

Transient Enters Plea

MEDFORD (AP)—A transient farm worker Wednesday pleaded guilty to a charge of second degree murder and was sentenced to a life term in prison by Circuit Judge Edward Kelly.

The sentence was imposed upon Larry Gene Noah, 20, also known as Leonard Eugene Nelson, who originally was charged with first degree murder in the killing of William Carley Campbell, 55, another harvest worker, beaten to death in a parking lot here last Aug. 13.

Noah had been sentenced to go on trial Dec. 5. But he went into court Wednesday and entered a plea of guilty to the reduced charges.

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Army Lists Deadline

WASHINGTON (UPI)—No more wives and children of soldiers will be sent to Europe or Asia after Jan. 31 and the number of Navy men's dependents overseas will be cut 50 per cent by July 31, 1962.

These steps, part of President Eisenhower's program to stem the flow of American dollars and gold abroad, were announced Wednesday. The Air Force also has banned the shipment of families overseas after Feb. 1.

The President ordered the number of dependents abroad cut from 484,000 to 200,000.

The Army said no dependents will be transported to Europe and Asia after Jan. 31 "until the policies relating to travel of all dependents have been clarified."

Army Secretary Wilber M. Brucker has made known his opposition to the dependent restriction, saying it would hurt Army morale.

The Army's carefully worded statement said it had been working urgently to develop "plans which will carry out the complicated program in an orderly manner."

"The problem is a complex one for the Army primarily because of the large number of Army dependents now overseas in the many affected areas."

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Woolers Ask Tariff Rise

PORTLAND (AP)—The Oregon Wool Growers Association called Tuesday for a tariff increase on imported wool fabrics and "relief of some kind" against importation of Australian lambs and sheep into the United States.

On importation, president Kenneth Johnson of Enterprise said, "We can't ask for a tariff because of world tension, but we are asking for relief of some kind."

We want an increase on tariff or suitable import quotas until we can meet costs of production."

The association ended its annual convention after electing Johnson; Harold A. Cohn, Heppner, first vice president; George Moscrip, Sherwood, second vice president; and Jack Steiner, Fossil, secretary.

Police Crack Betting Ring

PORTLAND (AP)—Ten persons arrested in Portland last week in a nationwide crackdown on unlicensed football betting were indicted by a federal grand jury here Wednesday.

One of them, Benjamin A. Brantner, of the Grande Cafe, appeared at a preliminary hearing and entered a plea of innocent. His bail of \$500 was continued.

The 10 were charged with violation of the federal law requiring a special business license for gambling.
