

David Douglas Scots Capture A-1 Football Crown

North Salem Squad Doesn't Play Dead

PORTLAND (AP)—David Douglas, which wasn't even ranked in the top ten of the first Associated Press poll of the season, won the Oregon class A-1 high school football championship Friday night with a 34-20 victory over North Salem.

The Portland Metropolitan League champion never trailed after scoring early in the first period on fullback Dan Lambert's 3-yard plunge. North Salem bounced back quickly to tie it, at 7-7, on a 14-yard pass play from quarterback Bill Mickle to end Robb Haskins.

David Douglas gained a 14-7 lead at the first quarter mark after quarterback Terry DeSylvia's 3-yard touchdown plunge and his conversion.

Mickle romped 26 yards for a second period touchdown but North Salem still trailed after Vern Smith's kick for the conversion was no good. Halfback Dave Hansen later ran 18 yards to a touchdown and David Douglas had a 21-13 lead at the intermission.

North Salem was within one point, at 21-20, at the third quarter point after Mickle's 4-yard touchdown pass to halfback Dennis Allen.

But David Douglas buried North Salem's hopes with fourth quarter touchdowns on a 9-yard pass play from DeSylvia to end Ed Attebury and Hansen's 51-yard scamper.

DeSylvia booted four conversions before his final kick was blocked.

The winners had the edge in first downs, 19 to 18, and David Douglas piled up a 377 to 255 edge in total yardage.

In the season's final AP poll David Douglas was No. 4 and North Salem No. 5.

The game, in Multnomah Stadium, attracted a crowd of 12,983.

To reach the finals David Douglas beat Jefferson of Portland, 13-6, and defending champion Medford, 20-14. North Salem disposed of Bend, 25-0, and Newberg, 28-14.

Pirates, Humboldt Matched In Playoff

SPOKANE (AP)—"We know Humboldt State has a great team. It ought to be a whale of a battle."

Coach Sam Adams of undefeated Whitworth sized up Friday his team's Dec. 3 post season football game at Eureka, Calif., in the western playoff for the NAIA (small college) championship.

The clash will match the No. 2 team in the final NAIA poll, Humboldt, with No. 4 Whitworth. The winner goes into the NAIA championship game with the Eastern finalist in the Holiday Bowl, at St. Petersburg, Fla., the night of Dec. 10.

Adams and his squad had to sit on their biggest secret of the season for three hours Friday. They were told by Dr. Frank Warren, Whitworth president, at a pre-practice chalk session. But they could not break the news until it was released in Kansas City.

The players then slammed each other round in practice again. Many had given up holiday trips to continue workouts in the mud and snow.

Dr. Warren said the invitation was a "great tribute" to Adams and his team. Director of Athletics Paul Merkel said they would give Humboldt a "good game."

Tom Black, senior tackle and captain and inspirational award winner, said "If we can put four quarters together, we can beat 'em."

Whitworth has won 17 of its last 18 games and Humboldt's last 19. Humboldt trounced Lewis and Clark of the Northwest Conference 34-0 in a Thanksgiving Day game.

Lenoir Rhyne, NMC Scheduled

KANSAS CITY (AP)—Whitworth College of Spokane, Wash., will play Humboldt College of California, and Northern Michigan College of Marquette will meet Lenoir Rhyne in the football playoffs of the National Intercollegiate Athletic Association Dec. 3.

The NAIA Friday added Whitworth and Northern Michigan to the list of semifinalists.

The winners will meet for the NAIA championship at the Holiday Bowl in St. Petersburg, Fla., Dec. 10.

NY Initiates Bonus Policy

NEW YORK (AP)—The New York Yankees have taken their first step in a new bonus policy designed to compete with other clubs for promising young baseball players.

The American League champions Friday paid one of their largest bonuses in signing Howard Kint, 18-year-old southpaw pitcher sought by every major league club. No sum was disclosed but the payment reportedly was in excess of \$50,000.

Kint, a Columbia University sophomore, posted a record of 40 victories and one defeat while pitching for high school, recreation and sandlot teams.

