournament.

Freddie Haas, 44, of New Orleans toured the 6,000-yard par 36-36-72 Mobile Municipal in 32-34-66. He birdied six holes and parred the rest.

John Gustin, 28, of Gladwyne, Pa., carded a 33-33-66, sinking seven birdies and going over par only once.

Gustin joined the traveling pros on a full-time basis in August 1959.

The field of 148 will be trimmed to the low 60s and ties after today's second round. Eighteen-hole rounds are scheduled for Saturday and Sunday.

Arnold Palmer, leading money winner of the year, was tied with six others two strokes back of the

leaders. Palmer rejoined the tour here after a two-month layoff. He needs a little more than \$1,100 to become the all-time top money winner for a year.

Haas used a hot putter in smashing par like he owned it. He sank birdie putts of 35, 38, 6, 5 and 3 feet.

Gustin started his par-busting round by dropping a 50-foot putt on the first hole for a birdie.

Jerry Pittman, Tulsa, Okla.; Johnny Pott, Shreveport, La.; Gene Mitchell, Lubbock, Tex.; Gay Brewer Jr., Crystal River, Fla.; Dave Hill, Denver, Colo.; and Frank Boynton, Orlando, Fla.

At 69 were Howie Johnson and Marty Furgol, both of Cog Hill, Ill., and Tony Lema, San Leandro, Calif.

Billy Casper Jr., Apple Valley, Calif., pre-tournament favorite with Palmer, wound up with 74.

## USC Gets Nod Over Irish

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The same lineup that performed so well against UCLA and featured two sophomore stars, quarterback Bill Nelsen and fullback Hal Tobin.

There was a possibility, however, that co-captain George Van Vleet would start at left end because it was his last game. Injuries kept him from starting last week.

The Irish, beset with about as many injuries all season as the Trojans, indicated they too may start a sophomore quarterback, Darryl Lamonica, who hails from nearby Fresno, Calif., but it was likely that junior George Haffner would see most of the playing time.

Haffner does not have as good a percentage record as Lamonica but has completed 30 passes out of 108 for 543 yards this season.

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## Detroit Fans Cheer Wings To Big Win

The Detroit Red Wings knocked the Montreal Canadiens out of first place in the National Hockey League Thanksgiving night and the largest crowd in the history of the Detroit Olympia watched them do it.

Cheered on by a crowd of 15,859, the Red Wings beat the Canadiens 3-1, and broke the three-way tie that had existed for first place. The Chicago Black Hawks moved up to second place with a 2-1 triumph over the Toronto Maple Leafs and the New York Rangers climbed out of the cellar with a 5-3 victory over the Boston Bruins.

Detroit thus was the only team in the league which wound up Thanksgiving Day in the same position it started the holiday night game.

Hank Bassen's goal - tending and tallies by Allan Johnson, Howie Glover and Alex Delvecchio delighted the huge Detroit turnout.

At Chicago, the Black Hawks extended their unbeaten string on home ice to 11 games when Murray Balfour tipped in a last-period goal.

Andy Bathgate and Johnny Wilson each scored two goals for the Rangers at Boston. The defeat was the seventh in the last eight games for the Bruins, who replaced the Rangers in last place.
