## Hawaii Votes Face Recount

HONOLULU (AP)—Hawaii may have to recount the 184,869 votes cast in the island state Nov. 8 which gave Vice President Richard M. Nixon a 141-vote margin over Sen. John F. Kennedy for the nation's highest office. Hawaii has three electoral votes.

Democrats petitioned in Circuit Court Tuesday for the recount, alleging discrepancies in almost every one of the state's 240 precincts.

The petition was filed against Republican presidential electors and alternates and Lt. Gov. James Kealaoha, who last week certified the final tabulation as: Nixon 92,505; Kennedy 92,364.

## Post Office Services Set New Pattern

To afford greater security in sending money and valuables through the U.S. mails, the registry system, which recently received considerable public notice when the million dollar Hope Diamond was delivered by mail, from New York to Washington, was established in 1855. Nine years later, money order service was started in the United States and extended to foreign countries in 1867.

Other improvements in service followed:

In 1858 street letter boxes were introduced so that postal patrons would not have to go to the post office to mail letters.

Free delivery of mail was begun in 49 cities in 1863 when 440 carriers were employed at a cost of \$300,000.

Up until 1861 all mail carried on trains was sorted in post offices. In that year the postmaster at St. Joseph, Missouri, successfully began sorting mail on a moving train by route agents between Hannibal and St. Joseph, in an attempt to avoid delays in mail departures for the West. In 1864 the first officially sponsored test of a railway post office car was made between Chicago, Illinois, and Clinton, Iowa, marking the beginning of the Railway Mail Service.

Postal cards were introduced in 1873. In 1885, to accommodate delivery of mail upon receipt at the post office, the Special Delivery Service was established.

One of the most far-reaching developments in U.S. mail service was the inauguration of Rural Free Delivery on Oct. 1, 1896. On that date five routes were placed in operation in West Virginia. Today there are over 31,500 rural routes serving nearly 35 million people.

The postal saving system was established in 1911 as a convenient and safe depository for the accumulation of savings and to encourage thrift. Originally the maximum that could be placed in a postal savings account was \$500 but it has been increased to \$2,500.

## Justice Where Art Thou?

LONDON (AP)—Anthony Watts was 90 miles from home on a wet and windy night when his 24-year-old automobile coughed and splattered to a halt.

Angrily he grabbed a hammer from the tool kit and broke the car into bits. On a piece of battered bodywork he scribbled a farewell note: "Take it easy—but take it."

Police found the wreckage the next morning alongside a Hertfordshire highway. They traced the owner through the license plates.

Watts was hauled into court at Solihull Thursday for violating the 1958 litter act and fined 5 pounds (\$14).

## Stamps In The News

Range conservation, a topic of major concern to many in the western sector of the U.S., is now a topic for stamp collectors.

Postmaster General Arthur E. Summerfield announced that the Post Office Department would issue a four-cent Range Conservation stamp on Feb. 2, 1961, at Salt Lake City in conjunction with the annual meeting of the American Society of Range Management.

Also cooperating in plans for the first day ceremony are the Forestry Service and the Soil Conservation Service of the Department of Agriculture, and the Bureau of Land Management and Indian Service of the Department of the Interior.

The new stamp will depict the importance of grassland and livestock to the nation's agriculture.

## RANGE CONSERVATION



UNITED STATES POSTAGE

It will dramatize the development of range conservation from the pioneer days of the open range to today's scientific range management techniques.

The design is divided into two parts. The left half features a reproduction of "The Trail Boss," a line drawing by western artist Charles M. Russell. The right half shows a contemporary range scene.

Collectors desiring first day cancellations of the four-cent Range Conservation stamp may send their self-addressed envelopes, together with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Salt Lake City 1, Utah. Each envelope must be marked in pencil in the upper right corner the number of stamps to be affixed.

Again a reminder that requests for first day covers must be post-

marked five days in advance of the issuance date—or prior to Jan. 28, 1961.

The John Foster Dulles Memorial stamp will be first placed on sale at Washington, D.C., on Dec. 6, 1960. Collectors who have not already done so may send addressed covers, with remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D.C. The outside envelope must be marked "First Day Covers Dulles Memorial Stamp." The design and information on this four-cent stamp have been reported previously in this column.

Pakistan has issued two new stamps to mark the second anniversary and progress made by the country under the regime of F. M. Mohammad Ayub Khan. The two-annas brown, pink and green, and the 14-annas blue, yellow and green bear the same design.

Early in 1960 this column reported that a stamp contest was being held to determine the "world's prettiest stamp." Beauty was the sole basis of judging—with no concern for age, rarity or value.

The winner was the United States issue of 1959 which shows the American flag. This is the 49-star flag printed in blue and carmine on white to commemorate the admission of Alaska into the Union as the 49th state.

Second place went to Greece—the five drachmas issued in 1958 which depicted a Greek ship, the Argo, and paid tribute to the Greek merchant marine.

Third place was assigned to a stamp issued by Colombia in 1959. The 10-centavo displayed a portrait of Luz Marina Suluaga, "Miss Universe of 1959."

Japan has issued new 10-yen stamp to mark the establishment of the Okinawa Astrophysical Observatory. Also issued by Japan were two new 5-yen stamps honoring the 15th National Athletic Meeting.