Matchmaker Harry Elliott of Portland, who is the Seattle promoter, and who has signed up the bouts for the Jaycees, says that this makes it a real endurance contest of the wrestlers and by the time the tag team brawl is over the issue is pretty well decided on the basis of condition and ability.

Borne, the bewhiskered Pendletonian who started out from a little village outside Pendleton by the name of Cayuse, has already made his mark nationally and rose to the top in the rough Texas league which he left a few weeks ago to compete in the Northwest again.

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Central Union Nabs Oregon A-2 Championship

First Quarter TDs Beat Myrtle Point

COOS BAY (AP)—Quarterback Dick Wiese passed Central Union of Mouthmouth-Independence to a 20-13 victory over Myrtle Point and the Oregon class A-2 high school football championship here Friday night.

Wiese connected for three touchdown passes in the first period and the winners never scored again.

The first score came on the game's opening scrimmage play. Wiese passed 43 yards to halfback Ben Hojara, who caught the ball on the Myrtle Point 30 and ran untouched to the goal line.

Four plays later Hojara recovered a Myrtle Point fumble at mid-field. Central moved the ball to the 17 from where Wiese connected on a short screen pass to halfback Jim Taylor, who dashed 14 yards to score.

Shortly afterward Central's Greg Hartman recovered another fumble, on the Myrtle Point 31. Three plays later Wiese passed 16 yards to end John Haggerty in the end zone.

Myrtle Point got back into the game with two second period touchdowns.

A 21-yard punt rumbuck by Paul Daniels to the Central 21 set up the first score. Halfback Rich Armstrong romped to the 8. Two plays later Daniels' brother, halfback Rich, bucked one yard to the end zone.

Later in the quarter Central moved 51 yards to the other score, Armstrong going the final eight. Myrtle Point mounted four scoring threats in the last half and once reached the 2-yard line, where a holding penalty bogged down a drive.

Statistically the teams were about even. Central led in total yardage, 295 to 273, but Myrtle Point had the edge in first downs, 17-12.

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Izaak Walton League Told Advantages

SALEM (AP)—The Oregon Izaak Walton League convention was told at its opening session Friday that construction of John Day Dam on the Columbia River may have a beneficial effect on the region's waterfowl.

Travis Roberts, regional supervisor of the Bureau of Sports Fisheries and Wildlife, said the government plans to acquire 35,000 acres of water and land for a waterfowl use. This, he said, would replace the many islands which are to be inundated by the John Day pool.

S. A. Mallicoate, deputy director of the Oregon Department of Planning and Development, told of the recreational possibilities of the John Day pool. He said, however, that his agency's prime responsibility was to industry.

Robert Rittenhouse, director of the Oregon Marine Board, discussed conflicts of interest on the state's waterways. They include the fight between anglers and waterskiers and between sports fishermen and commercial fishermen.

State Sen. Walter Leth reviewed recommendations of the Interim Committee on Natural Resources. They include merging the Fish and Game commissions and the merger of the state engineer and Hydroelectric commission into the Water Resources Board.

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OSAA Group Votes Tourney Shift Down

PORTLAND (AP)—The delegate assembly of the Oregon School Activities Association Friday recommended by a vote of 22 that the 1962 state basketball

tournament be held at McArthur Court at the University of Oregon.

There has been some talk recently of holding the week-long tournament at Portland's new Memorial Coliseum.

The final decision will be made by the OSAA Board of Control which already has set the 1961 tournament for Eugene.

The assembly gave the board authority to allow schools in districts with more than 10 members to play more than the nine football games now allowed. The request for the change was made by the Portland Interscholastic League.

A report from a committee studying redistricting for state playoffs was read. Mid-Willamette Valley Schools are leading the fight for district revision. They pointed out that District 8-A-1 (North Salem, South Salem, Albany, Corvallis, Lebanon and Sweet Home) may have to play each other twice in football unless some changes are made.

Larry Winter, assistant superintendent of Portland schools, was elected president of the board. Harold Beall, superintendent of Springfield schools, was named vice president, and Leo Crisman, superintendent-principal at Elkton was elected to the board.

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Baylor's 51 Keeps Lakers In Pro Race
