Lumberjacks Pad String; Fall LC 24-0

EUREKA, Calif. (AP)—Humboldt State won a berth in the western National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics playoff Thursday by walloping Lewis and Clark College of Portland 34-0.
The Dec. 3 playoff game will be held at Eureka. The opponent is yet to be announced. Williamette (8-0) and Whitworth (9-0) are regarded as the chief candidates.

DETROIT (AP)—A Detroit Lions fan full of the holiday spirit grabbed Coach George Wilson by the lapels and spoke in authoritative tones:
"Your offense was clicking and you had those other guys defended perfectly. What more can a guy ask, huh?"

Wilson's reply was: "Three more victories just like this one."
The Detroit coach was grateful for his team's 23-10 victory Thursday that just about knocked the Green Bay Packers out of title consideration in the National Football League's Western Division. Two fumbles and a blocked punt led to all but one score in the nationally televised contest.

Wilson called it his team's finest game of the year. It brought the Lions' record to 4-5.
"We haven't rushed a passer like that in a long, long time," said Wilson. "And that's the biggest thing in football. If you can get to the other club's passer, and protect your own, you can win."

Detroit linemen threw quarterback Bart Starr and Lamar McHan for 60 yards in losses.
Detroit's Jim Ninowski, appearing before 54,123 fans, tossed for 182 yards with 19 completions out of 34 tries.
For the Packers, it was a bitter and frustrating loss to a team they had beaten 28-9 earlier in the season.
Los Angeles draws a bye Sunday, but the other clubs will be in action. The schedule finds Cleveland at St. Louis, Dallas at Chicago, New York at Philadelphia, San Francisco at Baltimore and Washington at Pittsburgh.

Middies Rated Slight Favorite

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Explosive Joe Bellino makes once-beaten Navy a slight favorite over Army Saturday at Philadelphia Stadium in their 61st meeting before 98,816 fans.
Bellino, a senior halfback from Winchester, Mass., whose 104 points make him the second highest scorer in the nation's major college ranks, is the key to Navy's well-balanced offense. Only Duke, which held Bellino scoreless by forcing him inside, has been able to shoot down the high-flying Middies who rank No. 7 in the Associated Press poll.
Army's attack has been made

up of Tom Blanda's passes and the crashes of Al Rushatz, a 190-pound fullback, through the line. The Cadets have a 6-2-1 record, losing to Penn State and Nebraska and tying Pittsburgh. Their fine performance in upsetting Syracuse 9-6 and the statistical edge they held despite their tie with Pitt has drawn solid support to Coach Dale Hall's Cadets.
There will be full pomp and ceremony at the vast concrete stadium which will house its usual sellout crowd. The Cadets and Middies will stage customary parades before the game with kickoff scheduled for 1:30 p. m. and

national network (ABC) television coverage.
If Navy wins, it may go to either the Cotton Bowl in Dallas where it would meet Arkansas or to the Orange Bowl in Miami where Missouri would be the opponent.
Bellino, the man who set a Navy record by scoring three touchdowns against Army in last year's 43-12 rout, probably is the most publicized football player in the nation. His 17 touchdowns and spectacular runs make him a marked man. Only Duke kept Bellino from scoring while the Middies were rolling up an 8-1

record.
Bellino also is a threat as a passer when he runs wide and is a superior quick kicker with a 47.1 yard average.
Quarterback Hal Spooner's passes to halfback John Prichard, end Jim Luper or Bellino balance Bellino's running threat.
Army's Blanda, brother of George Blanda of the pro Houston Oilers of the American Football League, has thrown more of them than Spooner (142 to 91) but each quarterback has a completion average of 58 per cent. Spooner has thrown seven TD passes, Blanda eight.

Chamberlain Sets Record

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—Wilt Chamberlain had just established his ninth new National Basketball Association record and his first this year but the big guy wasn't overjoyed about it.
His Philadelphia Warriors lost Thursday night to the Boston Celtics, 132-129, as the Celtics, winning their fifth straight, increased their Eastern Division lead to half a game over the Warriors.
Chamberlain's 55 rebounds, which broke Bill Russell's old NBA record of 51 against Syracuse on Feb. 8, 1959, plus his 34 points had kept the Warriors in the game until Sam Jones and Gene Conley got hot in the final six minutes to pull the Celtics from a 114 tie to victory.
Asked how it felt to own the new rebound record, the 7-1 Wilt said:
"Well, I'd have felt a lot better if we'd won. We were trying hard to win and the loss takes the luster away from it (the rebound record)."

Cornell Boss Fired; Ivy League Rough

PHILADELPHIA (AP)—The story is that in the Ivy League they play football for fun. Don't tell that to the coaches.
The firing of George K. (Lefty) James by Cornell Thursday marked the fifth head coach to be replaced in the staid old league since it was formalized in 1956.
Penn, Harvard, Columbia, Brown and now Cornell have installed new coaches since the Ivy League presidents announced formalization of the league, and indicated it expected its coaches to build character. Winning football teams were to be incidental.
Robert Kane, Cornell athletic director, confirmed a report that James, 55, had come to the end of the line after 25 years far above Cayuga's waters, 14 as head coach of the Big Red football team. Said Kane, in an announcement six minutes before the end of the Penn-Cornell game: "Lefty was a competent teacher, given too little time to teach. He did a good job for Cornell. It is doubtful if anyone could have done better under the circumstances. Cornell University and all Cornellians are indebted to him for long, faithful and dignified service."
James remained incommunicado after his team bowed, 18-7, to Penn in the traditional Thanksgiving Day game. But Wednesday, in a locker room at the Philmont country club where Cornell stayed for the Penn visit, he told the Associated Press: "It (the firing) hit me like a bombshell. I just didn't expect it."
James, asking that his remarks be kept off the record until after the Penn game, explained he

EVERETT, Wash. (AP)—A missed try-for-point in the final quarter proved the difference Thursday as Everett Junior College upset Boise Junior College 14-13 in the Evergreen Shrine Bowl football game here.
Boise, the Intermountain Conference champion and third-ranked nationally among junior colleges, took the opening kickoff and marched 60 yards for its first score.
Everett's Trojans, ranked 11th nationally, eyed the score with a 61-yard pass-run play in the same stanza, then went ahead in the second quarter with a touchdown by Mike Kalyk.
Ralph Sager set up Everett's second TD with a 78-yard run to the five.
Boise got its second touchdown in the final period when it recovered a fumble on the Everett 11, and wingback Bob Peterson went across from the 4.

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP)—Al Lawrence, 29-year-old Australian from the University of Houston, has added to his prowess as a distance runner.
Bursting forth in the last 300 yards, Lawrence Thursday won the National AAU 10,000-meter cross-country run for the second straight year.
His final kick gave him a good 60 yards over runnerup Fred Norris, 39-year-old Briton who runs for McNeese State College.
Lawrence's time for the 6 1/4-mile course at Bellarmine College was 31:20.8.
Lawrence sparked Houston to the team title with 33 points. The New York Athletic Club was second with 42.
