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Oregon Tech Cage Boss Searching For Starters As Tournament Nears

Next Thursday the Oregon Tech Owls slip out of the Mile High "snowpack" and get their feet wet in Portland for the first time in the 1960-61 college basketball season when they tangle with Lewis and Clark in the opening game of the NAA Tipoff Tournament being held simultaneously in Portland and Salem. In the second game at the L&C gym, Portland State tangles with Pacific.

Meanwhile, at Salem, Williamette and Oregon College will open the action, followed by Linfield versus Southern Oregon College. Play will continue through Saturday, each club slated for three games.

For the Techmen, the rough opener marks their debut in NAA tournament action.

At this stage of the game coach Wally Palmberg is still trying to figure his starting five players. He is working with a squad of 12, including only three lettermen.

Leon Wilson, a 5-8 guard, Gene Gene Branson, 6-4, a forward and Van Zitek, a 6-0 combination man, form the nucleus around which Palmberg is building.

To go along with the three veterans, Palmberg has a not ex-

actly inexperienced fore-court man in the person of big Bob Peterson, 6-4, the two-time all-stater from Klamath Union High, who transferred from Oregon State last spring.

Norm Johns, 6-1, who dropped from last season's quiet before the end of the year, is also back. Hewlett Nash, 6-0 transfer from Coffeyville JC, rounds out a potential first five.

Crowding this group for first string berths are football players Arties Palmore, 6-3; Bud Maupin, 6-6, and Al Brooks, 5-11, from Bonanza. Each is showing a po-

tential welcomed by the veteran Owl coach.

Doug Stiputuck, 6-0, from Boardman; Howard Barlow, 6-3, from Riddle, and Ron Muggard, 6-1, from Roseburg complete the first twelve.

The Owls' conference season opens here Jan. 6-7 when they host the Portland State Vikings in a two-game series.

Prior to that time, and after this week's venture in the tourney, the Owls will meet Chico State here, Humboldt State here twice and then hit the road for a game slate that includes two with Northwest Nazarene.

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — The Ottawa Rough Riders Saturday defeated the Edmonton Eskimos 16-6 in a wild Grey Cup final and won Canada's national professional football championship.

The game was declared over with 41 seconds remaining as fans poured on the field with Ottawa in possession on its own 30-yard line.

Canadian-born Bill Sowolski and Kaye Vaughan, who moved from the United States eight years ago to join the Riders, scored Ottawa's touchdowns. Guy Schreider kicked a field goal and converted after Vaughan's touchdown.

American-born Jim Letcavits got Edmonton's touchdown.

LA Gridders Found Dead At Friend's

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Ralph Anderson, 25, starting end for the Los Angeles Chargers club of the American Football League, was found dead early today in the apartment of his girlfriend, police reported.

The cause of Anderson's death was not known and the coroner's office said it would conduct an autopsy.

Det. Sgt. H. R. Howard of the Police Department's Wilshire Division said Anderson was reported to have suffered from diabetes and apparently died from natural causes.

Anderson was scheduled to play Sunday with the Chargers against the Oakland Raiders. He caught nine passes last week against Buffalo, gaining 109 yards.

He was found dead on a bed in the apartment by Virginia A. Hunt, 23, his girlfriend. Miss Hunt told police Anderson had decided to spend the night there after attending a movie with Ron Botchan, 25, a Charger linebacker, and their dates.

Anderson, who had attended Los Angeles State College prior to going into professional football, was the central figure in a dispute between the Chargers and the Chicago Bears of the National Football League over his services.

Anderson played for most of two seasons with the Bears and then was reportedly "farmed" by the Chicago Club to Canada last season.

Sid Gillman, coach and general manager of the Chargers, signed Anderson as a free agent with the approval of AFL Commissioner Joe Foss. The Bears claimed he still belonged to them and brought legal action.

Miss Hunt told police that when she failed to awaken Anderson, who was fully clothed, she called Botchan and the Central Receiving Hospital. A Fire Department rescue squad sought to revive him and when it failed, pronounced him dead.

One of the top pass receivers in the league, Anderson was unable to play Nov. 4 in a game against the New York Titans because of a diabetic attack. End Coach Al Davis also reported Anderson suffered an attack recently at the Chargers' San Fernando training camp.

The player, who stood 6-foot-2, made his home with his mother, Mrs. Jewel Anderson, in Van Nuys, Calif.

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Interim Committee Announces Meeting

PORTLAND — Sen. Andrew J. Naterlin, chairman of the Interim Committee on Natural Resources, announced that the committee will hold a meeting on Friday, Dec. 9, in the Oregon Game Commission, 1634 S. W. Alder Street, to explain its recommendations to the next legislature and give the public an opportunity to express its views. All interested persons and groups are invited to attend.

The committee, in a report soon to be released, makes five major recommendations:

1. The creation of a Department of Outdoor Recreation. This new department would have as its primary function the production of an outdoor recreation plan for the state of Oregon. It would also coordinate the efforts of all state agencies now involved in outdoor recreation programs.

2. Transfer of the duties and responsibilities of the Marine Board to the new Department of Outdoor Recreation.

3. Transfer of all the duties, responsibilities and activities of the Oregon Game and Fish Commission to a new, unified Department of Fish and Game.

4. Merger of the State Engineer and Hydroelectric Commission with the State Water Resources Board.

5. Reciprocal legislation to provide for uniform regulation of sports fishing in contiguous waters in the states of Oregon, Washington and Idaho.

Copies of proposed legislation drafted by the committee to implement these recommendations will be made public at the meeting. The bills will be introduced shortly after the next legislature convenes in January.
